A WARM WELCOME FOR ALL

Welcome to the Willette church of Christ, where you will find the Bible as our only rule for faith and practice. We seek to speak where the Bible speaks and to be silent where the Bible is silent. We want to call Bible things by Bible names and do Bible things in Bible ways.

Jesus said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" (Matthew 28:18-20). Our evangelistic efforts include several local and foreign mission works listed on the back of this bulletin. The home congregation is the most important work. Therefore, every month, we spend time door knocking, visiting, and helping our local community. We have a large benevolent building that operates every Tuesday from 8:30-12:30, which offers free clothes and other items to anyone in need. Our primary foreign work is found in Andhra Pradesh, India, where Brother *Jack Honeycutt* serves as our full time mission coordinator. We are also blessed to have a full time prison ministry with services conducted each Sunday from 1:00-3:00. Brother *Tim McHenry* is our regular preacher. In addition to preaching, he teaches classes and is involved in many works here at Willette. Our associate preachers *Mark West* and *Ben Smith* preach, teach classes, minister in the nursing home, coordinate our visitation teams, and work with our Bible camp and youth in general. In addition, we have a radio program on 102.1 FM that airs each weekday around 12:15.

We are a Bible centered, mission minded, and family oriented church. We hope you will enjoy our fellowship. Thank you for coming, and please return at every opportunity.

Tidings from Timothy

Next Sunday I plan on preaching on Heaven and Hell. Before I do that, I think it is good for me to explain to Willette what the Bible says about the Justice of God. We will be looking at degrees of reward and punishment, recognition and remembrance in the afterlife, etc.

Sunday Seminar: with Denny Petrillo will be March 10! It should be fascinating as we study on the subject of "How we got the Bible." I don't know that I have ever heard a series of lessons on this topic.

Youth Events: I will be preaching tonight but we still need some young men to help with the service.

Benevolence Building: the "BB" has been open for a while on Saturdays while we get inventory down, but that situation will only continue as William and the volunteers have time and think there is a need. There is a sign posted on the front door to the BB to let you know when it is open. Remember that if you have usable items or clothing, then giving them to Benevolence is much better than throwing them away, and much easier than trying to make just a buck or two in a yard sale!

Prayer

Have you every been called upon to lead a public prayer? Did you accept or reject the assignment? Did the thought fill you with anxiety and fear? Did the palms of your hands begin to sweat? Did you feel that you needed to know more about what you were doing?

I'm certainly not an expert on the subject, but perhaps a few practical suggestions might be of help.

The role your voice plays is important. When you pray, pray loudly enough to be heard. If you don't, how will the congregation be able to say "Amen"? (well, all 5 of us who

say it won't know when to anyway, STM) Stay away from a "stained glass" voice. You can say "God." It doesn't have to be "Gawd."

It is a public prayer. What you say should be relevant for the whole congregation. Private matters should be dealt with in private prayers. Enter into your own closet and pray to God secretly.

Have the proper motive. You are not praying to be seen of men, or praised for eloquent speech.

Acknowledge Christ. Our access to God is through Christ.

Be sincere. Don't fall into the trap of vain repetitions, or the use of trite expressions.

Consider the time. The Model Prayer that Jesus gave his disciples is rather short. We should not think that we will be heard for our much speaking. I read once about a brother who had a habit of praying long public prayers. On this particular Sunday the prayer had been going on for some time when one brother leaned over to his neighbor and said, "Is he about through?" In a low tone the neighbor responded, "When he reaches the point of the Jews being in bondage he is about half through."

A prayer is not a sermon. You are speaking to God, not to men. I have heard prayer that were used to make announcements (O Lord, you know that the funeral service for brother Smith is going to be conducted at the Ruebel Funeral Home at 2 o'clock in the afternoon this coming Tuesday and we need additional singers). And I have heard prayers which were preached to the members, and even corrected the preacher for the lesson he had just presented. I have even heard prayers which quoted countless scriptures to the Almighty (apparently a reminder to God just in case he forgot what He said).

Take your time. Some public prayers are uttered a such a rapid rate of speech that they become almost unintelligible. I feel sure that much of this is due to stage fright. You may have to remind yourself to be somewhat more deliberate.

Practice praying aloud. If you always pray silently, you may be startled by the sound of your own voice. Pray aloud.
