


Homes Date Back to 1844



THE CALLENDER HOME, built in 1854, is the present home of Mrs. Eloise Callender Watson (pictured at top left). The home is shown at the top of the page (at right), and has been in constant use since its construction.

OLDEST OF THE HOMES yet standing and in use in Victoria is said to be the present home of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Hauschild Jr., 210 East Forrest Street. The house was said to have been built by Theobald Sengele in 1844. Mrs. Hauschild and her son, Henry J. Hauschild III, are shown at the center of the page looking over old deeds. Their home is shown at center also.

THE HOME of Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Sale was built of Victoria brick with slave labor in 1851, and was the home of Judge Alexander H. Phillips, who later represented the city in the State Constitutional convention in 1866. Mrs. Sale is shown (bottom left), in one of the drawing rooms. A picture of Dr. Sale's great grandmother is shown on the wall. The Sale home is at bottom right.
