From the Mouth of the Enemies of Christ Sermon Series for the Season of Lent

The Eighth Commandment instructs, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor." The updated translation reads, "give false testimony," but I prefer bearing false witness. Why? It is more biblical in language. To bear

means to carry. To "give false testimony" implies that once you speak a falsity about your neighbor, it is no longer your problem. This is not what the commandment means. There is more than just speaking. To bear one another burdens in love includes fellow reputations; hence to bear is to carry your neighbor's reputation, and they carry your own.

This past election year highlighted problems that have been stewing for quite a long time. Not only has it been deemed ok on all sides of the aisle to speak falsely, it is also been widely disseminated that it is ok to hate and decriminalize those who disagree with you. For many years, there has been a movement away from a right and a wrong, and heavy use of anger lodged at those with whom you deem as your enemies. Many don't just think or speak of "disagreeing;" instead, we talk of adversaries, foes, and enemies. What is often forgotten is these are the very terms used to describe Satan. What is also forgotten is the Eighth Commandment, or it is twisted. Either we are told not to judge, or the best construction is not used.

Paul addresses both these problems, "If anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness. Keep watch on yourself, lest you too be tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:1-2)

This is a reality of the baptismal identity that is given to you as a gift through the Font of water joined to God's Word. This year there are Lenten Devotions for your use that dive more deeply in the reality of baptism. As we bear one another's burdens in love, "We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and put the best construction on everything." Again, this contains better biblical imagery as we read, "As you come to [Jesus], a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 2:4-5)

In our Lenten preparation this year, we are going to take Paul's admonition to Timothy, "Have nothing to do with irreverent, silly myths. Rather train yourself for godliness; for while bodily training is of some value, godliness is of value in every way, as it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come. The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance. 10 For to this end we toil and strive, because we have our hope set on the living God, who is the Savior of all people, especially of those who believe."

We are going to practice the Eighth Commandment by looking at the words spoken by the enemies of Christ. Just who are these enemies? We will hear from Caiaphas, Pilate, those gathered at Jesus' trial and at His cross. We will begin on Ash Wednesday by looking at His enemy that we don't like to talk about.

As we walk through Lent, may the Lord keep ever in our hearts, minds, and lips, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven. For he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:44-48) Then when we see our imperfection, may we hear God's Word to, "return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; and rend your hearts and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love." (Joel 2:12-13)

"I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you

through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:8-9).

Without commands or even arm-twisting, St. Paul encourages, even challenges, the Church in Corinth to demonstrate the sincerity of their faith by their generosity in giving. He does this because giving generously is a gift of the Spirit given to us through the Gospel.

St. Paul wrote: "But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving" (2 Corinthians 8:7). In other words, just as we grow in faith and speech and knowledge of eternal things by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, so also do we grow in giving from the same Spirit through the same Word.

The problem is that the grace of generosity often grows cold in us. It's not so much that we stop giving, but we don't put it first. We treat it like all the other bills that must be paid. It becomes a chore, just one more thing to check off a list of things to do. That empties it of its spiritual power and robs us of the joy that Christ and the Scriptures assign to it.

On top of that, since this generosity is linked to faith and knowledge of divine things, a lack of excelling in giving is sure sign that our faith and knowledge of God are under attack as well.

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that we who are poor might become rich. Thus, the incarnation, suffering, and death of our Lord on the cross is the reason, source, and driving force for our generosity in giving to the church.

And since Christ who was rich became poor so that we might be rich in His grace—of which generous giving is part—so we also who are rich in His grace can excel in pressing His grace into service toward the gracious work of the church.

Pay attention to what you give to the church so that you may excel at it. And if you find that your heart has grown cold or indifferent toward it, immerse yourself in God's Word. Read it at home. Attend Bible Class. Hear and listen to it preached in the Divine Service. Be reminded of what Christ has done for you in His incarnation, suffering, and death. For this will strengthen your faith and knowledge. And where that excels, so will the grace of giving excel also.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In recent weeks, I have received a number of inquiries from concerned members of the Synod about the COVID-19 vaccines, as they seek to maintain their support for the sanctity of life and for religious freedom. These questions have come not in the interests of politicizing the matter, but out of sincere Christian moral convictions. Having consulted with our district presidents and other agencies of the Synod, I requested that the staff of the Commission on Theology and Church Relations, in collaboration with the Office of National Mission's Life Ministry, draft "The LCMS and COVID-19 Vaccines: Facts and Considerations." On the basis of this counsel, let me address a few of your most pressing questions.

- 1) Are COVID-19 vaccines related to abortion? The science regarding this is complex. The two vaccines currently approved by the FDA Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna were not designed, developed or produced using cell lines derived from aborted human fetal tissue. Other vaccine candidates including the UK-approved Oxford/AstraZeneca did use human fetal tissue, however. The Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna vaccines did perform laboratory tests using cells derived from abortions (one from 1972 and another from 1985) to confirm the final vaccine quality (as, surprisingly, do many other commonly used medications and vaccines). For more information on how the COVID-19 vaccines relate to abortion, I encourage you to consult the website of the pro-life bioethicists at the Charlotte Lozier Institute and the list they maintain there: lozierinstitute.org/an-ethics-assessment-of-covid-19-vaccine-programs/. According to their assessment, neither the Pfizer/BioNTech nor Moderna vaccines contain any substance derived from aborted human fetal cells.
- 2) Does the Synod have a position on the reception of vaccines using human fetal tissue? The Synod does not have an official position on such vaccines at this time. Official decisions of this nature come through the Synod acting in convention, and no convention action has yet been taken. However, our church body remains firmly committed to the sanctify of life, and we continually seek to advocate for pro-life positions in the public square.
- 3) Can I obtain a religious exemption for the COVID-19 vaccine? Religious or personal belief exemptions are based on conscientious objection and do not require official support from the denomination. The absence of an official Synod stance does not impact your ability to seek an exemption. Please consult your local lawmakers or public health officials for more information on how to proceed should the need arise.
- 4) Should I take the COVID-19 vaccine? This is a question only you can answer. Some may choose not to take the vaccine because of concerns over its relation to abortion or fear of possible

health complications. Others may take it in spite of such reservations out of concern for their own health or that of their neighbor. Since neither Scripture nor the Synod has explicitly addressed this issue, it remains a matter of Christian freedom where you must choose according to your individual conscience.

5) How should I talk about the vaccine with others who disagree with my view of it? In a sensitive issue of this nature, we remember the words of St. James: "Let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger" (James 1:19). Listen carefully and openly to the points of others. Consider them. Share your positions patiently and objectively. Reflect upon your own penchant for error. Forgive others where they sin against you and ask for forgiveness where you wrong them.

In this contentious issue, we must respect the consciences of fellow believers who share our same commitment to Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions, as well as our life together as a Synod. As St. Paul urges us regarding matters of conscience, "let no one seek his own good, but the good of his neighbor" (1 Cor. 10:24), and "let us not pass judgment on one another any longer, but rather decide never to put a stumbling block or hindrance in the way of a brother" (Rom. 14:13). At a time of cultural upheaval, I would encourage you not to allow disagreement even over undoubtedly important matters such as this to take precedence over the faith that unites us in Christ. In all things, we should heed the call to "maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:3).

Please study the document mentioned above. It provides a summary of what we know about the COVID-19 vaccines, their relation to the issue of abortion, and what we can (and cannot) say about these matters from the Synod's perspective. I hope it proves useful to you as you wrestle with how to bear Christian witness in this world through your love of both God and neighbor.

"Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, equip you with everything good that you may do his will, working in us that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen" (Heb. 13:20–21).

The LCMS and COVID-19 Vaccines: Facts and Considerations

COVID-19 Vaccines and Abortion

- Reliable information on the sourcing and testing of COVID-19 vaccines from the pro-life researchers of the Charlotte Lozier Institute may be found at lozierinstitute.org/update-covid-19vaccine-candidates-and-abortion-derived-cell-lines/.
- According to the Lozier Institute, the current FDA-approved COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna) do not use aborted human fetal tissue in the design, development or production of the vaccines.¹²
- The current FDA-approved COVID-19 vaccines have been tested using human fetal cell lines (as
 are many other medicines, such as the MMR and polio vaccines, as well as treatments for HIV,
 Parkinson's and diabetes), but the vaccines themselves do not contain any aborted fetal cells.³
- Many remaining COVID-19 vaccines in development do use human fetal cell lines and are therefore considered "ethically controversial" (for instance, the UK-approved Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine as well as the one from Janssen/Johnson & Johnson).

COVID-19 Vaccines and the Synod

- The Synod in convention has repeatedly adopted resolutions supporting the sanctity of human life and opposing abortion (e.g., 2019 Resolution 3-02A, 2010 Resolution 6-02A, 2007 Resolution 6-02, 2004 Resolution 6-04).
- The Synod in convention has not officially adopted a resolution concerning the use of vaccines developed from or tested using fetal cell lines.
- The absence of an official Synod stance does not impact an individual's ability to seek a religious or
 personal belief exemption from vaccine requirements. In many states, religious exemptions from
 vaccine requirements can be obtained by individuals on the basis of conscientious objection.
- Complete consensus does not exist in the pro-life community at-large on the reception of vaccines developed from or tested using fetal cell lines (e.g., the debates within Roman Catholic circles).⁴
- The Commission on Theology and Church Relations has published no report or opinion on vaccines. It has discussed the possibility of addressing it pursuant to 2019 Resolution 11-01A ("To Give Guidance and Encourage Action on Beginning-of-Life Issues"), but work on that has not begun.

What We Can Say

- The Synod remains steadfastly committed to the sanctity of human life and supportive of those institutions and individuals advocating for the unborn.
- Genuine concerns for life exist on both sides of the COVID-19 vaccination question: concern for the
 use of aborted fetal cells in the design, development, production and testing of vaccines, as well as

concern for the physical well-being of one's neighbor endangered by the virus.

- There is no official Synod position on the use of COVID-19 vaccines (as such positions are ordinarily expressed through a resolution of the Synod in convention).
- Christians should respect the consciences of one another on a question where Scripture and the Synod have not spoken expressly.
- Members of the Synod and Synod congregations are encouraged to:
 - Educate themselves about the vaccines;
 - Consult with trusted health care providers, clergy and those who may be impacted by their decision; and
 - Act on the basis of informed conscience as to receiving the vaccine.

Dear Friends at Immanuel Lutheran Church,

We are extremely grateful for your donation of 22.6 pounds to Mid-Iowa Communnity Action, Inc. (MICA) Poweshiek County Emergency Food Pantry. With your support and assistance, we were able to provide food and other items to 104 households throughout Poweshiek County during the month of December 2020. However, since families are eligible to obtain food twice a month, 119 food boxes were distributed.

Additionally, due to a donation from a local organization, Christmas boxes were given to 50 families which included potatoes, a ham, rolls, and non-perishable food items for a total of approximately 931.45 pounds for Christmas! Our families are very appreciative.

Little did we know that 2020 would see so many changes at MICA! A major remodeling project of the west half of the building was finished. The SATUCI offices were able to move into their own private area on the northwest corner of the building. Adjacent to that is a large conference room with a small kitchenette and storage space for both MICA and Head Start. Beyond this planned project, COVID19 hit! Because of that, we needed to move to scheduled appointments to pick up food from the food pantry curbside. Unfortunately, for the time being, we are no longer able to utilize a shopping pantry, but we know in the future the shopping pantry will once again be the norm. For now, clients are able to enter just inside the front door to drop off or pickup forms. There is also a box next to the outside mailbox with applications for LIHEAP. Completed applications can be placed in the secured mailbox, too. Donations are still being accepted in the northeast corner of the building entering through the alley. Family Development Specialists continue to work with their families — just in a different way. We do hope that 2021 will see many changes again!

We truly appreciate your contribution because every donation helps MICA fulfill its missions: Helping People. Changing Lives. Building Communities.
