




BOOK OF THE MONTH NOVEMBER & DECEMBER

Holy Day or Holiday?!

Understanding Holy Days of Obligation in the Catholic Church

In light of this current holiday season, where most of our nation greatly enjoyed Thanksgiving and is already looking forward to Christmas and New Years, I wanted to write a quick article both explaining the idea of Holy Days of Obligation in our Catholic Faith as well as try to clear up any confusion about this year's upcoming Mass schedule! Now there are many Catholics who are very familiar with the idea of Holy Days of Obligation, but this is meant to be so much more than just another day that Catholics are required to come to Mass (even though the requirement is real!...more on that in a bit). The origin of the word holiday comes from the Old English word haliqdaeq (haliq = holy, daeq = day) or Holy Day. When most of our nation in the U.S.A. hears that it will be a holiday weekend, our first thought is very commonly to think about a big party or a some sort of fun event or get-away that we can enjoy. This celebration is not a bad thing, but traditionally any haligdaegs in the Catholic Faith would be celebrated with the same enthusiasm while also incorporating God and the church family as a part of this celebration. This is because halidaegs were always an extension of the central Holy-Day in our faith, Sunday, the Lord's Day, and the New Sabbath Day, the Day of Resurrection! From the very beginning of the Church, Jesus' Last Supper meal was understood as a fulfillment of both the Jewish Passover and the Jewish Sabbath. Therefore, our new Passover, Easter Sunday, when Jesus rose from the dead, also became our new Sabbath, the Sunday Eucharist or Sunday Mass. In other words, every Sunday is meant to be a celebration of Easter and Jesus' Resurrection. Holy Days were simply an additional extension of this celebration, and they can end up either on particular days of the week (like the Ascension of Jesus, which is on Thursday after the 6th Sunday of Easter) or particular days of the year (such as December 8th and the Immaculate Conception of Mary). Overall, the main point is that, yes, we are following the commandment to keep holy the Sabbath Day (and ultimately most weeks, the minimum requirement is to spend 1 hr in praise and worship of God...not bad considering His love and life will make us happy and fulfilled for eternity!), but we are also called on by the Church to celebrate Jesus' Resurrection and our salvation on 6 other days during the year. These are the six Holy Days of Obligation, but they should really be thought of as the Holy Days of Celebration! Here is a calendar to help you!

- January 1 Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God
- the sixth Sunday of Easter
- August 15 The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary
- November 1 All Saints' Day
- The Ascension of Our Lord Observed on the Thursday after December 8 The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary (2021—6:30 pm Dec. 7th, 8:30 am & 6:30 pm)
 - December 25 Christmas, The Nativity of Our Lord

Now the Catholic Church understands that we no longer live in a Catholic culture, which might give days off work for these Holy Days, and the Church is trying its best to help those that are heavily burdened by true busyness. Therefore, in the U.S. three of these six days, Jan. 1, Aug. 15, and Nov. 1, are not official requirements when they fall on a Saturday or a Monday (but the faithful are still encouraged to come to Mass and to celebrate!). However, December 8th and December 25th are always Holy Days of Obligation even on Saturdays and Mondays, which brings us to this year's Mass schedule at OLV, which is bit confusing due to the Saturdays. Long story short, here is how you fulfill the obligation this year (come Dec. 8th!):

- FIRST— Attend one Christmas Mass; Dec. 24th & 25th (5pm, 8pm, midnight {all Friday night}, or 10am Sat.),
- SECOND— Attend one Mass on Holy Family Sunday; Dec. 26th (8am, 11 am, or 1 pm....Christmas is too important, so we can't do a Sat. vigil; this is why I added a 1:00 pm Sunday Mass this year),
- THIRD— Attend one Mass on Epiphany Sunday; Jan 1st & 2nd (5pm Sat, or, 8am or 11 am Sun).
- January 1st the feast of Mary is on a Sat., so it is not an official requirement this year, but please come if you can!!


