Book Event


"Rye's Battle of the Century"

New Hampshire Charitable Foundation Grant Progress

I have been a librarian for about 30 years, the last 20 years at the Portsmouth Athenaeum. With the help of this grant money I will be working about 4 hours a week to get the Rye Historical Society's database online and available to search on the website. I have been editing the database and scanning manuscripts, books and ephemera. These images will be put on the website sometime in early 2017 in a keyword searchable database. The goal of this project is to have images of these primary source documents available for teachers in the school district for classroom projects, for students to do direct research and for the general public. The first round of material will relate to the period 1850 – 1920, but in the future we expect to add material from the early 1800's and 1700's.

Rye History Tours – Trolley, Bike, Car, Van and on Foot

This past Labor Day the trolley was full as we set out on our trek through Rye's past with stops at St. Andrew's, Rye Harbor and Goss Farm. RHS tries to schedule the tours on the Monday of the three warm weather holiday weekends. We recognize that some would like to vary the tours to include other stops and we welcome your feedback. The next tour trolley tour is Memorial Day weekend (Sat.) 2017.

Rye librarian Andy Richmond organized a Rye History bike tour (Washington, Ocean Blvd., Perkins, Central) and RHS provided him with the historical information. This map is available in the library and the museum.

RHS needs help in creating Rye history self-driving/biking /walking tours. We have all the information and stories, but need to organize the material and make it available to the public. In a van, Dave Maloney operates a "Scenic Coastal Tour" along Rye's coast, among others, through his "Seacoast NH Heritage tours, LLC" (info@seacoastnhtours.com).

The best tours, of course, are on foot which will take you back to pre-industrial Rye when the full flavor of the town could be enjoyed. One example is a saunter from Rye Center to Market Square. Enjoy an hour plus leisurely stroll through history on the lovely roads of our town. Unless you have a map and an intention to stop a lot, automobiles blind us to history.
