Pastor's Study **Desk Notes**

6th Sunday Ordinary Time



He takes our place! Prisoner 16770 in Auschwitz, stepped up to the guard and said, "Let me take his place. I am old. He has a wife and children." The guard had just selected ten prisoners to be killed as vindictive punishment for only one escapee who successfully slipped through the camp's fence (isn't such disproportionate cruelty typical of evil?) This substitute was the martyr priest Fr Maximilian Kolbe, taking the place of Franciszek Gajowniczek. Fr Kolbe followed the example of Jesus, who takes our place on the cross, dying that we may live! Jesus does that! What we have coming to us, Jesus steps in and absorbs Himself that we may be spared!

Do you see such a substitution in this story of Jesus and the healed leper? Jesus takes on the suffering and isolation of the leper after He the leper. Jesus trades places with him! Recall that the law for lepers indicated that they had to live in quarantine apart from society. Leviticus 13:46 commanded that "Being unclean, the leper shall dwell apart, taking up residence outside the camp" Jesus has compassion for the leper and so He lovingly interacts with him and heals him (Mark 1:41 says Jesus "he stretched out his hand, touched him"). Whether Jesus was officially sanctioned or not because of this 'unclean' touch or just because of popularity, Jesus does receive an 'isolating quarantine' of sorts. Mark 1:45 says, "that afterward it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places...." So, Jesus took the role and place of the isolated leper! We see this work of 'substitution' in several ways throughout Jesus' ministry. Consider His resurrection of Lazarus: Jesus raises Lazarus to life again, and the result of such a miracle is that the Sanhedrin began to plot to have Jesus killed. Right after Lazarus' resurrection, John 11:47, 53 tells us that, "the chief priests and the Pharisees convened the Sanhedrin and said, "What are we going to do? This man is performing many signs...........So from that day on they planned to kill him." Lazarus dead comes to life again, and Jesus is condemned to die because of it. Very clearly later on, Jesus physically takes the death row place of Barabbas, which subsequently sets Barabbas free. In Matthew27:21, we read that "Pilate the governor said to them in reply, "Which of the two do you want me to release to you?" They answered, "Barabbas!" So, Jesus takes Barabbas' place on death row, setting him free.

Another example of Jesus substituting himself for a victim, to set the other person free can be seen in his exorcism of demons. Jesus calms the tormented spirits and life of those who are demon-possessed, and it brings all kinds of chaotic controversy on to Him. Tormentors pursue Jesus with controversy after he heals the 'demon-possessed'. For example, Jesus is constantly harassed by Pharisees & Scribes after he drives out demons. It brings the personal attacks to His own door. For example, in Matthew 9:34, we hear that "the Pharisees said of him, "He drives out demons by the prince of demons." Matt 12:24 repeats the same trolling charge and persecuting accusation against Jesus - that He is a demon Himself. The Pharisees stalk Jesus, like demons themselves, with such slandering taunts.

But Jesus does step in to save us, time and time again, taking our place of punishment to set us free of it. St Paul has a litary of such 'replacement' roles that Jesus accomplishes for us. In 2 Corinthians 8:9, Paul writes that "for your sake he became poor although he was rich, so that by his poverty you might become rich." In 2 Corinthians 5:21, Paul states that, "For our sake he made him to be sin who did not know sin, so that we might become the righteousness of God in him." And in 1 Corinthians 1:27-28, Paul explains this substitution and reversal methodology of God being demonstrated by how Jesus takes our place when he says "God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong, choosing the lowly and despised of the world.....to reduce to nothing those who are something." Jesus, God, lowers Himself to us, so that we can be lifted up to Him. Or similarly Romans 5:8 says it simply, "God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us." All of these scripture quotes amount to what we hear in today's gospel, that Jesus 'was moved with pity" (Mark 1:41). To have pity, is to feel compassion (to suffer with/for) for another person, and Jesus feels for all of us. That is Divine Mercy. What we have coming to us, Jesus takes up, He takes it on Himself for us and saves us from it! Peace, Fr Brian
