We are warmly ecumenical, delight in our diversity, and cherish our Baptist heritage of freedom. We are called by Christ to share God's love with the campus, community, and the world.

As we seek to follow the way of Jesus, we welcome all people to fully participate in our fellowship: all ages, colors, backgrounds, political affiliations, and physical and mental abilities; male and female, gay and straight, rich and poor, single and married. We are all God's children, and all are welcome here.



In the very early years of Christianity, there developed a time of preparation for Easter. This grew from 40 hours of fasting to what we now know as Holy Week. By the year 400 this had become a period of 40 days of preparation, a time for confession of sin and spiritual discipline called Lent. Because each Sunday is kind of a mini-

Easter, a celebration of resurrection, the 40 days do not include Sundays, and the first day of Lent is on a Wednesday - Ash Wednesday.

About a thousand years ago, the imposition of ashes became a regular part of the beginning of Lent. In scripture, ashes are a sign of mortality, humility, mourning, and repentance. With the Reformation, such observances were largely abandoned in most Protestant churches, but in recent years many churches have recovered or rediscovered this practice. Our church has had an Ash Wednesday service for a number of years now.

I'm not sure the point is to "enjoy" it, but I love our Ash Wednesday service, and I have heard more than one person say it is their favorite service of the year. How could a service focused on confession of sin and taking on ashes be a favorite service? Who could enjoy hearing "Dust you are, and to dust you shall return?"

As we gathered together, there were children, youth, college students, and octo- and nonagenarians, as well as lots of folks in between. The group was representative of our church – and of humanity in general. The music was moving; much of it was the meditative prayer-style music of the Taizé community. With our wonderful musicians and beautiful voices, I found it very meaningful. It was a participatory service in which we sang together, lit candles, and shared in readings. There is a certain vulnerability in confessing our failings and limitations and mortality that perhaps makes us more open to God in prayer; I found our time of prayer heartfelt and powerful. There was a strong sense of community and of the Spirit's presence with us.

While Lent begins with confession and taking on ashes, it is not a time to reflect on how terrible we are, or to wallow in our sinfulness, or to be obsessed with how fleeting life is. We are marked with ash, a sign of mortality, but we are marked in the sign of a cross – a reminder of God's love and power. We can't have real hope unless we see things as they really are, and I think that is part of what Lent is about. To be human is to be flawed and imperfect, but it also means that we are filled with promise and possibility and recipients of amazing grace.

I invite you to join us on Sunday as we continue our journey through the season of Lent.
