Quiz time! Who knows what is special about the date October 2? Give up? That is the date, in 1959, when the Corvair was first introduced to the public. Following is an excerpt from the book, "Corvair Affair", authored by Mike Knepper.

"The stage was being carefully set; there was something for everybody, but of course there were no specifics, and certainly no photos. Chevrolet's 'mystery' car remained a public mystery right up to curtain time.

When the showrooms were unlocked on that Friday in October the public poured in to see what had been wrought. If you were fortunate enough to have been among those curious Americans who went to see the new Corvair, you must have your own set of impressions to call up.

The colorful pennants were snapping in the cool fall breeze at your typical dealership that day. The Glasswax and the "coming soon" posters on the windows that fed your curiosity for the past few days were gone, and in their place were banners saying "Here Now" and "Corvair", and "New for '60" inviting you to come on in. It doesn't happen like that anymore. New cars appear almost at random these days.

But on that October day it was different. You stepped inside to find a showroom festooned with banners and streamers and maybe even a junior salesman in a clown outfit to keep the kids occupied with comic books, metal clickers and balloons while you made your annual grand tour. The rakish Impala was there, its high flying, swooping fins, looking fast just sitting still. There was a Bel-Air in one corner looking businesslike and woefully unadorned. Even a Corvette, always a big draw, was largely ignored. The action was in the front corner of the showroom where a group of people were surrounding what must be a car, but it was hidden from view. You pushed your way through the throng and came face to face with the automotive news of 1960.
