4th Sunday Lent Year C

Lk 15:1-3, 11-32



"Tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to Jesus, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." So to them Jesus addressed this parable: "A man had two sons, and the younger son said to his father, 'Father give me the share of your estate that should come to me.' So the father divided the property between them. After a few days, the younger son collected all his belongings and set off to a distant country where he squandered his inheritance on a life of dissipation. When he had freely spent everything, a severe famine struck that country, and he found himself in dire need. So he hired himself out to one of the local citizens who sent him to his farm to tend the swine. And he longed to eat his fill of the pods on which the swine fed, but nobody gave him any. Coming to his senses he thought, 'How many of my father's hired workers have more than enough food to eat, but here am I, dying from hunger. I shall get up and go to my father and I shall say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers.'" So he got up and went back to his father. While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him. His son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son.' But his father ordered his servants, 'Quickly bring the finest robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Take the fattened calf and slaughter it. Then let us celebrate with a feast, because this son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found.' Then the celebration began. Now the older son had been out in the field and, on his way back, as he neared the house, he heard the sound of music and dancing. He called one of the servants and asked what this might mean. The servant said to him, 'Your brother has returned and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' He became angry, and when he refused to enter the house, his father came out and pleaded with him. He said to his father in reply, 'Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders; yet you never gave me even a young goat to feast on with my friends. But when your son returns who swallowed up your property with prostitutes, for him you slaughter the fattened calf.' He said to him, 'My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found.'"

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FROM THE PASTOR



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

4th Sunday Lent Year C Lk 15:1-3, 11-32

We know the story! The Prodigal Son! We all have our own favorite parable that Jesus told, and this one ranks up near the top for many people, alongside the Good Samaritan. However, we often stop reading the parable at the return home of the young party-boy son. What a show of loving forgiveness from the Father! IF ONLY, the elder brother was half as forgiving of his younger brother. That is the bigger sin and ongoing misery from the young son's running away now-and the fault is not with the younger son at this point, it is now with the bitter older brother. With the rest of the story, we see that now the older son has his running away episode, when he vindictively won't welcome his brother back, carrying his grudge to the extreme by not coming into the family house to celebrate the young one's return. I like to point out that in both cases of these sons, the Father had to leave the security of the house to go into the field to welcome a son into the home. He runs out to greet the young one on his return (Luke 15:20) and when the angry older brother holds out and avoids the home dinner, the Good Father again goes out, into the fields to coax the other brother back into fellowship with his family (Luke 15:28). Why is the older brother so hostile to not forgive the younger one? With this parable's telling, Luke lets us know the occasion on which Jesus told this story. Luke 15:1-2 says, "The tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to him, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." So to them (Pharisees) Jesus addressed this parable." Jesus is pointing this parable toward the Pharisees. Jesus is comparing here, the older brother being upset over the 'easy forgiveness' offered his younger brother with the Pharisees 'complaining' over sinners/tax collectors often being with Jesus. Why can't the Pharisees accept and celebrate the conversions of sinners/tax collectors? Like the elder brother, are they jealous over lost benefits from the farm? Are the Pharisees nursing some old grudge over hurtful words exchanged between them? Is it that the Pharisees would rather delight in the condemnation and misery of sinners, than be happy that sinners have changed their lives? Are they acting like the cold, older brother who wants his brother to 'pay more for his sins' before being welcomed back? I wonder. But why then, do any of us become upset and doubt people's sincerity when we hear of their repentance? The older brother and the Pharisees' mean and vindictive attitudes warn us to be careful about letting our judgements on other people's conversions drive us out of Grace's house, too. Self-righteous attitudes might be our sin. In fact, that may be a hazard of 'church-goers'. Might our regular observance lead us to feel superior and entitled to God's grace? Or because we go to church, maybe it leads us to arrogantly condemn others 'For God'? The older brother forgets that everything still belongs to the Father. The right to 'condemn' is God's right (my brother is God's Son-God's Worker and the whole Farm is also His), so who am I to presume it? I need to simply 'mind the farm' and keep faithful about my duties (the will of God) God has assigned me for His service. That is probably more than enough to keep me busy!

But, one more note about this reading for me is, that in the end, I feel sorry for the older brother who complains (one brother wines, and the other brother whines-Both sins!). He is consumed with self-pity, and I have to ask about why he isn't enjoying his productive work and life on the farm? It almost seems like, he reflects the same hedonistic attitude as the younger brother and that his anger is simply that he got beat to the 'ask' for the early windfall inheritance from his father. The father's statement, "You are here with me always; everything I have is yours" (Luke 15:31) makes me think that the Father is equally saddened by this brother's reaction. I hear sadness in the Father, as if he is saying, "I am sorry that you are so unhappy working our family business -I thought you enjoyed being with me here." It makes me wonder about the depth of their actual relationship. I suspect the Father could feel like saying, "It breaks my heart Son, that you never asked me for a small goat and drinks to have fun with your friends at the house." Maybe the older son was too hung up on 'duty & entitlement' instead of actually enjoying the productive work on the family farm with his dad. At least the younger son appreciates now the wholesome work and caring familial atmosphere on the farm. Someone once pointed out to me that since both sons sin against the Father, each in his own way, we want to learn from their mistakes. The real Faithful sons to the Father are actually the Joyful Servants who just love working the farm, and are always eager to fulfill the father's wishes. They are also the ones who genuinely celebrate in the Father's company all the while! The lesson for me: Following God's Will, God's call, whatever that be, is a joy! I am just glad to be here, staying on the farm, and taking joy as it comes and celebrating it as the gift it is!
