


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

The entry is judged based on an established standard or quality rather than how it compares to other entries. There can be several entries receiving blues, reds or whites. There is no further breakdown within the category.

American Judging System

SENIORS - The American System: Entries are judged in comparison to other entries and placed in a numerical order of 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. place.

This system awards only one entry per position.

Exhibitor Rules

1. **RULES:**

All Local and State Rules, Health Rules and Score Cards for Judging in this Premium Book apply, along with those adopted from the Division of Fairs and Expositions regulations, published in a separate booklet. These rules apply to all Fair entries, unless otherwise stated by the Modoc Heritage Foundation. State Rule Booklets are available online at www.cdfa.ca.gov/fe

2. AWARDS AND PREMIUM MONEY:

- a) Awards: Placement of ribbon stickers, ribbon tags, or cards does not guarantee correct placing in judging. All premium money will be paid from the official placing on the judge's sheets in the judge's book and not from ribbons or awards that may be attached to the exhibit.
- **b) Premium Money** will only be paid to Junior Exhibitors, Rancher's Day Exhibitors, and Junior Rodeo Exhibitors, unless otherwise stated.
- c) Junior Exhibitors will be paid in cash in the Fair Office from 12-5 PM on Saturday, August 27, and 12-3 PM, Sunday, August 28. Money not picked up by that time will be donated back to the Modoc Heritage Foundation.

3. ENTRY FORMS:

a) Separate entry forms are required for each department. Please complete and sign each entry form.

Please read carefully.

- b) Entry Forms are available in this booklet or online at www.modocheritagefoundation.org
- c) Check your entry forms for errors. Enclose the correct fee(s) with your Entry Forms. Plan to resolve any deficiencies during exhibit check-in. THE MODOC HERITAGE FOUNDATION IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR FINDING OR CORRECTING ENTRY ERRORS. No exhibitor shall be entitled to an award that has been disallowed because of their own error. Payment of awards shall be withheld for exhibits that are ineligible under State and Local Rules.

Exhibitor Rules

- 5. ABSOLUTELY NO LATE OR TELEPHONE ENTRIES SHALL BE ACCEPTED.
- 6. **BAD CHECK CHARGE:** If the check for the entry fee is refused by the bank, a penalty of \$25 per check must be paid before entries are judged.
- 7. NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED PRIOR TO 5 PM ON SUNDAY WITHOUT WRITTEN PERMISSION FROM A DIRECTOR. Exception: Livestock entries (please see Page 24). All exhibits must be removed from the Fairgrounds no later than 5 PM, Monday, August 29.
- 8. STALL CHARGES (DURATION OF FAIR ONLY). Cost is \$40 per stall. Stalls will be reserved only if stall fee is sent with entry form and entry fees. No more than one horse per stall; stall may not be transferred without prior approval of management. Both parties must contact management for transfer. See Page 44 for forms.
- 9. **HAY AND BEDDING:** No loose hay or bedding (shavings or straw) will be allowed outside the stall. First bedding will be furnished by the Fair.
- 10. **THEFT AND RISK:** All entries are shown at the owner's risk. The State, MHF and Modoc District Fair and its agents are not liable for any theft, loss or damage while exhibits are on the grounds.
- 11. **EXTENDED CLASSES:** Are defined as those where Exhibitors have no restriction to State or County of residence.
- 12. **LOCAL CLASSES:** Are defined as classes that are limited to residents of Modoc, Lassen, Shasta, Trinity and Siskiyou Counties of California; Lake and Klamath Counties of Oregon; Washoe County of Nevada. Exhibitors in local divisions must be residents of Modoc and adjoining counties for at least 30 days prior to the first day of the Fair. (*Please note*: some Divisions and Classes may have other restrictions. See Rules at beginning of each Division.)
- 13. ENTRY FEES CANNOT BE REFUNDED UNLESS APPROVED BY THE MHF BOARD OF DIRECTORS. Request for refunds must be in writing. Horse and Rodeo event fee refund requests must be accompanied by veterinarian's certificate. Request must be made within 30 days of the closing date of the Fair. Drug fees are not refundable.
- 14. **ALL REQUIRED REGISTRATION PAPERS** must be presented to the LIVESTOCK OFFICE BY 5 PM, THURSDAY. All deficiencies must be cleared at this time.

- 15. PARKING: No vehicles will be permitted inside the Fairgrounds after 8 PM, THURSDAY, except for emergencies. Vehicles allowed to enter and unload, must UNLOAD IMMEDIATELY, then move to designated parking areas. NO VEHICLES, STOCK TRAILERS, ETC. will be allowed to park in or near barns, stalls, track and arena THURSDAY THROUGH SUNDAY. This policy will be ENFORCED to ensure exhibitor and visitor safety and as ordered by the State Fire Marshal and California Fair Services Authority.
- 16. **ABSOLUTELY NO** bicycles, roller blades, scooters, skates, or skateboards are allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- 17. **NO EXHIBITORS** are allowed to talk to the judge during judging. All buildings will be closed during judging.
- 18. **NO DOGS**, other than guide dogs accompanying the visually impaired, will be allowed on the Fairgrounds. This includes the livestock area, parking lot, etc. Any fair goer or exhibitor in violation of this rule may be asked to leave the Fairgrounds.

EXCEPTION: Sheep Dog Trials, Thursday, August 25, and the Companion Dog Show & Wiener Dog and Wiener Wannabe Race, Friday August 26. All dogs must remain in the event area only and be removed immediately after the event.

NOTICE/AVISO

No pets/animals are allowed on premises unless they are entered in Fair Events. Service animals specifically trained to assist disabled person(s) as defined under the American Disabilities Act are welcome.

- 19. LIVESTOCK OFFICE is located at the south end of the horse barns. All business regarding livestock, horse show, horse stalls and RV spaces will be handled through this office during the Fair.
- 20. **THE FAIR OFFICE** will be open during the week of the Fair for other questions or assistance.

Exhibitor Rules

22. RVs/TRAILERS/SLEEPING ON THE GROUNDS: All livestock and other exhibitors who remain on the grounds at night must be in designated overnight areas. Exhibitors under 18 must be accompanied by a parent or Senior leader. SLEEPING IN STALLS IS PROHIBITED.

Spaces are available in the west parking lot with

water and electrical hookups.

RV spaces may be rented through the Main Office or on Entry Forms. Call the Fair Office at 530.279.2315 for availability (\$60 for the entire Fair, or \$20 per night). To reserve an RV space, fee payment shall be made by THURSDAY—AUGUST 11, 2022. Space permit will be issued to your RV upon arrival.

23. **JUDGING SYSTEMS USED:** See rules for each contest.

24. **MODOC HERITAGE FOUNDATION** reserves the right to order the removal of any exhibits which are not in the best interest of the Fair; which endangers the public; is objectionable in any way; or which has been entered in violation of its rules and regulations.



- Division 100 & 101 Booths to be Displayed in Agricultural Building
- Division 102 Booths (Business & Artist Displays) Are Not Judged & Displayed in the Fine Arts (Dance Hall) Building
- 1. Refer to 'Exhibitor Rules' for entry due dates.
- 2. All Decorative material used in construction of booths must be fireproof.
- 3. Feature booths shall be limited to one entry for a county/community organization or noncommercial entity.
- 4. Booths must be maintained for the duration of the Fair.
- 5. Size of booths: 100 sq. ft. (10' x 10').

DIVISION 100: FEATURE BOOTHCounty, Community & Organization

Class 01: Agricultural Organization Booth

Limited to those which display the advantage and diversity of the agricultural products grown in the county. Products displayed must have been produced by members or the community or organization within the area represented in the last year.

Class 02: County Organization Booth

Should display an agricultural product, process, or procedure of the area represented in such a manner as to most attractively inform the public of the value, desirability, and interest most attractively to the consumer, producer, and community to be found in the featured subject.

Class 03: Community Organization Booth

Should display a product, process or procedure of the area represented in such a manner as to most attractively inform the public of the value, desirability, and interest most attractively most attractively to the consumer, producer, and community to be found in the featured subject.

DIVISION 101: FAMILY FARM BOOTH

Class 01: Single Family Farm Booth

All products entered must have been produced within the county or district during the last year by the exhibitor or a member of their family on land farmed by the exhibitor. Products entered as part of the exhibit will not be eligible for individual product premiums.

DIVISION 102Display for Artists & Businesses

Class 01: Business & Art Booth

Booth displays advertising art or business commodities for artists and businesses that are unable to staff commercial booths for the entire four days of the Fair. Exhibitors may display business cards or contact information.

 BOOTHS & AGRICULTURE

The quality desired in agricultural and horticultural products is the quality that brings the best financial return in the commercial market, and such exhibits must be at least equal in maturity as that state of ripeness required by Section 42513 of the CA Agricultural Code. "Mature" means having reached that stage of ripeness which will ensure the completion of the ripening process to a degree which will ensure palatability, after the removal of the product from the tree, plant, or vine (Section 425.5). Overripe means having an advanced state of maturity which causes the product to be undesirable for human consumption in the fresh state.
- 3. In classes listed as "any other variety", be sure to name the variety you plan to exhibit on your entry form

- 2. BIRTHDATE FOR JUNIOR EXHIBITORS MUST BE ON THE ENTRY FORM.
- 3. State Fire Rules I-XI apply. No vehicles or stock trailers, etc. will be permitted to park in or near barns, stalls, track area and arena. A 30-minute loading or unloading time will be permitted on Wednesday, August 24th, from Noon to 6 PM as well as from 6:30 AM to 7:30 AM throughout the Fair for loading or unloading only. Mounted riders, please respect pedestrian traffic and heavy equipment.
- 4. Entries close on AUGUST 12, 2022. NO POST ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR ANY CLASSES. ENTRY FEES MUST ACCOMPANY ENTRY FORMS. NO PHONE OR FAX ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED. ENTRY FORMS received without fees will not be processed until fees are received and must be received by August 12, 2022.
- Any deficiencies in entries must be cleared in the LIVESTOCK OFFICE BEFORE JUDG-ING BEGINS.
- 6. NOTICE: The State of California allows no medication or drugs that alter the performance of the horse. SHEEP DOG TRIALS

- 1. All dogs must be on a leash when not in arena; if dog gets in arena, it is disqualified.
- 2. A two person judging system will be used with 75 points possible. If score and time are tied, judge's points will be awarded to break the tie.
- 3. Each contestant gets three head of sheep.
- 4. Each contestant is allowed <u>five minutes</u> in the Open, Ranch and Novice Classes. There will be a <u>3 minute</u> time limit in the Junior class.
- 5. Any judge may call a dog off for unnecessary roughness.
- **6. ALL** calls are at the judges' discretion and are **FINAL**.
- 7. All contestants must sign a release form at the bottom of the entry form.
- 8. Value of the sheep is set at \$250.00 per head.
- 9. There will be an order in which handler and dog show, posted at the arena.
- 10. All dogs that unnecessarily and improperly grip sheep will be disqualified.
- OPEN ADVANCED: Dog and handler team has competed in open level sheep or cattle trials, or anyone who is up for a challenge. Handler must stay in one designated area to command dog, until which time the dog has the sheep through the chute, the handler may then move to the pen to shut the gate.
- MODOC COUNTY JUNIOR: Junior under 16. May be accompanied by a parent orguardian.
- RANCH DOG: Handler and dog that does not show on a regular basis. Handler may help the dog. Handler must have one foot in the tire until sheep pass through each obstacle.
- NOVICE: A dog that has never been shown, handler may help the dog through all the phases of the course. Once shown in the Novice Class, the dog must advance to the Ranch Class.

AWARDS:

- Saddle Certificate to High Point Contestant
- Cash Awards and Buckles in Each Event

RANCHERS DAY — OFFICIAL RULES

- 1. Payout on the Saddle Certificate to the high point contestant be 65/35. Money and buckles in each event. Number of payouts in each event depends on entries.
- No Training on horses while in the arena. All saddle horns must be slick (Latigo leather, mule or elk hide only) for <u>all</u> events. No rubber, rope or wet wraps. Except Jr Branding.
- 3. Any unnecessary roughness or abuse of <u>any</u> animal in <u>any event</u> will result in elimination of the team in that event. Pull up rule applies.
- 4. The judge's and/or Arena Director's decision is final. **No Exceptions.**
- 5. Junior are 17 years old & under as of Jan 1st, 2022.
- No refunds after yourentries have been accepted.
 Entries must be postmarked by <u>August 15, 2022</u>.

 No entries will be accepted afterthe draw has been completed.
- 7. If any cattle leave the arena, the clocks will stop and the contestant/team will continue their run as a lap-n-tap **unless** it is declared unnecessary roughness and the contestant/team is disqualified, or the judge awards a new animal.



SADDLE RULES

Eligibility: Saddle will be awarded to the high point contestant. Eligibility requires the contestant to:

- A. Enter and compete in the Ranch Horse Class
- B. Additional points will be awarded for Ranch Cutting, Cow Horse, and the 3 teamed events: Sorting, Doctoring and Open Branding

Points: Points towards saddle will be awarded for top 5 placings in each event only.

Tie Breaker: The tie-breaker will be the Ranch Horse Class. If there is still a tie the saddle certificatewill be split equally.

Multiple Entries: You can enter more than once, but you must declare which horse / team you willbe using for your saddle points. If you do not notify the office prior to the event starting, you will receive points on your lowest scoring horse / team. Multiple team entries must have 2 different teammembers in each entry.

RANCH CUTTING

- 1. This class is judged on the ability of the horse to work a cow by separating it from the herd, driving it to the middle of the arena and holding it to demonstrate the horse's ability to work the cow. A single numbered cow is cut from the herd and the horse must demonstrate its ability to work that cow.
- 2. The objective will be to cut one designated cow from the herd and work the cow with the assistance of two turn-back riders and two herd holders.
- 3. Cattle to be located at one end of the arena. Designated cattle will be clearly marked with numbers. Cattle numbers will be drawn after class is closed and prior to class starting.
- 4. There will be a 2 & 1/2-minute limit. There will be a 1-minute time notification and a buzzer for completion notification.
- 5. Each exhibitor must work two head. The rider must work the designated cows within the 2 & 1/2-minute time limit.
- 6. Time will start when the rider crosses a time line just prior to entering the herd.
- 7. The rider will then quietly separate his/her numbered cow from the herd.
- 8. Credit will be given to those horses who demonstrate excellence in the herd work, driving and setting up thecow to cut, working in the center of the arena and degree of difficulty of the cow drawn, within the 2-1/2- minute limit.

Rancher's Day (cont'd)

SCORING

- 1 Point Penalty—toe, foot or stirrup on the shoulder; working out of position
- 3 Point Penalty losing working advantage; cattle picked up or scattered; spurring on the shoulder; pawing or biting cattle; working on back fence
- 5 Point Penalty quitting cow; losing cow
- 0 Score illegal equipment; excessive disturbance of the herd to the point that the exhibitor is asked to leave the arena; two hands on the reins except when exhibiting a junior horse in either a snaffle or a hackamore
- 100 percent will be judged on the horse's performance and natural ability.
- The horse will not be penalized for being reined during the cutting portion but should display natural ability.
- Unnecessary roughness or disturbing the herd excessively could result in a disqualification.
- Contestants are responsible for their own two herd holders and two turn back riders.
- If the number of cattle permits, the judge may, at his discretion, award new cattle to enable for a contestant to show his horse's ability.
- Bridles and Bits: Any bit is legal provided nothing extends below the bars of the bit. A bridle is defined as a curbed, shanked bit. Must use a leather curb strap. Contestants will not be allowed to use any device that gives him/her undue control over the horse such as:
 - * Tie Downs
 - * Mechanical Hackamores, Quick Stops, etc.
 - Martingales
 - * Nothing may be around the horse's nose
 - * Gag Bits
 - * Wire on the Curb Device or any part of the Bit or Headstall.
 - * Bits must be free of mechanical device
 - * Nothing extending below the bars of the bits
- The judge may ask any contestant to drop a bridle after a run is completed.

JUNIOR PENNING

- 1. A three Junior (17 & under as of Jan 1, 2021) team will pen 3 head of cattle out of a designated group of cattle.
- 2. There will be three groups of numbered cattle 0-9, for a total of thirty head.
- 3. The arena will be in 1/3 areas.
- 4. One rider in the herd at a time.
- 5. The rider must sort the designated number called by the announcer and bring cattle out of herd between two barrels. No more than 4 head of cattle can be past the barrel line at one time.

- 6. Any undesignated cattle must be returned to the herd 1/3 of the arena before the contestants' time is stopped.
- 7. There will be a 3-minute time limit. The Announcer will give a 30 second warning before your time is up. After the warning, contestants may choose to pen less head.
- 8. Extra cattle have to be returned to the herd before the team can receive a time.

JUNIOR SORTING

- 1. A three Junior (17 & under as of Jan 1, 2021) team will sort cattle out of a designated group of cattle.
- 2. There will be three groups of numbered cattle 0-9, for a total of thirty head.
- 3. One rider in the herd at a time.
- 4. The rider must sort the designated number called by the announcer and bring cattle out of herd between two (2) barrels, then continue to sort the next consecutive number.
- 5. Any cattle not going between the barrels stops your time. Any wrong numbered cattle crossing the line of two barrels in either direction stops the teams' time.
- 6. The most cattle out in the fastest time win. There will be a 3-minute time limit.

TEAM SORTING

- 1. A 4-man team will sort cattle out of a designated group of cattle.
- 2. There will be three groups of numbered cattle 0-9, for a total of thirty head.
- 3. One rider in the herd at a time.
- 4. The rider must sort the designated number called by the announcer and bring cattle out of herd between two barrels then continue to sort the next consecutive number. Any cattle not going between the barrels, stops your time.
- 5. Any wrong numbered cattle crossing the line of two barrels stops the teams' time. The most cattle out in the fastest time, wins. There will be a 3-minute time limit.

TEAM DOCTORING

- 1. Ranch doctoring is a 4-man event with a 2-minute time limit.
- 2. The arena will have two barrels at about 1/3 of the arena.
- 3. Riders will cut ONE of the designated numbered cattle out of the herd. Designated cow may only be cut from the herd and removed between two barrels.
- 4. Only one person in the herd at a time.
- 5. Header cannot throw loop until cow has passed though the barrels.
- 6. Designated cow may not return to the herd once brought through the barrels, if the cow returns past the barrels, you get no time.

Rancher's Day (cont'd)

- 7. Legal head catches only; neck or neck and one front foot. Figure eight is OK on one front leg but not two.
- 8. Illegal head catch may not be dallied.
- 9. The vets may leave their horses after header and heeler face. The vets then set the ropes (both front and hind feet) and place a caulk mark on the cow between its eyes.
- 10. The time starts when the drawn number is given and the flag is dropped.
- 11. No more than 4 loops can be used, one loop per rider.
- 12. The vet will raise both hands to signal end of time.
- 13. You can and will be flagged out for any unnecessary roughness.
- 14. Arena Directors decision are final.

JUNIOR/SENIOR BRANDING

- 1. Junior must be 17 and under as of Jan. 1st, 2021.
- 2. 2 Junior horseback and 2 Seniors on the ground.
- 3. 2 calves will be paint branded as specified by the Arena Director.
- 4. Time starts when team is ready and flags drop.5-minute time limit.
- 5. Calf must be headed then heeled.
- 6. Legal head catch is head or head and one front leg.
- 7. Ground crew may assist in removing illegal head catches and hazing cattle to keep calves from wrapping around a horse.
- 8. As soon as calf is headed and heeled, the ground crew may leave designated area; throw calf and place head rope on both front feet and heel rope on both hind feet.
- 9. The ground crewmust be back in the designated area after each calf is branded. Time stops when the last calf is branded and the brand is in the bucket.
- 10. Arena director and flaggers have final say on any disputes.
- 11. Team will be disqualified if brand is on the wrong side upside down, or in the wrong place. Rubber ok.

OPEN BRANDING

- 1. Each team will be required to brand 4 calves.
- 2. Time starts when team is ready, there will be a 6-minute time limit.
- Each roper will head and heel a calf and work the ground.
- 4. Head catches must be head, head with one front leg, figure eight is OK on one but not two front feet.
- 5. After 2 head are branded, the team members will change places.
- 6. Calf must be headed before heeler can make his catch. The heeler may catch one or both hind feet.
- 7. The ground crew may assist in removing illegal catches or dropped ropes but must return to the designated area before another loop is thrown.

- 8. As soon as calf is headed and heeled, ground crew may leave designated area, throw calf, place head rope on both front feet and, if necessary, place heel rope on both hind feet.
- 9. You may carry the iron with you. The iron can not touch the ground and the calf can't be branded until all 4 four feet are stretched. All four feet must remain in the stretched ropes while brand is placed on calf.
- 10. Ground crew must return to the designated area after each calf is "branded".
- 11. Brand must be properly placed. A misplaced, upside down, or backwards brand will be a disqualification.
- 12. On the last calf, after the brand is placed, the ground man returns to the designated area and puts the iron in the bucket for time.
- 13. If any roper falls from his horse, ground crew can only grab rope to avoid accident. Calf then has to be released, and if roper is able to remount with no equipment failures, then he can re-rope his designated end and team run can be completed.
- 14. Arena director and timers have the final say on any disputes.
- 15. A 30 second penalty will be assessed for each infraction of the above rules.
- 16. Multiple entries allowed but teams must have 2 different teammates for each new entry.

MIXED BRANDING

- 1. Each team will consist of 2 men and 2 woman which will be required to brand 2 calves.
- 2. Time starts when team is ready, there will be a 4-minute time limit.
- 3. 1 man and 1 woman must rope. Head catches must be a head, head with one front leg or figure eight is OK on one but not two front feet.
- 4. Calf must be headed before heeler can make his catch. The heeler may catch one or both hind feet.
- 5. The ground crew may assist in removing illegal catches or dropped ropes but must return to the designated area before another loop is thrown.
- 6. As soon as calf is headed and heeled, ground crew may leave designated area, throw calf, place head rope on both front feet and, if necessary, place heel rope on both hind feet.
- 7. You may carry the iron with you. The iron can not touch the ground and the calf can't be branded until all 4 four feet are stretched. All four feet must remain in the stretched ropes while brand is placed on calf.
- 8. Ground crew must return to the designated area after each calf is "branded".
- 9. Brand must be properly placed. A misplaced, upside down, or backwards brand will be a disqualification.
- 10. On the last calf, after the brand is placed, the ground crew returns to the designated area and puts the iron in the bucket for time.

Rancher's Day (cont'd)

- 11. If any roper falls from his horse, ground crew can only grab rope to avoid accident. Calf then has to be released, and if roper is able to remount with no equipment failures, then he can re-rope his designated end and team run can be completed.
- 12. Arena director and timers have the final say on any disputes.
- 13. A 30 second penalty will be assessed for each infraction of the above rules.
- 14. You can enter twice, but you must switch.

RANCH HORSE

- 1. One animal will be turned into the arena, you must work cow unless judge calls for a new cow. A new cow will only be given at judge's discretion.
- 2. Reining cow horse (NRCHA) rules will apply, there will be no fingers allowed between the reins.
- 3. Horse and rider must box the cow at the same end of arena to show horse's cow sense.
- 4. Contestant will then allow cow to run at least 2/3 length of arena (announcer stand side), and make one good turn each way on the fence.
- 5. Rider will drive animal to put in the pen.
- 6. Rope can be taken down and loop built anytime after second turn on the fence and rider has declared himself to be pushing the cow towards the pen.
- 7. After releasing cow from the pen rider will rope animal around the neck or neck with one front foot, dally and stop cow and have cow face up, only two loops can be thrown.
- 8. The rider with rope still on, returns the animal to the catch pen.
- 9. There will be a 2 ½ minute time limit. The time will stop when the cow is roped and faced up.
- 10. Hackamore or ring snaffles can use two hands; all others must use one hand on the reins.
- 11. If the first loop is missed, there will be a 5 point deduction, if the second loop in missed you are disqualified
- 12. If the rider touches the ground or the rider loses his/her rope, it is a no time.
- 13. The rider must use the same rope he starts with.
- 14. Fence work 60- 80 points. Roping score 60-80 points. Points will be combined for a final score. Pull up rule applies.
- 15. A leather curb strap is required for the ranch horse class.



JUNIOR RANCH HORSE

- 1. One animal will be turned into the arena, you must work cow unless judge calls for a new cow. A new cow will only be given at judge's discretion.
- 2. Horse and rider must box the cow at the same end of arena to show horse's cow sense.
- 3. No fence work is required. Rider will drive animal to put in the pen.
- 4. Rope can be taken down and loop built once the rider has declared himself to be pushing the cow towards the pen.
- 5. After releasing cow from the pen, rider will rope animal around the neck or neck with one front foot, dally and stop cow and have cow face up, only two loops can be thrown.
- 6. There is no penalty if you don't rope the cow. There will be 5 points added if you do rope the cow.
- 7. The rider with rope still on, returns the animal to the catch pen.
- 8. There will be a 2 ½ minute time limit. The time will stop when the cow is roped and faced up or penned and the rider declares that he/she is not roping the animal.
- 9. Judges will score between 60-80 points.
- 10. Hackamore or ring snaffles can use two hands; all others must use one hand on the reins.
- 11. If the rider touches the ground, it is a no time.
- 12. The rider must use the same rope he starts with.
- 13. A leather curb strap is required for the ranch horse class.

WORKING COW HORSE

- 1. No Dry work. No time limit.
- 2. At the start of the work each contestant, will select a cow from the herd, shall hold that cow on the prescribed end of the arena for a sufficient time to demonstrate the ability of the horse to contain the cow at that end.
- 3. Riders are allowed to select a second cow before going down the fence.
- 4. After a reasonable amount of time, the contestant shall take the cow down the fence (announcer stand side), making at least one turn each way on the fence.
- 5. Then the contestant shall take the cow to an open part of the arena and circle the animal at least once in each direction.
- 6. The required pattern for the cow work is: boxing, fence turns, and circles, in that order.
- 7. If the cow drawn is unreasonably difficult or unworkable, only the judge may award a new cow.
- 8. Once a rider has committed to circling a cow, if the cow falls down no new cow will be awarded.
- 9. The rider should complete the run by riding around the fallen cow to fulfill circling requirements.
- 10. NRCHA rules apply. No fingers between your reins. No slipping of your reins.
- 11. 60-80 points.
- 12. Pull up rule applies.

- Any regular electric standard size Power Wheel is allowed for the DERBY with the following restrictions: no "wedge" body styles, no ATV, quad, motorcycle etc. type vehicles allowed; child's legs must be in a compartment; any vehicle deemed to be unsafe for any reason will not be allowed to compete; decisions of officials are final. No modifications unless expressly stated in
- 2. Other Power Wheel body styles (i.e., wedge body styles, ATVs, quads, motorcycles) and/or non-motorized (bikes, scooters, etc.)may enter the OBSTACLE COURSE portion only, at the discretion of officials.
- 3. Kids 3-10 years of age may participate. There are two age groups: 3-5 and 6-10. Derby classes to be set by officials.


