## Corn Meal Muffins

## FLOUR BLEND FOR USE IN MUFFINS

You can make the flour blend ahead of time, and keep a jar of it pre-mixed. It can be used as a substitute for all-purpose flour in cakes, cookies, and muffins. When using it as a substitute, add $3 / 4$ tsp. of xanthan gum per cup of flour mixture.
1 1/2 C Sorghum flour
1 1/2 C corn starch or potato starch
1 C tapioca starch

## CORN MEAL MUFFIN RECIPE

2 eggs 1 C gluten free cornmeal

3/4 C milk
1/4 C canola oil
1 tbsp apple cider vinegar OR lemon juice
3/4 C flour blend (recipe above)

1 C gluten free cornmeal $1 / 4 C$ sugar
2 tsp baking powder
$11 / 2$ tsp xanthan gum
1 tsp salt
(Optional: 3/4 C grated cheese, 2 tsp. crushed rosemary)

- Preheat oven to 350. Line muffin tins with 12 muffin papers.
- In medium bowl, beat the eggs until yellow and frothy, about 30 seconds. Add the remaining wet ingredients and beat until well blended.
- In a separate bowl, combine all dry ingredients, gradually mix into wet ingredients until thoroughly blended. If adding cheese, add it once the other ingredients are mostly mixed.
- Spoon into muffin cups.
- Bake 20-25 minutes for muffins, or until lightly browned.


## Apple Cinnamon Muffins <br> Dry Ingredients

1/3 C sugar 1 C rice flour
1 tsp baking powder
$3 / 4$ tsp salt
$1 / 2$ tsp baking soda
Wet Ingredients
2 eggs
3 tbsp Canola Oil
Flavorings
1 apple, grated
1tsp cinnamon

- Combine the dry ingredients in a bowl.
- Mix the wet ingredients in another bowl and add the dry ingredients.
- Add flavorings and stir.
- Put into greased muffin tins and bake at 350 *F until golden and firm to the touch, 15-18 minutes.


## Gluten Free Chocolate Chip Cookies

$1 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ butter
$1 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ white sugar
1 tsp vanilla
1 tbsp gluten free corn starch
1 tsp gluten free baking powder
6 oz. chocolate chips
$1 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ brown sugar
2 eggs
$1 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ plus 1 tbsp soya flour
$1 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ brown rice flour
$1 / 4$ tsp salt

- Cream butter and sugars together.
- Add eggs and vanilla beating until fluffy.
- Sift together dry ingredients and add to egg mixture, stir to mix ingredients.
- Fold in 6oz. chocolate chips.
- Drop by teaspoonful onto a greased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for approx. 13 minutes.
- Cookies should be golden and crispy on the outside and chewy on inside.


## Garbanzo Bean Brownies

$11 / 4$ C dark chocolate chips
2 tsp vanilla extract
1 can garbanzo beans, rinsed and drained
2 eggs
$1 ⁄ 2$ C packed brown sugar
$1 / 4$ tsp cinnamon
$1 / 2$ tsp baking powder

2 tbsp cacao powder
$1 / 2$ tsp salt
Confectioner's Sugar for garnish, optional
1 tbsp coconut oil

- Add chocolate chips to small saucepan and heat over medium low. When the chips begin to melt on the bottom, slowly stir with a spoon until chips are completely melted. Set melted chocolate aside.
- Preheat oven to 325 degrees.
- Add all ingredients (except chocolate) to a blender and blend until completely smooth.
- Add the melted chocolate and blend until combined. The batter will be very thick.
- Line an 8 " $x 8^{\prime \prime}$ baking dish with parchment paper. Pour the brownie batter into the dish and smooth with a knife. The batter will not change form very much, so make sure it appears the way you want it to.
- Bake brownies for 28 to 30 minutes and test the center with a toothpick to be sure they're cooked all the way through.
- Allow brownies to cool a few minutes then pull the edges of the parchment paper to remove the whole brownie block and set it on a cutting board. Use a sharp knife to cut brownies and garnish with powdered sugar if desired.

## Chocolate Chip Cookies

$21 / 4$ C all-purpose flour
1 pkg . instant vanilla pudding mix
1 tsp baking soda
1 C butter, softened
2 eggs
1 tsp vanilla extract
$3 / 4$ C packed brown sugar
2 C semi-sweet chocolate chips
$1 / 4$ C white sugar

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees, sift together the flour and baking soda, set aside.
- In a large bowl, cream together the butter, brown sugar and white sugar. Beat in the instant pudding mix until blended. Stir in the eggs and vanilla. Blend in the flour mixture. Finally, stir in the chocolate chips.
- Drop the cookies by rounded spoonful onto ungreased cookie sheets.
- Bake for 10 to 12 minutes in the preheated oven. Edges should be golden brown.


## Spider Cookies

1 C semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 C butterscotch chipits
$21 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ Chinese Noodles (not crushed)

- Put both types of chipits in large bowl. Microwave on high 2 minutes or until mixture is smooth when stirred.
- Add Chinese noodles and stir to coat well.
- Drop by spoonful on waxed paper. Press 1 miniature marshmallow on cookie to represent the head.
- Chill.


## Coffee Mug Cake

Mix 2 cake mixes together in a large Ziploc bag - 1 must be angel food mix.
To bake: add 3tbsp of the cake mix to 2 tbsp water in a microwaveable mug. Stir well.
Microwave for 1 min . Let rest for 15 min to cool down. Run a knife around mug and turn upside down. Use your imagination on the flavours - chocolate, spice, banana, strawberry, lemon, red velvet, etc.

## Unbaked Chocolate Drop Cookies

$1 ⁄ 2$ C butter
2 C white sugar
$1 / 2$ C milk
3 C rolled oats

1 C coconut
6 tbsp cocoa
1 tsp vanilla
dash of salt

- Put butter, white sugar and milk in saucepan, cook for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and add remaining ingredients.
- Drop by the spoonful on waxed paper and let cool.


## Peanut Butter Cookies

1 C unsalted butter
1 C crunchy peanut butter
1 C white sugar
1 C packed brown sugar
2 eggs
$21 / 2 \mathrm{C}$ all-purpose flour
1 tsp baking powder
$1 / 2$ tsp salt
1 ½ tsp baking soda

- Cream butter, peanut butter and sugars together in a bowl; beat in eggs.
- In a separate bowl, sift flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt; stir into butter mixture. Put dough in refrigerator for 1 hour.
- Roll dough into 1 inch balls and put on baking sheets. Flatten each ball with a fork, making a crisscross pattern.
- Bake in a preheated 375 degree oven for about 10 minutes or until cookies begin to brown.
