Love Is Hard

There's an old story about a Texas rancher who went to see his pastor one day. "Reverend," the rancher said, "I need to get a dee-vorce from my wife." (This story will work better if you read it out loud in your best Texas drawl.)

Taken aback, the preacher asked, "Why do want a divorce?" "Well, preacher, it's like this: I just don't love her anymore."

Scratching his chin, the preacher responded, "You do realize that according to the Word of God, you are commanded to love your wife. It says so in Ephesians 5:25, 'Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her."

The rancher didn't expect that. Stammering, he said, "Preacher, you don't understand. We're way past that. There's just no affection anymore. I just can't love her the way a man is supposed to love his wife."

"Is that so?" the preacher asked. "As it turns out, the Bible also commands you to 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' If you can't love her as your wife, then you have to love her as your neighbor."

Now the rancher was really befuddled. "But Reverend, I can't love her as my neighbor. We don't get along at all. We bicker and fight all the time. I just can't love her as my neighbor."

"Then you have no choice," the preacher said. "The Bible also says in Matthew 5:44 to 'Love your enemies.' If you can't love her as your wife and you can't love her as your neighbor, then you have to love her as your enemy."

We tend to toss around the word "love" rather easily. We forget that love is hard; that's underscored in the story of the Texas rancher. Love was hard for him, even went it meant loving someone that he used to love. Biblical love is especially hard. Love drove Jesus to the cross where he suffered a cruel death just because he loved us. In return, he expects us to love one another. "A new command I give you," Jesus says in John 13:34. "Love one another." God expects us to love people who are radically different from us, people of different color, or gender, or beliefs. God expects us to love people who are otherwise unlovable. Anyone can love their friends; Jesus calls us to love people we hate. "As I have loved you," Jesus says, "so you must love one another. (Continued on page 2)

Join Our "Bucket Brigade"

We had an excellent response to our Advent Buckets with proceeds going to Heifer International as we raised \$2,245 for this excellent ministry. With the arrival of Lent, you will have another chance to fill them with your spare change, only this time, proceeds will be directed to another vital missions endeavor: our United Methodist Connectional Ministries and Benevolence Fund.

As a United Methodist Church, Aledo contributes a set amount of money every year to our denomination at both the regional and the global level. The regional level is the Illinois Great Rivers Conference which encompasses roughly all of Illinois south of Interstate 80.

The funds we contribute are called *apportionments* and they fall into two categories. The first is *Clergy Support and Administration* which essentially pays for our denominational "overhead." It's not quite as glamorous as some of the more visible work The United Methodist Church is doing to combat hunger, share the good news of Jesus Christ, or raise up new leaders to develop innovative solutions to the challenges facing our world today. But, guided by God's Spirit, it is the oil that lubricates these gears moving the church's work forward to impact hearts and lives. Without it, the lifegiving work of The United Methodist Church simply wouldn't be possible.

The second category is called *Benevolences and Connectional Ministries* and it includes missions and outreach ministries within our Conference and beyond. For 2024, the Conference budget for this category is \$3.6 million; Aledo's portion of that total is \$13,956 or \$1,163 per month.

This year, we want to get a head start on this apportionment, so we've set a goal for our Lenten buckets: with your help, we've set a Silver Goal of \$1,164, or one month's apportionments for Benevolences and Connectional Ministries. Our Gold Goal is \$2,326, or two month's apportionments.

Benevolences and Connectional Ministries supports congregational development, Wesley Foundations on Illinois campuses, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), Africa University, and the Black College Fund, to list just a few ministries.

Buckets will be distributed beginning on Sunday, February 11. You may also pick up you Lenten bucket at our Ash Wednesday service, 6 pm on February 14.

Please return your buckets on Easter Sunday, March 31.

It is one of the ways the we are able to connect people to Jesus Christ and Mike was a big part in making it happen.

Mike also is an active member of the AUMC Mission Team. He participates in many of

their projects throughout the year Some examples include making of the rice meals, providing meals to the County Fair workers, and entertaining Vashti residents with his guitar playing. Mike also spearheaded the mission team's restocking of the food pantry for the month of January.

Mike certainly practices Jesus' command to "love your neighbor". He has a heart for Jesus and for people that he knows and those he hasn't met. Mike has provided transportation to doctor's appointments and to people's houses, helped people move, picked up limbs in people's yards, found keys in the snow and many others acts of kindness that we will never know because Mike does all of this with a smile on his face and never

• Sunday, February 11 following the 9:15 service. All proceeds will be directed to this summer's mission trip July 21-26.






Tuesday Morning Bible Study
