

On behalf of generous donors, the National Council of Catholic Women of which we are an affiliate recently made the following donations: Catholic Relief Services for Water for Life (\$4,470); Refugee Women Emergency Fund (\$375); Madonna Plan (\$2,514); Help-a-Child Fund (\$613); and the General Fund (\$1,117) – for a total of \$9,089. Also, as so many individuals were generous in support of the Vocation Purse Club, a check for \$32,362 was sent to the National Fund for Catholic Religious Vocations.

As a reminder, during our 2019 DCCW Convention, donations from the Cathedral Mass collection allowed us to send \$1,035 each to the following: NCCW's Vocation Purse Club, Cathedral of the Madeleine; and the Fisher House for Veterans SLC.

Greetings My Dear Sisters in Christ,

It doesn't seem possible but convention was over five months ago, and here we are in late September. Speaking of convention I want to thank all who brought stamps. We got so many it was very heart warming. We recently received a thank you for our donation. It read:

"Thank you so much! Your donation of stamps, which benefit our Ministry with the Poor, has been gratefully received. These donations make possible stories like the one below. I hope you will take a few moments to see what you are helping to achieve in India. Your prayers for our sisters and those to whom they minister are deeply appreciated. May you continue to have a safe and happy end of summer!" It was signed by Sister M. Jane Chantal (Method), CSC Manager, Stamp Room. Some of you may know Sister Chantal as she served in Utah for a time and truly enjoyed her stay here.

The story Sister wrote about was regarding Our Lady of the Holy Cross School in Barakathal, India. The school began in 2012 when a group of Holy Cross sisters agreed to assist the teachers in the local village school. Over time the sisters were asked to open their own school. In 2014 the students moved to their new facility. The school is open to both girls and boys. Today there are more than 350 children in nursery, and kindergarten through grade 9. Enrollment is expected to continue to grow. "We offer deepest thanks to all those who have assisted this young school's development as it endeavors to deliver an outstanding Catholic, Holy Cross education of both mind and heart."

Please continue to help the Stamp Ministry. Here are some hints:

The cancelled stamps on your incoming mail can help the Sisters of the Holy Cross Ministry with the Poor. Save stamps that have their perforation intact, are not too heavily canceled, and are not torn, cut or stained. Leave at least ¼ inch on each side of the stamp when cutting it from the envelope." Some of the good stamps are U.S. off or on paper, especially commemorative stamps. Foreign stamps off or on paper. Anyone with an album collection you would like to donate is most welcome.

Stamps that are plentiful and have little or no resale value are:

U.S. flag stamps, liberty bell and fireworks stamps. Also U.S nonprofit and presort. Recent low denomination stamps from fund-raising appeals like the 1 cent with fruit, the 5 cent with blackberries and the 10 cent with red pears.

So become a Stamp Minister. Start saving now, convention is only 7 months away. Happy stamping!



EASTERN DEANERY







LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION

This summer has consisted of the Interim Session of the Legislature until they begin the formal General Session of Utah Legislature in January 2020. Some of the interim topics included the Medicaid Expansion with the lack of federal support for funding it, the medical marijuana debate regarding the ballot initiatives the public voted on, and the tax overhaul bill. There is talk about placing tax on services rendered, as well as food tax, which would place an unfair burden on people in poverty. Utah education has taken a toll since more than \$4 billion has been taken out of the general fund since 2012, when the Legislature began earmarking a large and growing portion out of the state sales tax for transportation.

According to Jean Hill's 9/23/19 Prayer & Action Network: As the Catholic Church prepares to celebrate the World Day of Migrants and Refugees on September 29th, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops reminds us of "Pope Francis urging us all to work for a 'globalization of solidarity' with refugees, not a globalization of 'indifference. In light of refugees' extraordinary contributions to our country, and of the world's struggle with the greatest forced displacement crisis on record and historic highs in religious persecution, we categorically oppose any further reductions in the refugee resettlement program."

In reference to the September 20 *Intermountain Catholic* newspaper, "The leaders of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops stated that admitting fewer refugees 'runs counter' to U.S. values. A proposal to reduce the number of refugee admissions to the United States to fewer than 30,000 "would be wholly counter to our values as a nation of immigrants," said the president of U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and the chair of the bishops Committee on Migration. In recent years, the U.S. has accepted between 50,000 to 75,000 refugees per year. The number was capped at 45,000 after Trump became president in 2017 and was scaled back to 30,000 for fiscal year 2019.

In addressing conflicts the country is going through, Archbishop Wester from Santa Fe stated, "Examples abound: bullying on the internet, personal ad hominem attacks by politicians, shaming on social media, hundreds of killings each year, racial hatred and violence, technology breaking down the bonds that unite us, addictions that isolate and fragment families, mental illness born of poverty and addiction, nationalism, as well as egoism." He would like to have people join in the goodwill as pilgrims seeking healing among others. He has called for a "pilgrimage of conversion" to start from Sept. 14, the Feast of Exhalation of the Holy Cross, through April 20,2020, which is Good Friday. He said, "Many young have lost sight of the sacred, many old have forgotten to behold the holy. Now, more than ever, we must seek the hand of God, who heals our wounds - in our homes, in our society, and in our church". For more information see www.dioslc.org and www.le.utah.gov.
