January 6, 2019 Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord Mt 2:1-12

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Happy Epiphany! What a word! Epiphany refers to the experience of insight that cartoonists draw into their scene boxes by the sudden appearance of a light bulb over the head of a cartoon character. The light bulb signifies the character has had a revelation, that he/she gets the point, and has a great idea! They see the light! Two favorite writers of mine (both Catholic) James Joyce and Flannery O'Connor are known for creating 'epiphanies' in their stories by having characters undergo experiences like conversions that bring them to see something entirely new, or something old in a completely new way. As Steven Tyler sings it, 'It's amazing, in the blink of an eye, you finally see the light'. If we take a minute to think back, I'm sure we have all had such experiences. Maybe ours was not as dramatic as St Paul's 'seeing the light' was that led him into a 180 degree turn in life (read about it in Acts 9:3).

We have 'epiphanies' everyday. Again, some of them may be big lifechanging ones, but many of them are probably common such as being surprised and seeing for the first time something that has been there all along. Like discovering a new use for some practical household item that we have overlooked, like when we realize that a paper bag we might want throw away can be used to speed up their ripening. Or here is a silly example, but one that really opened my eyes to stop judging others and their habits. I had a boss who was a big whistler in the workshop. I coped pretty well but some of my coworkers went crazy over his irritating whistling. When he was driving me to a work site one time, he said, "You know why I wear hard heeled boots and whistle all the time..... I am giving you guys advance notice that I am entering the building, so just in case you are piddling away, you can get back to work without us having a scene." That little piece of information gave me great insight into the man. He wasn't whistling to get on anybody's nerves. He was simply announcing his presence, which also had the benefit of helping his workers watch their mouths from saying something about their boss they shouldn't be saying. This personal insight can happen all the time if we look more carefully into situations or ask about persons and their circumstances. Suddenly, sometimes the smallest piece of information can reset or recast your entire view of something or someone. All the time, our prejudices and pre-judgements set us up to be so off-the-mark when it comes to really knowing what is going on. And when we take time to look closer or inquire into the situation, whole new worlds open before us. We can imagine deeper, more personally significant examples of such re-orientations in our approach to other people and events. In addition to being a great coping skill, such insights also lead us to be more constructive and creative people. New information we attune ourselves to, and new experiences we acquire bring greater peace and ease about circumstances too. By looking more closely, or listening attentively to people, we respond better to whatever bothers us. Have you ever asked, "What's with that?" about someone's habits or their compulsive actions, their anxiety or their humor that might bother us? Praying about it and trying to understand them keeps us humble, and often leads us to ask "What about ourselves?" What personal insight might we gain about a problem by looking at ourselves?

Okay, but what about today's gospel? The wise men might never have showed up if they didn't notice and pursue the novelty light in the sky. Nor would they have arrived at Bethlehem, without the conversations with Herod and his priests, and I even ask if they would have arrived precisely at the manger without running into and spending time with the shepherds along the hills at night as they entered the region? Pope Benedict XVI wrote that "God reveals man to himself" (Caritas et Veritate #75). The Feast of Epiphany reveals that God was born among us, human, to reveal us to ourselves. God shows us ourselves. What we don't understand about ourselves and others, God can show us. St Paul says in 1 Thessalonians 5:5 "For all of you are children of the light", so to be guided by Him, we must look up, look beyond and look out!
