As I look forward to Easter this year, I was thinking back on my childhood and celebrations of Easter as I grew up. Often, one of the things that we would do, as many did back at the time, was to get a new outfit for Easter each year. This varied a bit for us, depending on how finances were going for our family, but I do remember that most years, we'd at least end up getting a new shirt, or something else to wear on Easter. I remember in particular one year my father ended up getting a new sport coat to wear on Easter, one that he would wear that year and many following years. The reason I remember it was because of the color: it was bright pink! I never particularly cared for it, but it was something that he appreciated having and wearing for many years.

One of the other things that I remember is watching old biblical movies on Easter that were being shown on television. Now, this was back before we had cable. Indeed, I still remember looking forward to Annual Conference each year in part because it meant we'd have access to cable tv in the hotel for a week! So, without cable, we were limited to the small number of broadcast channels – basically the major networks (ABC, NBC, CBS, Fox, and PBS). It seemed for many years that on at least one of these channels each year there would be one of the old classic movies like Ben Hur or The Ten Commandments on Sunday afternoon, the day of Easter. We'd often end up putting one of these movies on when we got home from a long morning on Easter Sunday, usually after a Sunrise service, breakfast, and then regular worship service. I came to enjoy this, and still enjoy many of those old movies. Even after we finally got a VCR, when this practice seemed to be dying off from the broadcast channels, we'd often still put one of those old movies on to watch again on Easter.

I still often find myself watching movies based on Jesus, or other biblical themes, around the time of Easter. Most years, I make time in the run up to Easter to watch at least one or two of them, and sometimes more. It's been a few years since I've watched Ben Hur (mainly because it is so long), but will often watch other movies like *The Cotton Patch Gospel* (which I mentioned recently in one of my sermons), or *Jesus Christ Superstar* (sometimes, even multiple versions – it's one of my favorites, so have two different versions on DVD at home, as well as the original album on vinyl), or sometimes others.

I find this often helps me to begin to see the events leading up to Easter in a different way than simply reading through the Gospel accounts again, though that is still important! If you take nothing else from this article, at least take this: read through at least one version of the Easter story in the Gospels each year, and perhaps even read all four accounts. But there's something about watching the story on video that makes it more real to me. And even in the years before we had movies, many found that they wanted to get a view of what it may have looked like – there's a long tradition in Europe of what are called passion plays, which are re-enactments of the last week of Jesus' life that were put on across the continent. In fact, when I went out to National Youth Conference in 1998, one of our stops on the way was to attend a passion play on

the way out there. There's a famous version that is put on in Oberammergau, Germany every ten years that traces its lineage back to the 1600's (like many other things, the decennial play planned in 2020 was postponed due to COVID-19, but it's back on this year).

This desire to see what the story of Jesus' last week may have looked like is one that helps us to understand the enormity of the Good News that we receive each year at Easter: that Jesus was born for us, lived for us, died for us, and was raised for us. This central proclamation is the core of who we are as Christians. Our yearly celebration of Easter reminds us again and again of this important teaching, an important aspect of our faith. Let us, as we prepare for Easter this year, remember again and again that Christ's resurrection enables us to join together in faith, to worship our God together as members of the ongoing body of Christ.

Love Feast information:

This year's Love Feast will be held on Thursday, April 14 at 7PM in the Fellowship Hall. Update on Pastor Doug's schedule for April:

Kay's return to worship:



Hi, my name is Brittany Hartman, and I'm the registrar here at Camp Mack. I wanted to check in as we close in on the opening of Summer Camp and Grand

Camp registration at Camp Mack (Friday, February 25th at 7pm) . In the past, your church has participated in our "church transfer code" system, AKA the gold sheet. This is truly the "gold standard" of registration, so we thank you for your participation.

Church Transfer Codes for 2022:

Wabash CoB

6WAB1 for 50% of camper fees

Things to remember:

Please remind your campers that after registration, they will need to click the "Make Payment" button on the financial tab. The prompt to enter a transfer code will pop up immediately.

Unless your church transfer code is for 100% of camp fees, they will need to pay their deposit to be officially registered (not just enrolled) for camp.

We encourage you to have your campers and their families register and pay online. By using the transfer code, they will know exactly the amount they owe, greatly reducing errors.

We ask that you do not gather camper family payments and submit them on families behalf.

For the church portion, we will email you an invoice to submit to the church for payment. These invoices will begin April 1, 2022 and run monthly through the duration of summer as needed.

If you notice any changes that need to be made to your invoice, please let us know as soon as possible.

National Youth Conference

"Foundational" Colossians 2:5-7 July 23 – 28, 2022 in Fort Collins, Colorado

The registration fee, which includes food, lodging, and programming, will be \$550. Youth who have completed ninth grade through one year of college at the time of NYC (or are age equivalent) and their adult advisors will gather at Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colo. Online registration will open in early 2022 on www.brethren.org.

The cabinet discussed theme ideas relevant to senior high youth. Ultimately, the theme that emerged was "Foundational," based on scripture from Colossians 2:5-7, "For though I am absent in body, yet I am with you in spirit, and I rejoice to see your morale and the firmness of your faith in Christ. As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving."

We talked about all of the ways that God is revealed as the foundation for our lives throughout the Bible. Some examples of this are the cornerstone, the way that God can be seen as an anchor for our lives, and how we remain rooted in God in all circumstances.

We have just received a text from him thanking GG for being able to spend a warm Christmas with his boys, get cleaned up and presentable, and able to start making contacts for construction work in this area. "Thank you so much. You guys really helped me out in a time of need and I will not forget this. I am very thankful and it is not taken for granted." He is now collecting references to give us so that we can pass these along to those needing construction and millwright work. He already has some work lined up.
