Waiting For Easter

On Ash Wednesday we began our journey to the empty tomb. Let's examine what Jesus' ministry was about in order to fully understand the impact of Easter and the risen Christ.

The economic, social and political situation in Galilee was one in which the rich and powerful, be they Romans, priests of the temple, or landowners, oppressed the poor, constantly demanding more in taxes and in crop share. Enter Jesus with his disciples, living and teaching an egalitarian community for all. His followers included women and men, slaves were non-existent, and the group shared whatever resources they possessed...quite the opposite of and challenging to the current social norms of that time. However seemingly insignificant the movement may have been, it posed a threat to the establishment. Therefore, Jesus was crucified, and the disciples were persecuted.

It was during his life that Jesus impacted many who then became his followers. Some stayed with him while others moved on. Why? Because he presented to them both an image of what human love means and also an image of a God separate from and independent of the constrictions of temple religiosity.

These concepts of loving humanity and loving divinity inspired and infused both groups of disciples. For those who stayed with Jesus felt him to be alive in their midst as they continued the community he had created.

It was a mystery beyond understanding and comprehension, but for them a certainty nonetheless. Jesus had lived, died and now lives again. They were convinced that the evil and death manifested on the cross was not the final word. Love overcomes evil and death. Ultimately, everything returns to God who makes all things right.

It was the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost that allowed the followers of Jesus to keep moving forward with dreams of Jesus. These followers shared everything they had to keep moving in the direction that Jesus had instructed them. Like Jesus, they too were fighting an uphill battle. The religious elite, the wealthy and powerful attempted everything in their power to keep the status quo. Jesus' followers would have none of it.

The bottom line...the disciples were re-born while they lived with Jesus, and his death neither deterred nor discouraged them. Instead, they turned to one another and embraced, fully aware in their hearts that he was not only still with them, but also that the newness he embodied embraced the universe. This was the bedrock of their faith and forms the foundation for the day we call Easter.

For us today, we wait for the empty tomb. We travel through the wilderness knowing that our God is with us. As disciples living today, we, too, turn to one another and embrace our faith just as Jesus' followers did long ago moving in the direction Jesus instructed.

Teamwork



In my opinion, this body of people, your church, is a team. Following are some thoughts on teamwork. Mostly borrowed from Rick Warren.

T - Trust

Trust among your team is the glue that holds them together. Trust is essential in producing confidence in each other. Three factors create trust within a team:

Consistency – People will trust you if, time after time, they see you responding in a consistent and reasonable manner. You also need to be readable, in the sense that they need to know where you are coming from in your decisions and responses.

Loyalty – Defend members of your team when they are criticized. Any fact checking should be done later, in private, always assuming the best.

Delegation – When you delegate to your team member, you are telling them: "I trust you!"

E - Economy of Energy

Even the greatest athlete can't go at full speed all of the time. The quickest way to burn out a team is to never let them take a break. Proverbs says "A relaxed attitude lengthens a persons life".

Some ways to promote economy of energy:

Allow for things outside of this team, such as family life and illness. Different team members have different energy levels. Allow for flexibility. Try to make the work fun!

A – Affirmation

Everyone wants affirmation. A smile and a simple word of encouragement can change someone's entire day. Value their ideas. Appreciate their uniqueness. Commend their efforts. Praise their loyalty.

M - Manage Mistakes

The bible says: "Even though a good man fails seven times, he rises again." Mistakes are not failures, they are how we learn. Make new mistakes and try to stop repeating old ones.

W - Weekly (or regular) meetings

Meetings can be formal or informal. Even just a text or call. Information given should be simple and brief: What are we making progress with? What is causing difficulty? What decisions need to be made? I'm thankful for _____?

O - Open Communication

This is the cornerstone of great teamwork. Proverbs says "Reliable communication permits progress." Three barriers to communication are: Presumption, impatience and pride. Don't assume. Be patient. When you think you know all the answers, you become resistant to feedback.

R - Recognition and Reward

The more credit you give to others, the more you develop team spirit. Romans says

"Give honor and respect to all it is due."

K – Keep on Learning

All contributing team members are learners. Proverbs says "The intelligent person is open to new ideas." Encourage your team members to keep growing, developing and learning.




