Foundational Scripture Project

As Brethren, the Bible is a central part of our life together. The group which began the Brethren movement in Schwarzenau, Germany, gathered together for many months as they studied scripture together before they took the radical step of adult baptisms in the Eder River. It was in their shared study of scripture that they found the need and desire to take that first step. Ever since then, as Brethren have gathered together, the centrality of scripture and our joint study of it together has continued.

In thinking about how we can come together to discern our continued journey together in the upcoming year, I have been thinking a lot about the role of scripture in that journey. Every Sunday, we come together in worship to hear and to think about a scripture passage. Our weekly Bible study offers an opportunity for us to dive even more deeply into scripture.

I hope and pray that each of us is taking time to read and study the Bible throughout the year on our own as well. To help with this, in our newsletters this year I will be including a list of daily scripture readings that will help you to read through the entire Bible in a year.

Each of us, of course, has particular scripture passages that speak to us in significant ways. There are passages that we turn to again and again that help to shape our understanding of God and of the church, that build the foundations of our faith. For me, one of the scriptures that has been foundational for me has been Micah 6:8: "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" In my own faith journey, these directions to do justice, love kindness, and humbly walk with God offer me guidance and direction as I seek to follow Jesus. Such familiar and foundational scriptures offer us a bedrock for our faith.

It is important for us to recognize and to study these foundational scriptures that offer us significant direction in our lives. This year, we will be taking time to think deeply and to examine deeply the scriptures that have been important and foundational for us, as individuals and as a congregation.

To help us identify some of these foundational scriptures, on January 26, our worship service will look a bit different. We will spend time that Sunday morning working together to identify scriptures that have been important in our individual lives, as well as for the congregation as a whole. There will be time for discussion and sharing about the scripture passages that are important for you. I will also be working on a way to include input from those who may be unable to come to worship that Sunday. From the discussion that Sunday, we will begin a process by which a list of foundational scriptures for our congregation will be developed. This list will then be published, and will be the basis of a sermon series after Easter.

I am looking forward to getting to hear more about important and foundational scriptures in from each of you. It is my desire to see this be a springboard for us as we consider how we can continue to join together in the work of God in our local community and as we seek to continue to journey together as followers of Jesus.

Women's Fellowship





Clergy Tax Seminar

January 25, 2020

Students, pastors, and other church leaders are invited to participate in this online seminar. Learn how to:

- File clergy taxes correctly and legally
- Comply with regulations while maximizing tax deductions.
- Earn 0.3 CEUs requires attendance in the first session.

The annual Clergy Tax Seminar will consist of two sessions:

- Session 1, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. EST, will focus on the rules surrounding Clergy Tax Returns, including who is subject to these rules, what income is subject to tax, and how to reduce total tax liability using various methods, including housing allowance, business expenses, and medical reimbursement plans. The court case around the housing allowance will also be discussed. Credit for 0.3 CEUs will be available for attending Session 1 only.
- Session 2, from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. EST, participants will complete a clergy tax return using H&R Block's highest tier (Premium and Business) downloadable software.





Christian Citizenship Seminar

April 25—30, 2020

Christian Citizenship Seminar (CCS) provides high school aged students the chance to explore the relationship between faith and a particular political issue, and then act from a faith perspective regarding that issue.





Who is eligible to attend?

All high school youth and their adult advisors are eligible to attend the seminar. Churches are strongly encouraged to send an advisor with their youth, even if only one or two youth attend. Churches are required to send one advisor for every four youth.

Registration is limited to the first 60 participants. Registration opens 12/2 at 10 a.m. central time.

What is the cost?

The \$450 registration fee includes:

- Event programming
- Lodging for five nights
- 2 dinner meals, one in New York City and one in Washington D.C. Transportation from New York to Washington D.C.

Note: Each participant will need to bring additional money for most meals, sightseeing, personal expenses, and subway/taxi fares.

Hearts For Nigeria:

Roxane Hill Concludes her position with Nigeria Crisis Response

Global Mission and Service (GM&S) and Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM) expect the response to continue for two more years, through 2021, and then expect to continue providing grants for specific work in Nigeria. A concluding report from Roxane and Carl Hill: In November 2014, we sat around a table with EYN leadership in Jos, Nigeria. As we looked at these men and women, we saw faces filled with desperation looking at us for answers. Just a few short weeks before, they were sitting in their offices conducting affairs of the church at their headquarters in northeast Nigeria. Now, they had been displaced by the insurgent group known as Boko Haram and did not know where to turn. In late October 2014, Boko Haram had swept through the northeast bringing destruction and chaos, forcing our Nigerian brothers and sisters to run for their lives. The majority of EYN leadership had come as far as Jos, a city in central Nigeria, to find a safe haven. It was at that meeting in Jos that EYN leaders adopted the idea of assisting their people through a newly created Disaster Ministry (DM), to be headed by the EYN President and an appointed pastor, Yuguda Mdurvwa. We recalled the day we were contacted by Stan Noffsinger, then general secretary of the CoB, and GM&S executive director Jay Wittmeyer and associate executive Roy Winter, to be the new directors of the NCR. When they contacted us, we were touring the country as spokespeople for GM&S and had just completed a stint at EYN's Kulp Bible College, and we were excited to share our experience with the church at large. The NCR has been carried out as a collaboration between EYN and the CoB's GM&S and BDM. EYN is a church established by Brethren missionaries almost 100 years ago, and for many decades has been independent from its "mother church" in the US. During the heyday of Brethren missions, many from the US found their way to Nigeria and served there. Many conscientious objectors elected to serve in Nigeria as part of their obligation to this country--Nigeria was a place that qualified for "alternative service." Because of the large scale of the crisis, the NCR quickly became the largest single program of relief and aid in the CoB's 300-plus years. Because of the push from top leaders, a goal was set to raise \$5 million. People across the denomination gladly gave of their resources because of the church's familiarity with and love for Nigeria. Starting with seed money from the Emergency Disaster Fund, the church was soon on its way to raising the money needed to get the program off the ground. Fast forward five years. We have just completed our last scheduled trip to Nigeria as representatives of the CoB. This last visit was to observe and report on all that was done, how it has impacted the people most affected, and what challenges still remain for our brothers and sisters in Christ. On our trip we met with EYN president Joel S. Billi, who recognized the DM as a valuable part of EYN and praised the staff for their tireless efforts in assisting those affected by the Boko Haram insurgency. We also met with EYN's DM Team and spent time listening to their joys and concerns. A main focus of the trip was visiting camps for Internally Displaced People (IDPs). We visited two camps around the area of Nigeria's capital city, Abuja; a camp near the city of Yola; and three within the city of Maiduguri in the far northeast. The IDP camps near Abuja and Yola are surrounded by farmland and the displaced people are growing their own food. These camps amazed us with their progress and steps toward self-reliance. But in Maiduguri the camps are overcrowded, there is never enough food, and the living conditions are far below the quality of the other camps located in safer areas. Traveling safely to Maiduguri and assisting these camps remains a huge challenge for EYN and its DM. While visiting the EYN Headquarters in Kwarhi we traveled to the town of Michika, where we observed the progress toward rebuilding one of EYN's large churches. GM&S has given 40 grants of \$5,000 each to EYN congregations to help them rebuild their church buildings following destruction by Boko Haram. We also were able to witness the blessing of two water sources provided by the DM. The bore holes are providing a consistent source of good water and help build unity among the recipients and their communities. The need for alternative sources of income is very important for subsistence farming communities in northeast Nigeria. We visited a livelihood training center where widows and orphans are learning to be tailors. We observed a distribution of goats to some of the most vulnerable people, who included disabled and/or elderly people and a few of the orphans whose parents had been killed by Boko Haram. Each beneficiary was given a male and a female goat, and these animals will be a welcome source of livelihood and income for their future. We left Nigeria and our many friends with mixed emotions. There was a sense of satisfaction that when our brothers and sisters in Nigeria were at their lowest point, the Church of the Brethren stepped in to provide what was most needed. However, we also left with sadness as we realized this was probably the end of our official role in Nigeria. We are just two of the many Brethren who went to Nigeria to help out during a time of crisis. As we boarded the plane to fly home, we knew we had left a piece of our heart in Nigeria. Many challenges remain for EYN and the people of northeast Nigeria. More than 2 million people are still displaced, living in camps or host communities or in the neighboring country of Cameroon. Travel and communication are difficult, especially in areas still threatened by Boko Haram. There are still huge unmet needs, and they far outweigh the available resources. Our plea is to hold up our brothers and sisters in prayer.

Christian Citizenship Seminar seeks creative solutions to violent conflict

Recap of 2019 CCS

The Christian Citizenship Seminar gathered 47 high school youth and advisors from Church of the Brethren congregations throughout the US, beginning on April 27 in New York City and ending in Washington, D.C., on May 2, focused on the theme "Creative Solutions to Violent Conflict Worldwide." The event was led by five Church of the Brethren staff from the Youth and Young Adult Ministry and the Office of Peacebuilding and Policy.

Throughout the week, participants learned about how churches, governments, and non-governmental organizations can pro-actively build peace and defuse potential violence without resorting to military force. In between sessions about the military budget, unarmed civilian protection, and advocacy, participants visited the United Nations, explored New York City, and met with their members of Congress on Capitol Hill.

Youth lobbied their senators and representatives to support funding for unarmed civilian protection, a strategy for preventing violence by providing a protective, nonviolent presence to observe and accompany civilians living amid conflict. They also shared how their background as members of a historic peace church informed their desire to see less militarism and more efforts to build peace in US foreign policy. In many offices, preventing violence without the use of military force was a novel but welcome concept, and participants were pleasantly surprised that staff and legislators from varying parties and perspectives received their ideas and their presence with curiosity and enthusiasm.

For many of the participants, who hailed from 14 congregations in 12 states, this was their first time lobbying their members of Congress. Most walked away encouraged to continue engaging in advocacy for peace and other issues that inspire them. Christian Citizenship Seminar, which occurs every spring except for years when National Youth Conference is held, exists for just such a purpose: to empower and inspire Church of the Brethren youth to see and speak on issues of peace and justice through the lens of their faith.
