


### Holiday Party December 10, 2017 1:00 p.m.

As you know, Tulsa was the host city for the 2017 SPAH. It is a very interesting area and one that I would recommend visiting—in the Spring or Fall. The host club put together some interesting tours to local museums.

On Wednesday - we visited Woolaroc, the one time home of Frank Phillips - founder of Phillips 66 Oil. This museum & wildlife preserve is to home to animals such as longhorn cattle, the wapiti, ostrich, llama, zebra and water buffalo. The



museum houses an amazing collection of prehistory items, American Indian memorabilia and regalia such as headdresses, beaded work, fantastic paintings and sculpture and the oil story and the creation of Phillips 66. A part of the display is the story of the Cherokee people being moved from southeastern United States to the Oklahoma Territory on the "Trail of Tears," depicted in a painting by Robert Lindneux.
