The time in the wilderness was like an interim for the people of Israel, a time between their life in Egypt and their life in the Promised Land. As First Lutheran Church goes through a time between called pastors, a time sometimes called the "interim," what can we learn about God's help and Israel's response during their interim time? How can God's Word shape our interim time?


Military Update

From Our Librarian 75

Welcome to March. Just a few

of the days celebrated during this month are National Grammar Day (4), National Dentist's Day (6), National Pi Day (14), International Women's Day (8), World Puppetry Day (21), World Poetry Day (21), and the first Saturday of every month is "Play Outside Day." (Good luck with that one.) Google "National Days for Month of March 2023". You will be amazed at some of the celebrations. They will make for good party themes.

And now sit back and let me wow you with useless knowledge I learned on my trip south to Florida from a book <u>Along Interstate</u> <u>75</u> by Dave Hunter, 2010 edition. (I picked it up from a rummage sale.)

In north Findlay, just above the Bigelow
Avenue traffic lights where Main Street
changes from two lanes to one "the House On
the Hill" is on your left. David Copperfield used
it as a setting for his spectacular "burning
house" illusion, in his 1995 TV special. Catch it
silhouetted in the setting sun. Unforgettable.
Our Findlay airport was the final destination of
Tex Marshall's historic flight in May, 1920, from
Daytona, Florida to Findlay. He and his wife set
off with inaccurate maps and their trip ended
here.

If you had been able to travel I-75 in 1784, at exit 142 (Bluffton exit) going south you would be leaving Connecticut and entering Virginia.

Between exit 104 (Botkins) and 99 (Anna Minster) you cross the lost River Teays – a major North American river of pre-glacial times with a valley as deep as 400 feet below the position of I-75. The glaciers dragged enough rubble over the course of the Teays and eventually buried the valley.

Of course, the Wright Brothers schooled and ran their early businesses in Dayton, Ohio. Dayton inventors are responsible for parking meters, the parachute, cash register, pull tab and pop tab soda cans, microfiche, stepladder, cellophane tape, movie projector, ice cube tray, gas mask, to name just a few. And, by the way, Carillon Historical Park at exit 51 is a great day trip.

At Miles 20 to 14 you travel across the ancient bed of warm, shallow tropical seas from 400 million years ago (Paleozoic-Ordovician Period). Apparently, fossils still abound here. Mile 14 southward runs on the bed of the Miami-Erie Canal. Eleven miles of a 16-mile subway project, begun in 1916including 2 miles of Cincinnati downtown tunnels - were completed and ready for the track-laying crews before the money ran out in 1927. The city of Cincinnati made its final payment on the original 1916 \$6 million bond issue in 1966! To the East of mile 1.5 is the "Over-the-Rhine" area. By 1900, here there were 30 German language newspapers, 48 German churches, and a number of beer gardens and singing societies!

Finally, because I am again running out of space, the border between Ohio and Kentucky is the northern Ohio River shoreline. Step foot into the river, and you are immediately in Kentucky.

I might finish the trip in April ... who know what that part will entail. Thanks for traveling with me. God bless and keep reading.

FAMILY & YOUTH SERVICES

When doing God's work, the hope is that it spills over to inspire others to do the same. When a Family & Youth Services therapist signed up the twelve kids in her therapeutic behavioral group for water safety classes at a local business, she did not know how much the youth would benefit from it or how much the owners would embrace the opportunity. She worked hard to coordinate these classes into her therapy group, which included getting approvals from the guardians for all of the youth.



Each Wednesday for five weeks, the youth received water safety classes as well as nutritional and health tips. The owners even bought all of the youth swim gear, including goggles and swim caps. The owners also saw potential in three of the girls and asked that they get additional swim lessons, if they were interested, to prepare them for competitive swim.

On Sundays, two staff members came in on their day off to take the girls to these additional swim lessons. The youth enjoyed the classes and looked forward to Wednesday's activity each week. It was an opportunity for the youth to learn discipline and to interact with adults outside of Family & Youth Services, which contributes to the normalcy that the Genacross program seeks to provide its youth in care.

General Scholarship and the Jeffrey Allan DeMoss Scholarship.




