

## DEATH OF DR. A. G. KAUMEYER

Maybee, Aug. 3,—Dr. Adolph George Kaumeyer of Maybee, one of the best known physicians in Monroe county, died Tuesday in his summer cottage at Sand Lake where he and his wife were spending the summer. He was 64 years old. Dr. Kaumeyer had been in ill health for the last 10 years and the direct cause of his death was coronary thrombosis.

In August 1914, Dr. Kaumeyer came to Maybee and had lived here ever since. He had not been in active practice since 1930, but took care of many of his old patients at his office. Dr. Kaumeyer was so well liked that many of his patients came to his office to be treated after he had retired from active practice. They said it made them feel better just talking to the doctor.

He was a member of the Monroe County Medical Society until he gave up his active practice.

He was born in Adrian January 10, 1874, and received his early education in the Lutheran parochial school of that city. After graduating from the Adrian school he attended the Lutheran Seminary at Edison, Illinois, where he trained for a teacher. Later he entered the Michigan College of Medicine and Surgery in Detroit from which he was graduated in March, 1897.

After his graduation from medical college he practiced in Adrian a few months and in the fall of 1897 went to Pigeon, Michigan, where he practiced until 1905. He then located in Port Hope, Michigan, where he remained until 1914 when he came to Maybee.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Kaumeyer of Adrian. He was married to Miss Genevieve Schluchter of Sebawaing, Michigan, in December 1900, who with one son survives. The son is George Kaumeyer of Maybee. He also leaves one grandson; two brothers, J. F. Kaumeyer of Marshall, Michigan, and the Rev. C. A. Kaumeyer, a retired Lutheran minister, of Lancaster, Ohio; and a number of nephews and nieces.

He was a stockholder in the Peoples State Bank of Maybee.
