On September 20 and 21, I attended my first South/Central Indiana District Conference at the Living Faith congregation outside of Flora, IN. On Friday, September 20, I had the opportunity to attend several insight sessions, which included sessions on conflict resolution,

mental illness in the church, and a session on music in the church led by Jonathan Shively. I also shared in a meal with other pastors and spouses provided by Beth Sollenberger, our District Executive Minister. These pre-conference activities were wonderful learning opportunities as well as a time to start to meet and get to know some of the other ministers in the district.

On Saturday, I picked up Dennis Horn and Bonnie Haughn and we rode together over to attend the conference as three of our four delegates for the conference. Laurie Kieffaber Cornett was our fourth delegate. We began the day with a light breakfast, provided by the Lafayette congregation. After a brief worship led by Moderator Tom Allbaugh, we moved into the business of the conference. This year's business agenda was light, with only a few items needing approval from the delegates, including adopting the district budget, the slate for open district positions for the next year, and a vote on the closure of the West Eel River congregation. In addition to these actions, we heard reports from various groups and agencies connected to the district.

After a lovely lunch, there were several insight sessions offered. Bonnie and I both attended a session focusing on older adults in congregations. Following the insight sessions was the annual Dessert Auction, which this year benefited the Brethren Leadership Institute. The Brethren Leadership Institute offers various classes to help those who are seeking ordination, as well as current pastors and lay leaders who are interested in learning more about the subjects covered. This was a new experience to me, and I enjoyed seeing the pretty desserts as well as the competition to purchase them. This year's auction raised over \$1500 dollars.

After some final reports, we wrapped up the day with the passing of the gavel to the moderator of next year's District Conference, Spencer Spaulding. Spencer offered a prayer of thanks for the conference, and then adjourned the conference until next year's gathering.

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
Women's Fellowship

As a long-term volunteer project leader with the Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM) Rebuilding program, I have had the privilege of experiencing this ministry from the "inside" for more than five years. I've been given the opportunity to see our denomination through different eyes: the eyes of service, compassion, and love. The one thing that keeps standing out to me is how we are united, as opposed to how we might be divided. The "we" are volunteers who come from different districts across the denomination to serve together each week. I often comment to them during our end-of-week debriefing that this ministry is the best-kept secret of our denomination.

Why do I say that? Because those who come to serve strive for a common goal that we fulfill together. What is that common goal? To glorify God as we serve with our hands, feet, and hearts to help restore hope in our clients and the communities in which we serve. Because we have that common goal, we are united. Despite our differences, we are united. We are united because we are motivated by love—God's love for us and our love for Him—which in turn compels us to love our neighbor as ourselves. As Galatians 5:13-14 tells us: "Serve one another humbly in love. For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: Love your neighbor as yourself."

This is how we build the body and unite the church, week after week: through acts of service that provide opportunities to break down barriers and build relationships. Serving. United. Being the church. Continued Page 8
