

Eagle Facts

- It takes about 35 days for an eagle egg to incubate and hatch
- Eagle babies start practicing flying at 10-12 weeks
- They don't develop their white head and tail until they are 4-5 years of age
- Eagles can live to be 35 years old in the wild
- Their wingspan can be 7-8 feet across
- Nests are 6-10 feet high, 6-10 feet wide, and can weigh as much as two tons, or as much as 2 Holstein cows and one calf!
- Eagles stay with their same mate for life
- Eagles have such good eyesight that they can see a fish a mile away
- Only about 1 in 10 eagles survive to adulthood, so please give them space and give them the best chance to have a great start at life

STAY BACK 100 YARDS

To give the nesting eagles the best chance so the parents won't abandon the nest, the US Fish and Wildlife Service asks that you maintain a 100 yard boundary from January until the end of July during nesting season, or 200 yards back if there is a group of people.
