UPDATE ON OUR ICONIC PIER:



The City is committed to repairing, reopening, and rebuilding!

Thanks to the hard work and courage of our City Staff, especially our firefighters, on April 25 we were able to save 93% of the pier. The first 911 call was made at 3:02 PM and OFD was on scene by 3:07 PM. Water was being applied to the fire by 3:09 PM.

We are aiming to have 75% of the pier reopened within the next two weeks. As we move into debris removal and repair work there may still be days when the pier needs to be temporarily closed, but we realize how important the pier is to the community and we are excited to get people back on it in such a short time.

On May 1, the City Council ratified the declaration of a local emergency by the City Manager. This will aid us in seeking funding for both the response and repair of the pier and efforts are already underway.

The next steps will be a full assessment of the damaged portion of the pier to see what needs to be repaired and/or rebuilt, then plans will be drawn, and construction will commence. But because of the uniqueness of such a structure it will be quite some time (a couple of years) before we will see a full reopening. We are working with Seal Beach to learn from their experience. DID YOU KNOW . . .

One of our local theatres "The Sunshine Brooks" got its name from a real person, Hattie Brooks? Her high school nickname was "Sunshine" and then she married William Brooks in 1929.

The following year, the Brooks family moved to San Diego where William became the proprietor of what is now the Embassy Hotel. William and Hattie made the hotel their residence.

Although the Brooks Theater was originally named the Rancho Santa Margarita Theatre, the name was quickly shortened to the Margo due to marquee space. It opened on November 20, 1936.

In 1944, the Brooks family purchased the Margo Theatre along with two other partners. But by 1955, the lease expired and its doors were closed for a time.

Erwin Sklar took over operations of the theatre, remodeled it and changed the name to the Towne Theater. The Towne played films, double and triple features through the 1980s. Erwin later became Mayor of Oceanside in 1957.

By 1990, the Towne Theater closed its doors again due to years of losing its audiences to multi-show theaters. The Oceanside Martial Arts Center took up residence in the theater space soon after.

In 1993, Hattie Hazel Brooks granted her share of the Towne to the City of Oceanside Community Development Commission (OCDC). The Procopio Family Trust sold its share of the theater to OCDC the following month for \$66,600.

Today, The Sunshine Brooks Theatre has local sponsors and great talent, and has re-emerged as a respected theater company offering full seasons of theatre, music concerts, and other activities to support and reflect our unique Oceanside community!
