Tradition Twelve became important early in my sobriety and, along with the Twelve Steps, it continues to be a must in my recovery. I became aware after I joined the Fellowship that I had personality problems, so that when I first heard it, the Tradition's message was very clear: there exists an immediate way for me to face, with others, my alcoholism and attendant anger, defensiveness, offensiveness. I saw Tradition Twelve as being a great egodeflator; it relieved my anger and gave me a chance to utilize the principles of the program. All of the Steps, and this particular Tradition, have guided me over decades of continuous sobriety. I am grateful to those who were here when I needed them.

# When to Tell Others

A member shares her struggle about when to stay anonymous.

I would like to respond to an anonymous letter which appeared in the March, 2017, issue of Grapevine. The writer asked how many of us are prepared to take the responsibility of explaining AA and AA policy to outside people.

The short letter bothered me for several reasons. First, I think hiding our membership in AA is a problem. Not that we need to advertise our individual membership; we don't. But shame about alcoholism will continue if we feel ashamed to be alcoholics who are sober.

Second, if a friend acquaintance or stranger needs to ask me about AA, it's my job as a sober member of AA to respond as best I am able. If I don't know an answer, I can ask another member or go online to find the answer. Better yet, I can read AA literature to find the answer. To me, that's what the Responsibility Declaration is all about.

Third, and most important, if two members of AA had not told me they were in AA, and sober, I might never have made it in myself. God bless them for being open and honest about their sober membership in AA. In 1993, another mother at my church became the first person to share the story of their sobriety with me. Sharon (not her name) and I had babies within six months of each other. She had started a once a week mothers' group, which allowed babies to attend. I'd stopped drinking during my pregnancy, but started again when a nurse said I should drink wine to go to sleep.

At one morning meeting, Sharon asked me the "20 questions." It never crossed my mind how extraordinary it was for her to have memorized them. Never having a morning drink or DUI, or been in rehab or detox, I flew through the questions. I lied at a couple of crucial ones, such as, "did you ever feel the need to control your drinking?" But the one question I remember to this day was about never drinking again. "I don't think I could never drink again," I told her. Sharon's eyebrows arched in surprise. ',1 mean, alcohol is everywhere," I said. "How can I avoid it?"

"You don't need to avoid it," she said. "you focus on your Higher power and he takes care of it.,, Now it was my turn to arch my eyebrows.

God next approached me two years later in 1995. I was a student of social work at Virginia Commonwealth University. I was 44 at the time. While I knew that I drank too much at times, I labored under the illusion that I had my drinking under control.

David, a fellow student, and I went to dinner to discuss a school project. I ordered my obligatory glass of wine and he didn't. "Don't you drink?" I asked. "Not for 17 years," he replied.

Aghast, I questioned him about why he would not want to drink. He gave his story briefly. I looked at him as I might a bug under glass. He had performed a short bit of Twelfth Step work on me, which I was blissfully unaware of at the time. We moved on to our school project. I ordered my second glass of wine.

"What?" l said. "This is all l'll drink tonight." "No problem," he said. He sipped his water. "Really," I stressed. "Most of the time I only have two."

He launched into a funny story of the man who only had two, but those two were bottles. And then he said something I will never forget.

"First, the man takes the drink," he said. ,"Then the drink takes the drink. Then the drink takes the man."

I knew I was at the "drink takes drink" stage. I could feel it. Sometimes I drank without wanting to. But it was not until December, 2002, that I was sick and tired of being sick and tired. And when I came to AA I was ashamed at my lack of control over alcohol. I stayed long enough to learn I had a disease. I stayed long enough to relapse once after four years and bounce right back into AA.

I recently celebrated 1O years of continuous sobriety. I must admit it has only been in the last four years that I've been willing to share my AA experience with non-AAs. I've learned and experienced enough in AA to be willing to stand for AA anytime, anyplace, with anyone.

Yes, I am prepared to be one who exclaims my AA membership whenever needed.
