The Book of Romans - Part 20

We start our study today in the book of Romans chapter 5. Let me encourage you to have your Bible and read along with me as we study these verses together.

First of all, we see in this chapter 5 of Romans the blessings of justification. In the first part of verse 1 of chapter 5, we see peace with God. It says, *Therefore being*... or because we have been... *justified*... in other words, put in alignment, right standing... by... or because of... faith. Therefore being justified by faith.... And the result of the first part of that verse is... we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. We've made peace with God and have the peace of God because we have been justified through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

Notice verse 2: *By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. By whom... by whom...* this is Jesus Christ. The first part of that verse says, *By whom also we have access....* It's by and through Jesus Christ.

Notice the word "also" in that verse. Not only are we justified by our faith in Jesus Christ and have peace with God, according to verse 1, we also have available to us as saved people by faith grace, the unmerited favor of God, to stand because we have been justified... verse 2. Now, this grace, according to verse 2, is the grace, unmerited favor of God, wherein we have been justified. We stand... we are saved only by God's grace.

And notice the term there "rejoice in hope." We are filled with happiness because of our expectation. Rejoicing, happiness, because of our expectation or the hope of the glory, the exaltation of God. We need to be lifted up daily and encouraged daily because we're able to exalt the Lord as we proclaim Jesus as our Savior.

Then we see also that we can have joy in hope, the anticipation, the expectation of God's glory. Not only can we have the exaltation or see the exaltation of God, we can have the expectation of God's glory, and we can also glory in tribulation for God's glory. In the next part of Romans 5:2, it says *and rejoice in hope of the glory of God*.

But notice these verses now, verses 3 and 4 of chapter 5: *3And not only so, but we glory in tribulations also: knowing that tribulation worketh patience; 4And patience, experience; and experience, hope.* We can rejoice even in tribulation according to verse 3. Why? Because we know the result of tribulation is patience. And then the result of patience is experience; and then the result of experience is hope, the expectation. Patience is to persevere, and as a result through the experience of the Christian life, we see the end. We know the end. We've read the Book. We know how it ends.

The expectation of things not seen but those things that become substance as we look with our eye of faith, believing God will give us everything He has promised. Hebrews 11:1 talks about that.

And then we read Romans 5:5-8. It says: ⁵And hope maketh not ashamed; because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us. ⁶For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die. ⁸But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.

God's love in our hearts by the Holy Spirit is what we read of in this chapter in these verses. The assurance that we will not be disappointed or ashamed in the hope we have, according to chapter 5 and the first part of verse 5. It says there, *And hope maketh not ashamed....* "Poured out," the Bible says here. In other words, *shed abroad* by the Holy Spirit, verse 5.

Well, what is poured out? The love of God is poured out, according to that verse. It says, *because the love of God is shed abroad...* or poured out... *in our hearts by the Holy Ghosts which is given unto us.* Can you imagine God living within you? Jesus Christ is there. The Holy Spirit is there. God with us. God in us.

And notice something else here in verses 6-8. We see the love of God is demonstrated by Christ's death while we were yet sinners. It says, starting in verse 6 there and going through verse 8, ⁶For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly. Folks, we're the ungodly. And verse 7 says, For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die. ⁸But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.

Now let's look at verses 9-11 of Romans 5. ⁹Much more then, being now justified by his blood... There's even more to come, he's saying, much more now, being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from wrath through him. ¹⁰For if, when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by his life. ¹¹And not only so, but we also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received the atonement. "Saved from God's wrath" means delivered. How? Well, the Bible tells us in verse 9 it's through Jesus. Just as we have been justified by His blood, it says, *9Much more then, being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from wrath through him.* We shall be saved from the wrath, God's punishment for sin through Him, according to Romans 5:9.

And we are saved by His life just as we were reconciled by His death, according to Romans 5:10. It says, For if, when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by his life. All of this according to Romans 5:9-11 is the basis for us to rejoice. It says, And not only so, but we also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received the atonement.

Notice with me if you would, Romans 5:12-21. There's a contrast here, Christ and Adam. Through Adam, sin entered into the world, and death is the result. There's a consequences. Romans 5:12 says: *Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin.* And it's because of Adam's sin death passed, overtook all mankind for all have sinned, according to that verse. All have sinned... *and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned.*

And from the time of Adam to Moses, death reigned, even over those who had not committed the same sin that Adam had committed. It says in Romans 5:13-14, ¹³For until the law sin was in the world: but sin is not imputed when there is no law. ¹⁴Nevertheless death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over them that had not sinned after the similitude of Adam's transgression, who is the figure of him that was to come.

Now, notice Adam and Christ compared here. Romans 5:15-19 talks about this. By Adam's offense, many are dead, according to Romans 5:15. In the first part of that verse it says, *But not as the offence, so also is the free gift. For if through the offence of one many be dead....* It's about God's grace and the gift of grace eternal life through Jesus Christ comes, the abundance of grace, and it has become available to many people, according to Romans 5:15. It says, Much more the grace of *God, and the gift by grace, which is by one man, Jesus Christ, hath abounded unto many.*

Well, one offense produced the judgment of condemnation, but the free gift is for many, resulting in justification, according to Romans 5:16. It says, *And not as it was by one that sinned, so is the gift: for the judgment was by one to condemnation...* and that was Adam. We were condemned because of that sin. Now the free gift that the Bible is speaking of here is for many resulting in justification according to verse 16. It says, But the free gift is of many offences unto *justification.*

By Adam's offense, death reigns, but those who receive the gift of righteousness, life will reign. No eternal death through Jesus Christ. It says there, *For if by one man's offence death reigned by one; much more they which receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness shall reign in life by one, Jesus Christ*, Romans 5:17. First Corinthians 15:55 says, O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?

Now we see a summary taking place here in verses 18-19. Because we see that through Adam's offense, judgment came to all men, resulting in condemnation, according to verse 18. It says, *Therefore as by the offence of one judgment came upon all men to condemnation....* And justification of life comes through the righteousness of Christ as a free gift for all mankind. The rest of verse 18 says, Even so by the righteousness of one the free gift came upon all men unto justification of life.

Ephesians 2:5 says, *Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, by grace ye are saved....* And, of course, Ephesians 2:8 says, *For by grace are ye saved through faith, and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God.* Verse 9 goes on to say, *Not of works lest any man should boast.* We're not saved by works. No one is saved by works. We're saved by and through Jesus Christ, by asking Him into our hearts, by trusting Him to save us in order to go to Heaven.

Do you know Him today as your Savior? If not, may I invite you to do so right now; ask Him to come into your heart. Receive Him by faith. "Lord Jesus, come into my heart. I receive you the best I know how. I'm trusting you to save me to take me to Heaven."

If you'll pray that prayer or one like it, Jesus will save you today.
