Much will yet develop in the "torture report" controversy. For now let's contemplate these facts!

The most vocal protest regarding the "Ferguson Grand Jury" process was that stories from witnesses that were contrary to the final conclusion of the group were disregarded. Numerous vocal objectors were democrats in the U.S. House and Senate. **Never mind** that the Grand Jury did hear and read those conflicting stories and that they were refuted by the other evidence. And **never mind** the fact that many of those conflicting stories were later withdrawn by the witnesses.

Now consider what happened in reaction to the Senate Minority (Democrat) Report on Torture (re: the CIA's conduct, mainly at GITMO). A major republican objection is that **not one CIA representative was interviewed** who was involved at any level – i.e. those that were either involved with, or who approved, the enhanced interrogation techniques (e.g. water-boarding). Yet they reached a conclusion as to the extent and effectiveness of the techniques.

In the Ferguson case, there appears to be at least some consideration of all the witness testimony and it was disregarded only when either withdrawn by the witness, or when refuted by physical or forensic evidence. Not so with the Senate democrats.
