Jr Rock Club Meeting February 9, 2021 minutes by Thora Trumbo, advisor

Twelve students, numerous parents and three adult club members met on ZOOM for our monthly meeting. Two visitors joined us, Brayden, and Cinda for a second time. The students enjoyed chatter with one another while we waited a bit for late arrivals.

Thank you Chris Sorensen for setting up the ZOOM website with closed captioning for better clarification than just audio. It was very helpful!

Mrs. Trumbo shared a presentation of her recent trip to Cody, Wyoming, a round trip of 1,600 miles. Museum of the Rockies in Bozeman, Montana has a terrific fossil collection. Huge dinosaur bones assembled in exhibits tower above visitors. Rooms filled with displays of fish, turtles, alligators, and many, many dinosaurs were shared via pictures. Students told the names of the many popular dinosaurs. This museum can be an expensive stop for families as tickets aren't cheap at \$14.50 per student. But for dinosaur fanatics, it's a full day of excitement well worth the education!

Driving on to Cody, Wyoming, we crossed the Clark's Fork River which feeds the Yellowstone River and eventually the great Missouri River. The Trumbo family picked up a variety of stones on a huge riverbank to share with the students in their Valentine Gift Bags. So many colors, the students will be challenged to identify the stone's name and source from upstream.

In Cody, the Buffalo Bill Center of the West Museum was explored. It was special visiting a second "world class" museum just days after the other in Bozeman! 5 huge museums fill this single location complex. It's filled with examples of the native Plains Indian Americans, westward movement of others, famous Western fine art exhibits, natural history and wildlife, a massive firearm collection, a research facility and currently an equestrian guest exhibit. No wonder tickets are good for 2 days and run from \$12.75 to \$20 as there is so much to see. Mrs. Trumbo shared so many pictures, anyone traveling west into the Yellowstone Park area may find it hard to detour from these two museums. There is so much geology and nature history in Montana and Wyoming, any budding mineralogist or paleontologist is sure to be thrilled to personally visit. Camping and good hotels abound but avoid the tourist season, and for best results and more adventurous ways to add to your mineral collections, check the many Roadside Geology books for places to dig for your own fossils and minerals!

- Discussion on planning a picnic/auction and possibly outdoor bingo when the weather warms up. Sally will look into the state guidelines for outdoor gatherings in phase 2, and will ask the Union Street Library about the outlook for reserving their gazebo this spring/summer.
