## PREPARING FOR HURRICANE SEASON



Is your yard ready for hurricane season? June was just past us and is the official start of hurricane season.

One of the best preparations is to inspect your trees in your yard. What kind of condition are they in? Are there any limbs that are too close to your home or are weak and could act as a projectile, causing damage, should a storm hit?

This is the time to take action and prepare your trees for the storm season. It is always best to call a licensed tree service with adequate liability insurance. Get written estimates from two or more companies and a detailed description in writing before you hire anyone to do the work. Remember to include cleanup and debris removal.

Paying attention to trees before there is a potential problem can save you hundreds of dollars in the long run and stress from cleanup and recovery.

# VIDEO OF THE MONTH



**TAKE A STROLL  
THROUGH THE PSL  
BOTANICAL GARDENS**

Faced with the threat of a storm, gardeners who have kept their trees thinned and with a canopy in proportion to the trunk and branches have little extra to do. The overgrown, neglected tree, however, is another matter. It may be necessary to reduce the size of the tree, which will be a minor operation and hardly noticeable for a tree which has been well maintained. For a neglected tree it will mean severe surgery and a tree that will be ugly for a few months whether or not the storm hits.

The order of pruning is always the same:

- Cut out dead, diseased, and damaged wood.
- Take out watersprouts.
- Cut out crossing branches and those growing into the center of the tree.
- Clean off small branches that clutter the center of the tree.
- Select a well spaced framework of branches and cut all others out completely.
- Shorten branches to give a balanced head.

Whenever possible, this shortening should be done to a bud that has already started to grow out as a sidebranch. Cutting to an upward pointing branch or one leading to one side or the other will determine the direction in which new growth occurs for a time. If the tree has been well managed, pruning in this way (drop crotch pruning) will mean that the cuts scarcely show since a lot of foliage will remain to disguise them. In cutting back a neglected tree, many of the cuts will have to be made to a part of the branch with no leaves or side branches. Even when the cut can be made to a fork, the remaining branch may also need to be shortened so that the cuts have very little foliage to hide them.

Heading back (cutting branches severely to a bare stump) should be avoided unless absolutely necessary. Not only does this risk sunburn for all the trunk suddenly exposed to the light, but it also means that a tuft of twigs will grow from each stump which will have to be thinned later. All cutting should be done so as to avoid damage to the parts of the tree that are to remain. Cuts should be finished close to the trunk or remaining branch and at the angle shown in Figure 7 so that they will heal well. Painting the cuts is not recommended. It is of no value in promoting healing, although it may help to disguise the cut.

If you have coconut palms, preparing for storms includes harvesting all nuts that are of any size. Coconuts and most other large palms should have dead leaves removed. The nuts and the leaves can act as missiles if the wind catches them right. Do not, however, cut off all leaves except the central upright tuft, since this removes the protection for the bud. Last minute prunings can also blow around dangerously and should thus be disposed of for safety.

Windstorms are always a matter of concern, but trees that have been selected properly, sited with care, and maintained so as to have a sturdy form and an open canopy stand the best chance of surviving intact and not adding to the damage in the area.

Furthermore, residents are reminded to trim trees now and not wait until a storm is threatening our area. Once St. Lucie County is in a storm's projected path, vegetative debris might not be picked up before the storm impacts our area, causing more damage and debris to be pickup during the post-storm recovery.

## HORTICULTURE HAPPENINGS...

### Friends of the Port St. Lucie Botanical Gardens Horticulture Class Series 2016 Pre- and Post-Hurricane • Landscape Preparations

1. Basic safety first: wear real shoes, no flip flops, preferably work boots, work gloves, eye protection. Training in the use of power tools, especially chain saws. Watch for power lines. Watch for sharp debris - metal, glass, etc. Most people get hurt by hurricanes after the hurricane, not during it.
2. Pre-Hurricane: most important issue is plant, especially, tree health. Properly selected and cared for trees survive hurricanes and do not add to the damage being caused. Consider what type of damage your property is subject to when you are selecting plants: wind, salt spray, fresh water flooding, salt water flooding, and damage from windblown debris. Select your trees to survive storm damage.
3. Selection and location: trees that are from hurricane prone areas, i.e. natives, will survive storms better than others. Also trees from areas that traditionally have cyclones. Generally, short trunks, short round or oval canopies, low center of gravity, strong branches and trunk. Natives




especially are well adapted. Plant location can limit health by limiting the size of the root ball. Most uprooted trees have damaged roots or very limited root balls. Do not plant large trees where the branches will over top or rub against your roof.

4. Healthy plants survive better and recover faster than other plants. Generally and always true. Check your plants for general health. Dead limbs, damaged trunks, damaged roots from excavations, paving, etc. Poor pruning leads to "witches broom growth" and often breaking limbs.
5. Palms: Do not 'hurricane prune' palms. In a storm the loose material will fall to the ground quite early and will stay where put. Neither fronds nor fruit (except for coconuts, which should be removed) will become a damage issue

in a storm. So called "hurricane pruning" leads to pencil pointing with a resulting weak trunk that may break off during a storm.

6. Container plants: my storage policy is to lay them down on the ground in sheltered locations – shrub borders, fenced vegetable areas, etc. I have never lost a plant doing this - Andrew, Frances, Jean.
7. Post- hurricane: remember the safety issue. Also think about heat and how much work you can do comfortably. Pick up the debris. Cut off any seriously wind damaged materials, especially materials that are hanging free. If it looks likely to survive leave it on. Wash off salt. Otherwise do nothing.
8. Downed trees: if you have down trees or shrubs that will take a while to get raised, protect the root ball. Cover the root ball with anything except plastic; cloth, palm fronds, branches, etc. Keep the root ball moist. Keep in mind that you can do as much damage to the roots raising the tree as the wind did taking it down. You only want to raise a tree once. Be prepared with stakes, ties, help, etc. Pick it up, stake and tie it, water well, trim off any obvious dying materials but do not prune until you see new growth which may take a while. Pruning of any plants tends to encourage new growth and should be left till later if the roots have been damaged.
9. What trees to choose: native live oaks, gumbo limbo, native figs, sea grapes, pigeon plum, capers, coconut palms, sabal palms. Drive around the old residential areas and look at the big trees - they survived the storms and hurricanes.





## What to Plant

**Annuals/Bedding plants:** Summer annuals to plant now include celosia, coleus, torenia, and ornamental pepper. **See Annuals:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_annual\\_landscape\\_plants](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_annual_landscape_plants)

**Bulbs:** Butterfly lily and gladiolus are bulbs that can be planted during the middle of summer. **See Bulbs for Florida:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_bulbous\\_flowers](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_bulbous_flowers)

**Herbs:** While summer is too hot to start herbs from seeds, many, such as oregano and mint, do well if started from small plants. **See Herbs:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_herbs](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_herbs)

**Vegetables:** Plant tropical vegetables, such as boniato, calabaza, and chayote this month. **See South Florida Tropicals:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_series\\_south\\_florida\\_tropicals](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_series_south_florida_tropicals) and *Chayote:* [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_chayote](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_chayote)

**Palms:** Continue planting palms while the rainy season is in full swing. Support large palms with braces for 6–8 months after planting. Do not drive nails directly into a palm trunk. **See Palms:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_palms](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_palms)

## What to Do

**Trees:** Prepare for hurricane season by checking trees for damaged or weak branches and pruning if needed. Hire an ISA-certified arborist. **See International Society of Arboriculture:** <http://isa-arbor.com/> and *Pruning Landscape Trees and Shrubs:* [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_tree\\_pruning](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_tree_pruning)

**Lawns:** Determine the cause of any lawn problems before taking action. If an insect is the culprit, treat only the affected area. Rule out disease or sprinkler malfunction. **See Turfgrass Pest Insects:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_turf\\_pest\\_insects](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_turf_pest_insects)

**Fertilizer Bans:** Numerous municipalities in south Florida prohibit the application of fertilizer to lawns and/or landscape plants during the summer rainy season (June–September). See if such an ordinance exists in your area.

**Vegetable garden:** Use summer heat to solarize the vegetable garden for fall planting. It takes 4–6 weeks to kill weeds, disease, and nematodes, so start now. **See Soil Solarization:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_soil\\_solarization](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_soil_solarization)

**Irrigation:** Install an inexpensive rain shutoff device to save money by overriding an irrigation system when it rains. If one is already installed, check that it is operating properly. **See Landscape Irrigation:** [http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\\_landscape\\_irrigation](http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic_landscape_irrigation)

**Pests on ornamental plants:** Inspect the leaves of ornamental plants for small white dots that may indicate lace bugs at work.
