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Talking together anticipates careful listening; listening that allows one to explore unfamiliar ideas and share hopes and dreams. This sort of conversation renews a sense of community and may open doors to new thinking.

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This is a time for every voice to be heard and every ear to be open. Our God continues to surprise us. May we join in conversation with expectant hearts and open minds as we seek faithful focus for the future.

Just a word about me: I am a retired Presbyterian minister. I came to the St. Louis region in April of 1986 when my husband became pastor of Westminster Presbyterian Church in Belleville, IL. Since that time I have served as Interim Minister of eleven congregations and briefly as Associate for

Maturity? When I was younger, I always struggled with this word. I saw it as stuffy, straight-laced, and old-fashioned. My dad would say, "When you are a grown-up you will understand." Now, I loved my dad - in fact he was one of my heroes. My father was part of what Tom Brokaw calls "the greatest generation." He embodied the word "mature." He always sacrificed for us. He never drank the last of the milk. "Save it for the kids," he would humbly say. He was not a clothes horse. Khaki work pants were his attire. He was generous to a fault. People adored and respected him. He didn't have a stodgy bone in his body. For his generation, maturity was less about being the best in the world than it was being the best for the world.

My father wanted to see the turn of the millennium in his lifetime. He did. He died on January 6, 2001, the day of the year designated by the church as Epiphany, the time when God's generous love was revealed to the Gentile world. On that day, the day of my father's death, I too had an epiphany, my own moment of revelation of the depth of my dad's generosity and sacrifice for the next generation. My father didn't see our children's graduations or celebrate their marriages. But in some ways he was present with us there in the background. His wise stewardship of life and resources in his will provided for our children after he was no longer there to witness the fruit of his generosity.

Maturity is not defined by age or demeanor; it is a matter of the heart. "Téleios," the Greek word for maturity, means "goal" or "complete." Another facet of the word is "ripe!" Thank goodness for that agrarian image! Maturity doesn't come all at once. We grow into it.

The ministry of the Foundation is to help congregations develop disciples who see the value and goal of giving to future generations. The Foundation deeply desires to walk beside congregations and individuals to develop the vision of legacy giving. The Live Forward Give Forward Wills program gives a step-by-step approach to help foster a vision of giving a legacy gift that will impact the future of a church's ministry.

Live Forward, Give Forward is about encouraging people to provide for the long-term mission of the church. To understand how the way they give now can have future impact, they need a

compelling vision of what that future can hold. This goes beyond programs, facilities and general operating budgets. They need to know what their investment in the mission of the church will help accomplish 10, 20, 50 or more years down the road.

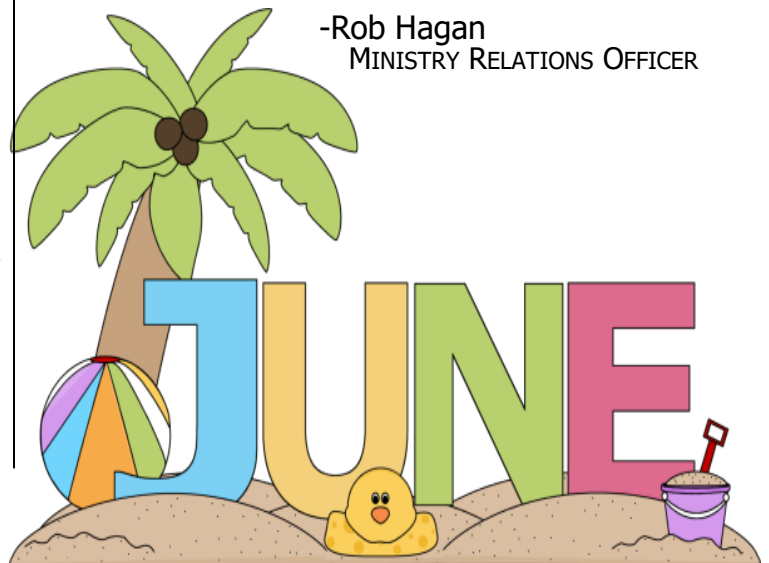

PCUSA Column—Gradye Parsons

There are eighty-nine years of living between my mother and my grandson. Yet they are experiencing similar journeys of self-discovery.

My mother lives with dementia. It would be inaccurate to say she suffers from it. She treats it more like a traveling partner. While she has forgotten a lot of good things, she also has forgotten a lot of hurts and angers. My grandson is acquiring knowledge by the minute. He is the proverbial mental vacuum cleaner. His imagination churns at warp speed. On a recent trip to a children's museum he created whole worlds to enjoy. Not very long ago he finally put it together that the little boy in the mirror was him. Those blue eyes and that smile looking at him was what the world sees. On a recent visit with my mother I showed her a photo of her and me. It took her a while to fully accept that it was her. Yes she does look like her mother. Yes your hair really is gray. And, yes, the son sitting next to you has gray hair too. The Committee on the Office of the General Assembly commissioned a study of how the PC(USA) sees itself these days.

It was an open-ended study in which anyone could participate. In combing through the 21,000 answers, a distinct family portrait emerges. That portrait reveals a church that cares about healthy congregations—healthy congregations that thrive, that faithfully live out the gospel, and that care about their community. The portrait reveals a people who set helping others as a priority. Helping others covers a variety of activities from food pantries to advocacy for justice. The strength of the answers shows the strong link between being a Christian and being God's hands to the world. A photo is a snapshot in time. If you look at old photos of yourself you might lament your youth. But if you look at current photos of yourself you can discover who you have become. The distinct family portrait of the PC(USA) shows us who we have become in our 310 years of life. I think we are looking pretty good at 310.

Maturity? When I was younger, I always struggled with this word. I saw it as stuffy, straight-laced, and old-fashioned. My dad would say, "When you are a grown-up you will understand." Now, I loved my dad - in fact he was one of my heroes. My father was part of what Tom Brokaw calls "the greatest generation." He embodied the word "mature." He always sacrificed for us. He never drank the last of the milk. "Save it for the kids," he would humbly say. He was not a clothes horse. Khaki work pants were his attire. He was generous to a fault. People adored and respected him. He didn't have a stodgy bone in his body. For his generation, maturity was less about being the best in the world than it was being the best for the world.

My father wanted to see the turn of the millennium in his lifetime. He did. He died on January 6, 2001, the day of the year designated by the church as Epiphany, the time when God's generous love was revealed to the Gentile world. On that day, the day of my father's death, I too had an epiphany, my own moment of revelation of the depth of my dad's generosity and sacrifice for the next generation. My father didn't see our children's graduations or celebrate their marriages. But in some ways he was present with us there in the background. His wise stewardship of life and resources in his will provided for our children after he was no longer there to witness the fruit of his generosity.

Maturity is not defined by age or demeanor; it is a matter of the heart. "Téleios," the Greek word for maturity, means "goal" or "complete." Another facet of the word is "ripe!" Thank goodness for that agrarian image! Maturity doesn't come all at once. We grow into it.

The ministry of the Foundation is to help congregations develop disciples who see the value and goal of giving to future generations. The Foundation deeply desires to walk beside congregations and individuals to develop the vision of legacy giving. Those blue eyes and that smile looking at him was what the world sees. On a recent visit with my mother I showed her a photo of her and me. It took her a while to fully accept that it was her. Yes she does look like her mother. Yes your hair really is gray. And, yes, the son sitting next to you has gray hair too. 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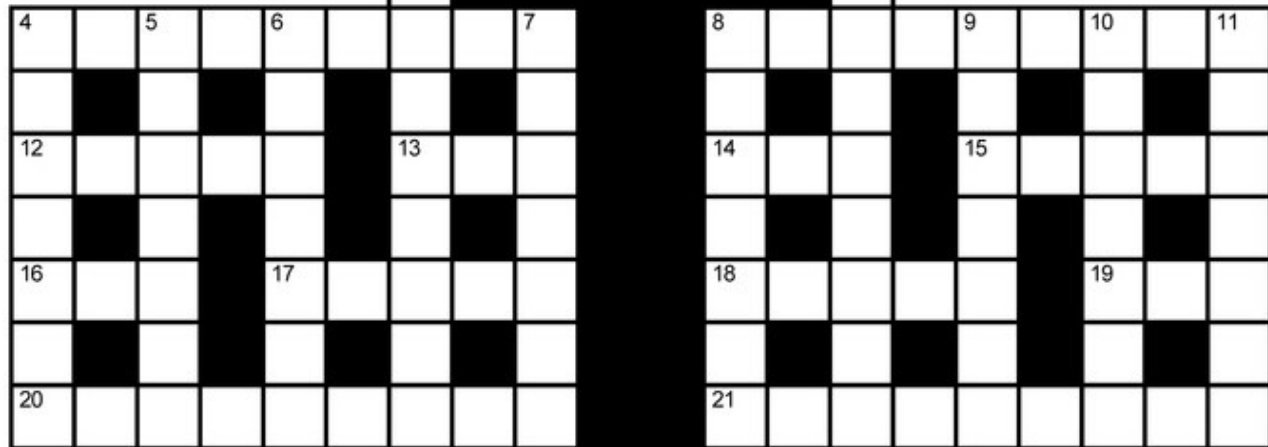

Maturity? When I was younger, I always struggled with this word. I saw it as stuffy, straight-laced, and old-fashioned. My dad would say, "When you are a grown-up you will understand." Now, I loved my dad - in fact he was one of my heroes. My father was part of what Tom Brokaw calls "the greatest generation." He embodied the word "mature." He always sacrificed for us. He never drank the last of the milk. "Save it for the kids," he would humbly say. He was not a clothes horse. Khaki work pants were his attire. He was generous to a fault. People adored and respected him. He didn't have a stodgy bone in his body. For his generation, maturity was less about being the best in the world than it was being the best for the world.

My father wanted to see the turn of the millennium in his lifetime. He did. He died on January 6, 2001, the day of the year designated by the church as Epiphany, the time when God's generous love was revealed to the Gentile world. On that day, the day of my father's death, I too had an epiphany, my own moment of revelation of the depth of my dad's generosity and sacrifice for the next generation. My father didn't see our children's graduations or celebrate their marriages. But in some ways he was present with us there in the background. His wise stewardship of life and resources in his will provided for our children after he was no longer there to witness the fruit of his generosity.

Maturity is not defined by age or demeanor; it is a matter of the heart. "Téleios," the Greek word for maturity, means "goal" or "complete." Another facet of the word is "ripe!" Thank goodness for that agrarian image! Maturity doesn't come all at once. We grow into it.

The ministry of the Foundation is to help congregations develop disciples who see the value and goal of giving to future generations. The Foundation deeply desires to walk beside congregations and individuals to develop the vision of legacy giving. The Live Forward Give Forward Wills program gives a step-by-step approach to help foster a vision of giving a legacy gift that will impact the future of a church's ministry.

Maturity? When I was younger, I always struggled with this word. I saw it as stuffy, straight-laced, and old-fashioned. My dad would say, "When you are a grown-up you will understand." Now, I loved my dad - in fact he was one of my heroes. My father was part of what Tom Brokaw calls "the greatest generation." He embodied the word "mature." He always sacrificed for us. He never drank the last of the milk. "Save it for the kids," he would humbly say. He was not a clothes horse. Khaki work pants were his attire. He was generous to a fault. People adored and respected him. He didn't have a stodgy bone in his body. For his generation, maturity was less about being the best in the world than it was being the best for the world.

My father wanted to see the turn of the millennium in his lifetime. He did. He died on January 6, 2001, the day of the year designated by the church as Epiphany, the time when God's generous love was revealed to the Gentile world. On that day, the day of my father's death, I too had an epiphany, my own moment of revelation of the depth of my dad's generosity and sacrifice for the next generation. My father didn't see our children's graduations or celebrate their marriages. But in some ways he was present with us there in the background. His wise stewardship of life and resources in his will provided for our children after he was no longer there to witness the fruit of his generosity.

Maturity is not defined by age or demeanor; it is a matter of the heart. "Téleios," the Greek word for maturity, means "goal" or "complete." Another facet of the word is "ripe!" Thank goodness for that agrarian image! Maturity doesn't come all at once. We grow into it.

The ministry of the Foundation is to help congregations develop disciples who see the value and goal of giving to future generations. The Foundation deeply desires to walk beside congregations and individuals to develop the vision of legacy giving. The Live Forward Give Forward Wills program gives a step-by-step approach to help foster a vision of giving a legacy gift that will impact the future of a church's ministry.

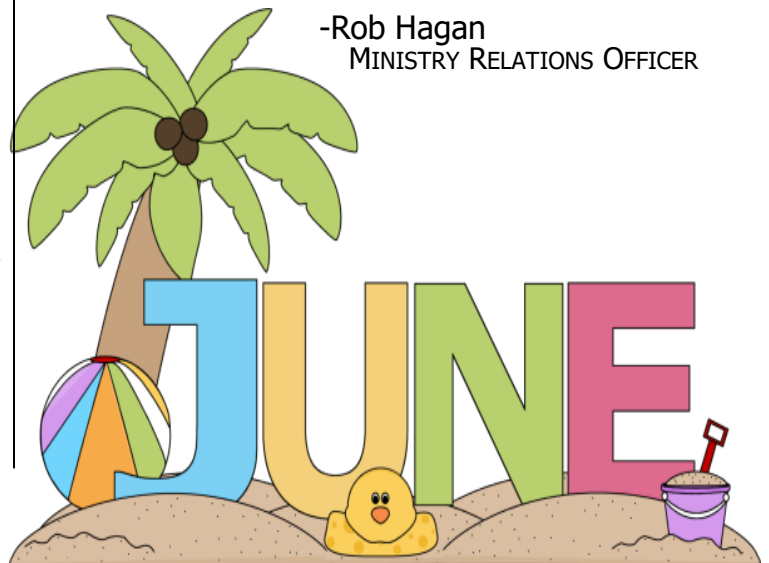

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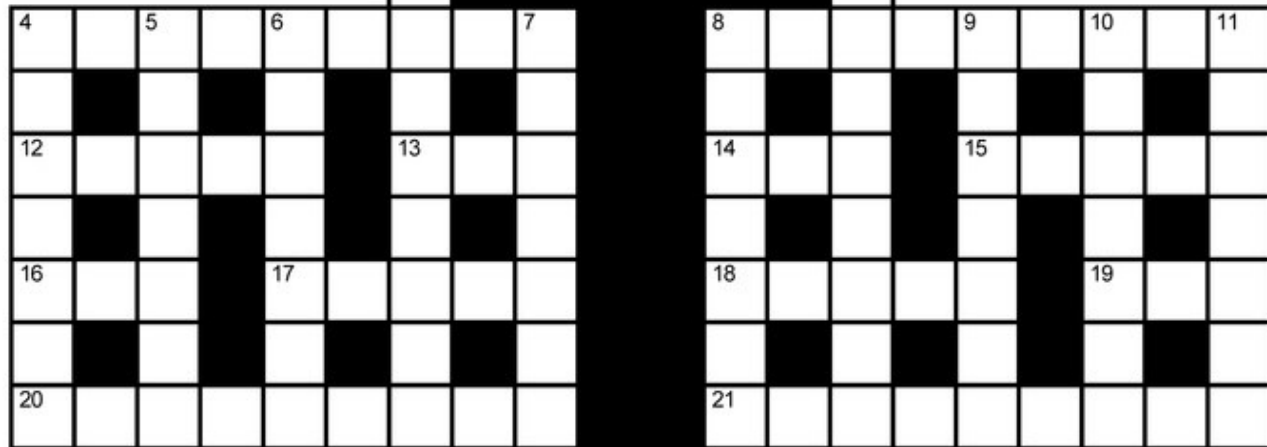

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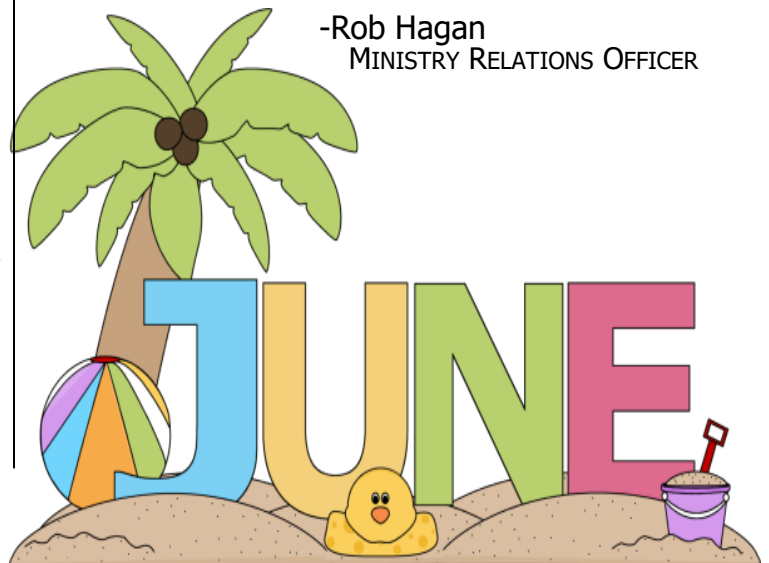

PCUSA Column—Gradye Parsons

There are eighty-nine years of living between my mother and my grandson. Yet they are experiencing similar journeys of self-discovery.

My mother lives with dementia. It would be inaccurate to say she suffers from it. She treats it more like a traveling partner. While she has forgotten a lot of good things, she also has forgotten a lot of hurts and angers. My grandson is acquiring knowledge by the minute. He is the proverbial mental vacuum cleaner. His imagination churns at warp speed. On a recent trip to a children's museum he created whole worlds to enjoy. Not very long ago he finally put it together that the little boy in the mirror was him. Those blue eyes and that smile looking at him was what the world sees. On a recent visit with my mother I showed her a photo of her and me. It took her a while to fully accept that it was her. Yes she does look like her mother. Yes your hair really is gray. And, yes, the son sitting next to you has gray hair too. The Committee on the Office of the General Assembly commissioned a study of how the PC(USA) sees itself these days.

It was an open-ended study in which anyone could participate. In combing through the 21,000 answers, a distinct family portrait emerges. That portrait reveals a church that cares about healthy congregations—healthy congregations that thrive, that faithfully live out the gospel, and that care about their community. The portrait reveals a people who set helping others as a priority. Helping others covers a variety of activities from food pantries to advocacy for justice. The strength of the answers shows the strong link between being a Christian and being God's hands to the world. A photo is a snapshot in time. If you look at old photos of yourself you might lament your youth. But if you look at current photos of yourself you can discover who you have become. The distinct family portrait of the PC(USA) shows us who we have become in our 310 years of life. I think we are looking pretty good at 310.

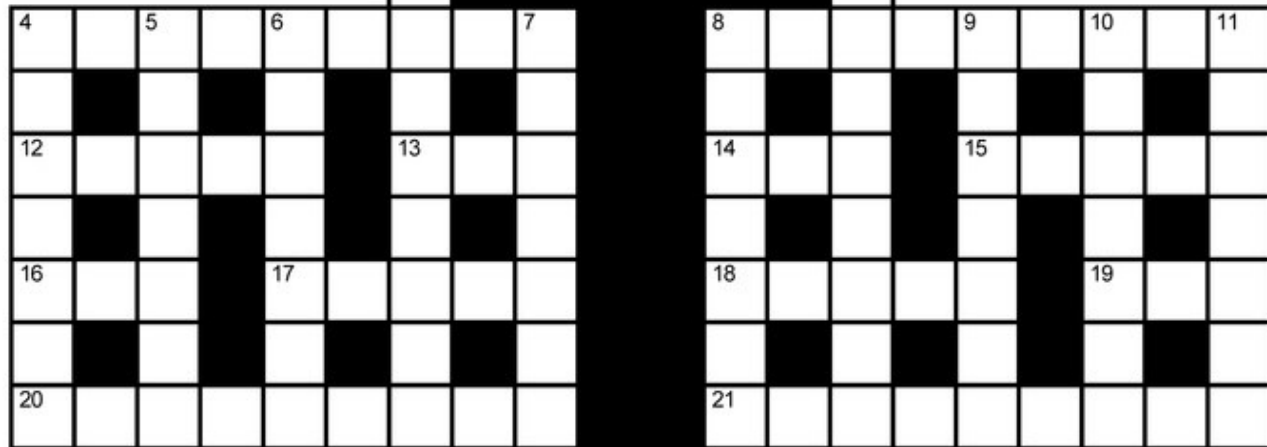

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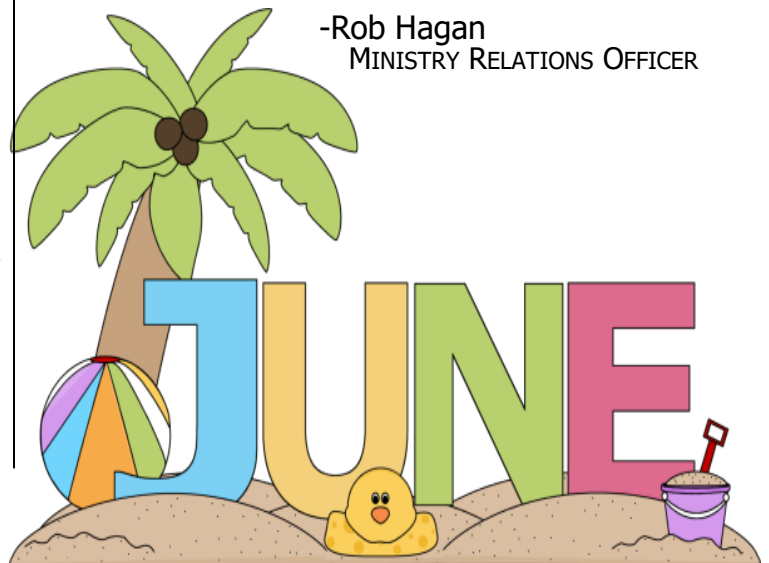

Maturity? When I was younger, I always struggled with this word. I saw it as stuffy, straight-laced, and old-fashioned. My dad would say, "When you are a grown-up you will understand." Now, I loved my dad - in fact he was one of my heroes. My father was part of what Tom Brokaw calls "the greatest generation." He embodied the word "mature." He always sacrificed for us. He never drank the last of the milk. "Save it for the kids," he would humbly say. He was not a clothes horse. Khaki work pants were his attire. He was generous to a fault. People adored and respected him. He didn't have a stodgy bone in his body. For his generation, maturity was less about being the best in the world than it was being the best for the world.

My father wanted to see the turn of the millennium in his lifetime. He did. He died on January 6, 2001, the day of the year designated by the church as Epiphany, the time when God's generous love was revealed to the Gentile world. On that day, the day of my father's death, I too had an epiphany, my own moment of revelation of the depth of my dad's generosity and sacrifice for the next generation. My father didn't see our children's graduations or celebrate their marriages. But in some ways he was present with us there in the background. His wise stewardship of life and resources in his will provided for our children after he was no longer there to witness the fruit of his generosity.

Maturity is not defined by age or demeanor; it is a matter of the heart. "Téleios," the Greek word for maturity, means "goal" or "complete." Another facet of the word is "ripe!" Thank goodness for that agrarian image! Maturity doesn't come all at once. We grow into it.

The ministry of the Foundation is to help congregations develop disciples who see the value and goal of giving to future generations. The Foundation deeply desires to walk beside congregations and individuals to develop the vision of legacy giving. The Live Forward Give Forward Wills program gives a step-by-step approach to help foster a vision of giving a legacy gift that will impact the future of a church's ministry.

Live Forward, Give Forward is about encouraging people to provide for the long-term mission of the church. To understand how the way they give now can have future impact, they need a

compelling vision of what that future can hold. This goes beyond programs, facilities and general operating budgets. They need to know what their investment in the mission of the church will help accomplish 10, 20, 50 or more years down the road.

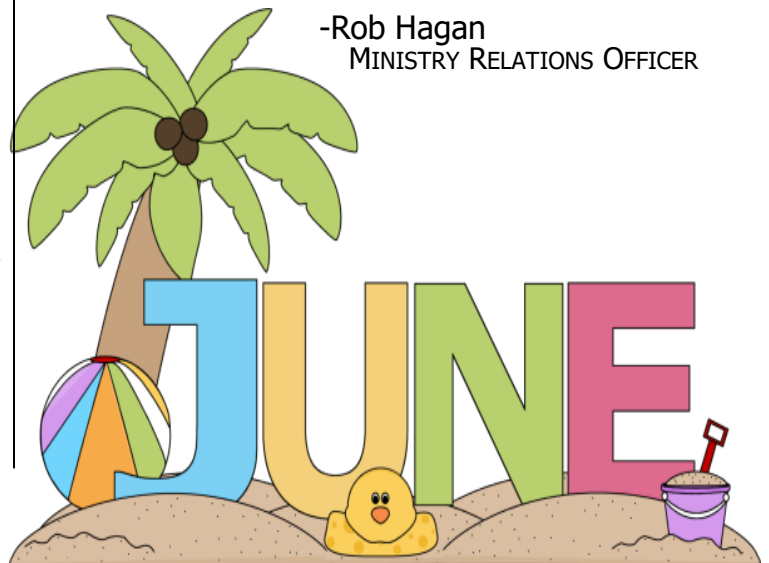
Please review your will. Make sure there is a charitable component to it. Leave a legacy gift. My father is my example. I desire to leave a legacy gift that under our Lord's hand will create mature disciples for years to come.

The Reverend Ernest Campbell summed up the legacy of maturity this way:

To be young is to study in schools
we did not build
To be mature is to build schools
in which we will not study
To be young is to swim in pools
we did not dig
To be mature is to dig pools
in which we will not swim
To be young is to sit under trees
which we did not plant
To be mature is to plant trees
under which we will not sit
To be young is to dance to music
we did not write
To be mature is to write music
to which we will not dance
To be young is to worship in churches
we did not build
To be mature is to build churches
in which we may not worship.

Can we take up this mantle of maturity? I believe we can. I believe it is our goal. Our "téleios."

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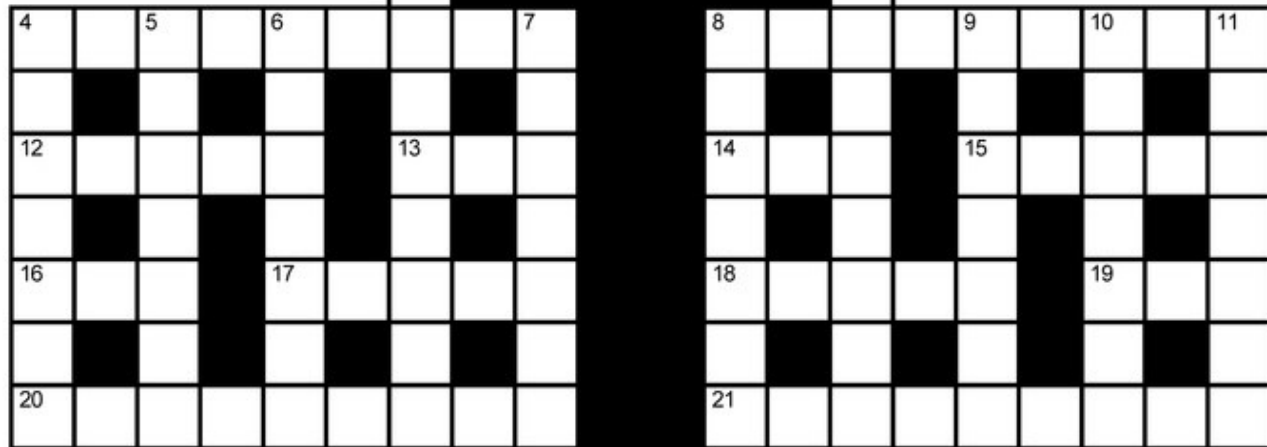
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
