FROM THE PASTOR

"Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?"

The COVID state of emergency is over, at least in New York State. All restrictions have been



lifted: we can go back to "normal." I don't like the new normal. I don't like the number of teenagers accused of killing other teenagers. I don't like the number of adults accused of killing other adults. I don't like that life is viewed as having little value. I HATE it when I see hoarding situations, where animals have been abused, starved, or simply neglected. I don't like how little regard we seem to have as a society for those who are "less" than we are.

Some might say that each of these situations reflects anger from being confined during COVID. They might be right. But, whatever the reason, we cannot continue, as God's people, to view others in God's creation as being deserving of abuse, neglect, or even death. We are all, from the greatest to the

least, equal in God's eyes. If God knows every feather on a sparrow's head, doesn't God also know every breath we take and every step we make? I'm not sure those who dispense what they consider to be justice understand this principle. I hope that we, as followers of Christ, do understand. Now that restrictions on our living have been lifted, we can see those we have missed, and surround them with love, we might even come into contact with those with whom we disagreed before the onset of COVID. First, we need to offer thanks that they are still alive! Then, we need to seek to rectify wrongs that might exist. All these actions stem from understanding we are all children of God. And, if we believe someone has committed a crime, it is not up to us to judge them. God is the ultimate judge. They will receive punishment for their wrongdoing.

We are free to go about our business now. We can see and greet people on the street; we can gather in restaurants, we can live again. Let all our living be done according to God's principles and purposes for our lives, and all life.

Church News:

• Worship Services:

Thanks to the CDC (and the New York state government), our sanctuary is back to normal. We are not required to wear masks, sit at a proper social distance or wave to people in greeting. Depending on each person's comfort level, we can even dispense hugs to our fellow congregation members - or accept them! There is no more special pew markings and members and visitors are welcome to sit where they wish.

We understand the hesitancy and safety concerns of some folk. Therefore, for those who cannot attend, or who are still not yet comfortable attending public services, we are continuing to tape and post Sunday's service that Sunday afternoon on our Facebook page.

However, the tapes are audio only (similar to a podcast) and we are only recording the scripture readings and Pastor Sue's sermon. In addition, Pastor Sue continues to lead a weekly prayer session. These will be livestreamed on our Facebook page on Thursdays at 8:30 am. The prayer service can be viewed live or accessed later by going to our Facebook page's Video section.

• Choir:

Wednesday, June 30, is the last Wednesday night rehearsal before the summer break (they'll continue to have an anthem on Sundays, but will only meet at 9:15 that Sunday before the service); they'll return to regular Wednesday practice after Labor Day. ● Food Cupboard:

As a continuing reminder, the food cupboards most needed items right now are toilet paper, hand soap, laundry detergent, dish soap and hearty soups. Because of shopping & purchasing restrictions (rationing), these are the hardest items to keep stocked. So please, buy an extra item on your next shopping trip and leave it in the box in the church entryway. Your donations are always well appreciated.

Parsonage Trees:

We had several diseased trees on the property at the parsonage. The trustees were able to get the trees cut down and removed. The best part is the company paid us to do the work and haul off the wood. Sure looks a lot neater at the parsonage. And it'll be a lot safer with the dying trees .





• June Blood Drive Results: We had a successful blood drive June 14, 2021. We met our goal and collected 33 units. These units will go on to help as many as 100 patients in need of a blood transfusion. Our thanks to the volunteers and donors who donate time or blood.

The next drive is Friday, August 13, 2021, from 1:00 - 6:00 PM in the East Bloomfield-Holcomb Fire Department (105 Main Street, Bloomfield).

• Fundraising:

We will be selling BBQ chicken on Sunday, July 11th at the Roseland Park Plaza on East Lake Road in Canandaigua (in front of TJ Maxx and Mightea Boba). We will start selling at 11:00 AM and go to 4:00 PM ... or until sold out). We will charge \$12 for a dinner (chicken half, salt potatoes, roll and your choice of coleslaw or macaroni salad). The chicken is to be cooked by Gale Wyn catering.

NOTE: Since we have to be in Canandaigua by 10:30, our worship service for that Sunday will begin an hour earlier (at 9:00 AM) so the BBQ workers can be ready to sell chicken at 11:00 AM. Please mark your calendars for both the change in the service time and the BBQ. We will remind folk as we get closer.
