

Tips: With Spring just around the corner, here are a few tips for gardening and house:

Set flower beds in a diamond pattern rather than in straight rows. They'll look fuller faster.

Place aromatic plants near the windows of your house so you can enjoy their fragrance.

- Kill sparse weed growth in walkways or patio cracks by pouring boiling water over it.
- A sturdy dinner fork makes a great weeding tool. Pull weeds after a moderate rain or a few hours after watering. Weeds are easier to remove if the soil is moist but not soaking wet.

Make mulch by spreading sheets of newspaper between flower or vegetable beds. Weigh paper down with rocks.

For low-cost fertilizer, add crushed eggshells to a gallon jug three-quarters filled with water. Let sit for a few days, then shake and use on blooming perennials.

- Store garden tools (shovels, spades, etc.) in a bucket of sand. It protects their edges and keeps them from resting.
- Remove firewood stored near the home. Firewood should be stored at least 18 inches off the grange at least 2 feet from the structure.

Check your gas- and battery-powered lawn equipment to make sure it is ready for

summer use. Lean equipment and sharp cutting blades will make yard work easier.

- Check for loose and leaky gutters. Improper drainage can lead to water in the basement or crawl space. Make sure downspouts drain away from the foundation and are clear and free of debris.
- Get a great non-streak shine on chrome fixtures and mirrors by using rubbing alcohol (which you probably keep in the bathroom anyway). Apply with a soft cloth or use cotton balls.

Legislative (complaint) Report by Kenneth Schlegel

Do our legislators get anything done while they're in session? In the last session ending at the end of 2022, PA legislators exacted 166 laws. That's the highest since the session which ended in 2016, in which 175 were enacted! Some of the accomplishments – they addressed fentanyl, deteriating homes, victim's rights, homelessness, budgeting process tax rates. For instance our corporate tax rates are the highest in the nation 9.99%. It has been lowered to 8.99% and will continue to go down over the coming years.

Another large number of laws were renaming bridges, interchanges, highways and roads. I'm sure many are waiting to have a traffic circle named after them.

Mark Rossi, a Berks County legislator, was named House Speaker. By the way, he has never attended one of our legislative banquets! Sandy Graffius, our County Controller for 20 years will be retiring. Every year we had a legislative banquet she was always the first to reply.

One thing that kind of surprised me was our past Govenor. In the last 8 years he has pardoned 2,540 convicts! Maybe the legislators past 166 laws, but well over 400 never made it out of committee! The power of one individual!! Ontelaunee Junior Grange

I would like to emphasize that each Grange should make sure they are covered with Fidelity Bonding insurance. What is Bonding Insurance? Fidelity Bonding is a type of insurance coverage to protect the financial assets of your Grange (Community, Pomona, or State). Bonding insurance coverage is included with the 2nd Quarterly Report to the PA State Grange. The Secretaries of each Subordinate Grange need to complete that particular section when submitting their quarterly membership information to the State Grange. I will distribute more information to the Presidents of the Community Granges at the March 4 Quarterly meeting at Gouglersville Grange hall.

In closing, I would like to provide the comments that were made by our National Grange President and the PA Secretary of Agriculture Russell Redding in the National Grange President's message of The Patrons Chain for January 13, 2023.

- National President Betsy Huber stated the theme for this year's Show (Farm Show) is "Rooted in Progress." It reminds me of our National Grange tagline, "American Values, Hometown Roots." PA Secretary of Agriculture Russell Redding stated, "Roots are the start of a legacy, allowing us to grow, keeping us grounded, and eventually allowing us to bear fruit that feeds and enriches the lives of others." We can apply this to the Grange as well as to agriculture.
- Redding continued, "It is holding onto your core values and traditions while being open to change and growth. It is why you plant a seed not for it to stay a seed, but for it to grow and flourish."
- President Huber further stated, that is what the Grange is about holding onto our values and traditions, while also being open to change to allow us to continue to grow and flourish in our communities. This would be a good topic for discussion at your Grange meeting. How should we change to allow continued growth, yet still hold onto our American values and hometown roots?
