CONTRADICTION?

t first glance, it may seem that this statement is a contradiction in terms. How can you say you believe and not believe at the same time? It doesn't make sense.

The words are spoken by the father of a boy who was possessed. He had brought his son to Jesus' disciples for healing but each of them failed in helping, so he was brought to Jesus. The father pleaded with Jesus to help: "if you are able". Jesus reassures him that all things are possible, and the man declares: "I believe; help my unbelief."

For me there is no contradiction. Had the father not believed the boy could be healed he wouldn't have wasted his time bringing him to Jesus. On the other hand, when faced with the reality of his little boy finally being healed, he hesitated. How many of us wouldn't do the same? Faced with all our dreams coming true, how many of us wouldn't doubt that it was 'too good to be true'!

ROOM FOR DOUBT

hen it comes to faith, there are lots of things that seem 'too good to be true', and so there's lots of room for doubt. Let me share some personal examples:

I believe in the resurrection. I believe in life after death. I really do. Yet, when faced with my friend's terminal illness and finally her death, I found myself asking "Do I really believe she is alive? Do I really believe in heaven? Do I really believe in God's all-embracing love and forgiveness?"

I believe that God is with us always, that his presence surrounds us in every moment and that he cares intimately about you and me and about our lives. Yet, in times when life is difficult and things aren't going the way I had hoped they would, and in times when life is downright hard, I find myself asking "Does God really care? Is he really with me?"

TAKING FAITH SERIOUSLY

he truth is that many of us have inherited our faith. Archbishop Desmond Tutu, in his book God is not a Christian, writes that "the accidents of birth and geography determine to a very large extent to what faith we belong. The chances are that if you were born in Pakistan you are a Muslim, or a Hindu if you were born in India... and a Christian if you were born in Italy." Whatever faith we have inherited, it is vital that as we mature, we own our faith for ourselves – and that means asking questions and discovering the answers that ring true for us personally.

Doubt can be the stimulus for these questions. It throws things up in the air, disrupts any complacency that may have set in, and gives us the chance to re-think things. In fact, I often find that asking questions and searching for answers only serves to strengthen my faith, not weaken it.

IT'S A GOOD THING

espite what some may say, the opposite of faith is not doubt – the opposite of faith is certainty! And so, when we experience times of doubt, it's not the bad thing it appears to be. It could even be said that struggling with God over issues we find difficult to understand is not a lack of faith – it is faith!

If you are still concerned, let me remind you that Jesus has said all you and I need is "faith the size of a mustard seed" (Luke 17:6). So, let's turn in honesty to God and pray that he "help my unbelief".

GOD'S WORD TODAY


How can you depict the excitement and surprise of Thomas as Jesus invites him to put his hand into his side and see for himself that he is the one who hung from the cross on Good Friday? The hand of Jesus still carries the print of the nails and his side is still a gaping wound. Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. In a world that has lost its sense of the value of the human person, St John Paul, in asking us to celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday with its Gospel of the wounded Lord, wished to restore to us a sense that a human person is valuable, not only when

it is healthy and beautiful. It is perhaps even more valuable when its first stirrings of life in the womb are regarded as a problem to be got rid of, or when it is frail and broken by illness, hovering on the edge of death for months, even years, as Pope John Paul would prove to be. When the human body is wounded and broken, the light of resurrection sometimes seems to glow most tellingly from its very woundedness.

Have you ever experienced doubt? I imagine everyone reading this reflection is answering "Yes" right now. We doubt whether someone is telling the truth or not... we doubt what decision to make... we doubt governments... we doubt a person's ability to do the job... we doubt if we can be forgiven... we even doubt ourselves. And yes, at times, we doubt our faith.

I have good news for you – you are not alone! The three words we are considering this week are "Help my unbelief". I have taken them from the Gospel of Mark (9:24) and they are the final three words of the infamous statement: "I believe; help my unbelief!"
