Dear Friends,

Both Brentwood and Upminster [Methodist Churches] are at varying stages of thinking, talking, planning, or already developing how we use our premises and what they are for – varying within each church and varying within each individual. I would suggest first and foremost our [Methodist] Churches are for people; for people to encounter a loving and welcoming God.

Many of you haven't met my eldest daughter Tyler. In her 22 years of life, Ty has often been defined by her disability: registered disabled at an early age; underwent ground-breaking work in Cerebral Palsy at Great Ormond Street Hospital; statemented at school; now with a full mobility car - I could say more. I sat with her at a recent hospital appointment and clearly heard a surgeon say "the next phase of surgery doesn't need to be done just yet, we can wait, but your joints are wearing out and we can pin and screw them together, but you'll always be in pain – there's nothing we can do about the pain". It was startling to realise that this actually cheered her up! She said to me "well you see Dad, the pain thing isn't what scares me: I've always lived with the pain but I really don't like getting pulled about all the time – it's my body - and they've been sticking needles in me; stretching muscles and cutting ligaments, breaking and re-breaking bones since I can remember – I don't like the operations as I'm always so scared of the loneliness that comes with the recovery".

A recent infection means that two of Ty's toes will be amputated very soon, later the remaining toes will have metal inserts, her ankles will be fused, then her hips pinned and more. I've witnessed how people talk 'down at her' at times when she needs use of her wheelchair; how steps (that many of us just don't think about) can become huge barriers; how a seemingly small lip on a door entrance forms a visual and physical barrier from entering a building: I've recognised the loneliness she spoke of.

We are on a journey and part of the destination at which we hope to arrive is to develop our church premises to be accessible to ALL – and to everywhere in the buildings'. Yes, it is costly – in many ways. It is what it is. We have old buildings that need updating. I've heard it said that, 'John Wesley sat lightly to the buildings'. He considered it more important that they be fit for the purpose of our collective mission: fit for people and fit for the people to come to an experience of a loving God – who welcomes ALL.

Here, it seems appropriate to add that it's not just the buildings - it's often our presumptions, perspectives and fears that need to be updated, developed and healed.

I remember as a 12-year-old boy standing looking up at a seemingly impossible task. My father had died. I decided to decorate the hallway, the banister rail, the upstairs landing and ceiling. My father was working on this when he died: I needed to pick up the tools and continue the work. I remember thinking "How on earth am I going to do this? How do I get all the way up to that ceiling - where will I lean the ladder?" I needed to remember: to remember how my Dad had been doing it. Tentatively I lent the ladder and I climbed – with paint-brush and pot in hand – I'd seen him do it and now I had to.

It's the season of All Saints' and All Souls', when we remember our loved ones. They were the ground breakers and the modernisers; they were those who worked hard in faith to bring us to the 'here and now' and without them we are nothing. To truly honour them, to truly remember them, we go forward in faith – as they went forward in faith.

I was not yet a teenager when my father died, and I learnt that you simply have to continue the work of the previous generation. No matter how much you love them - you simply have to paint over their paint, install that new door or whatever it is. They are still with you – for they gave you the tools and the knowledge to keep going forward – and in doing so we find our healing amidst the grieving. I also learnt that it's now our task to pass this on to the next generation – so let's get our part done so they can pick up from us.

I have quoted before, "Saints are just people who are trying to listen to God's word and live God's call. This is "the communion of saints" that we speak of in the Apostle's Creed -- that fellowship of believers that reaches beyond time and place, even beyond death.

Remembering the saints who have helped extend and enliven God's kingdom is what All Saints' Day is about."

And it is always in each moment that we live it. God is with us all,

So – thank you all for making our Harvest a very special occasion.




CALAIS FOOD COLLECTION


The fish is in for repair, as all those coins were very heavy! It will return (by popular demand), when we will look forward to your generosity again in colouring it's scales with any shade of coin.
