## Strata Quilt - Guild Workshop Materials List

In a day long workshop it is essential that you choose to make a very small strata quilt. We will be working quickly through many steps and this will simplify the process. I would recommend that you plan on making it no larger than 14" x 18".

You will need to choose your fabrics and yarns before class or plan to purchase a kit from me. The kit will include all cotton fabrics, silk organza and yarn. (\$30) Please bring your own thread for piecing, thread for quilting, batting and backing.

Please bring a sewing machine in good working order with a walking foot and a cording foot or open toe darning foot. (Bernina #20 Open Toe Foot, Bernina #21 Braiding Foot or #22 Cording Foot) Google pictures of these feet to best find the right foot for your brand of machine.

Cutting mat, rotary cutter, scissors, thread snips.

Fray check, Starbucks large straw, masking tape.

Compass or round jar lids to use as templates for organza circles. Sizes ranging from  $4^{\circ}$  –  $6^{\circ}$  diameter. Batiks, striped batiks or printed fabrics in your choice of coordinated colors – 5 – 7 fabrics.

Silk organza in 3-5 colors. Synthetic organza can be used but is harder to manage. I will have a considerable amount of silk organza for sale.

Yarn – worsted weight in colors to coordinate with your fabrics in 4 or 5 colors. I will have some for sale. Thread: a limited amount will be available for purchase




At the May meeting, we laughed our way through the workshop while we learned from David Sirotta. I, for

#### A Courthouse Quilters Exhibit at the Lebanon Township Museum

At our May meeting, the membership approved an invitation from the Lebanon Township Museum to create an exhibit of quilts celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Women's Suffrage in the United States. In 1920, the U.S. passed the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment giving women the right to vote. New Jersey passed the amendment in February 1920, so the museum curator would like to display our quilts for the month of February 2020.

Here are the details:

- Quilts will be displayed at the museum for the month of February 2020.
- Maximum size: 48"x48", no minimum.
- Not a competition. All quilts must be completed by the guild meeting on December 8, 2019. They will be shared in the Show & Tell at that meeting.



• You may make as many as you like, but put them in priority order.

There are many sources of inspiration for making a quilt with the suffrage theme.

- You might chose to focus on color. Gold was chosen as the color to represent Women's Suffrage. Shades range from buttercup to cheddar.
- You might chose to make one or more of the many blocks that were created to represent Women's Suffrage.
- You might chose to look through old photos of the suffragettes and print them on fabric or recreate them in fabric.
- You might chose to use a slogan from the time.



• You might chose an art deco theme – very popular 100 years ago.

• Of course, you may already be inspired and have something in mind.





# April 2019 - Show and Tell



April 14, 2019 Courthouse Quilters Board Meeting Notes FINAL

At 4:30 meeting was called to order by Ellen Heath and seconded by Alice Sprenger

Formal approval of March minutes by Andrea Cavallaro and seconded by Alice Sprenger

**Executive Board** 

President: Ellen Heath Thank you to Cass Garner for handling the board leadership responsibilities in the last few months.

Clarification of use of email blasts - Discussed sending blasts if someone has affiliation with our guild who is running the event and if there's a deadline before the next newsletter. Everyone is okay with getting notifications for relevant things. If it becomes too much we'll revisit it.

Clarification of issues surrounding guild mailbox - someone needs to check it regularly, our president lives an hour from it. UPS Store will give you an address, can forward mail to someone at extra charge and will hold the mail. Hours at the UPS store are convenient. We'll arrange for mail to be forwarded to Ellen's house. We could then change the records with IRS and state of NJ should be changed too. Andrea and Patty to address this before the next meeting.

Clarification of timely approval of minutes - Patricia to start putting "final" at the top, "as approved," or "draft" minutes. We only distribute minutes to the membership once approved, but can clarify and answer questions about them as asked.

Reminder to Show Venue Committee - Patty reported on some work done to locate a new venue and criteria for consideration. Committee working on a report to finalize the recommendation.

Discussion of possible "Stash Buster" table at meetings - Proposing a calendar of who will bring their stash and donate a small amount of what's left to the boutique. Put it out there to see if anyone wants to do it for a few months.

Vice President/Program: Stephanie Greenberg/Cass Garner

W9s and 1099s and our responsibilities - Patty has written up the process and sent out to everyone. We are sending the w9 forms with contracts to speakers. Andrea keeps them. Sara Bond is still outstanding. It's the speakers responsibility to file them.

Review of revised contract for guest speakers - Tabled this topic until it can be resent as a PDF or Word. It doesn't have to be approved by the board, but just to have people review it.

Introduction of new idea for 2020 challenge - Cass is asking people to submit their ideas for the challenge by Oct and announce in Nov. The committee will choose it and initiate a write up in the newsletter. There will be guidelines in the newsletter for it.

Treasurer: Andrea Cavallaro - provided the treasurer's report. Report was accepted by the board by Ellen, Alice

seconded it.

Recording Secretary: Patricia Crowell - Agreed to "resend" the approved March meeting notes since it was not received by the board as planned.

We were contacted by Mancuso event for the B&W quilt. If we have agreement today we'll see if it's realistic to provide our quilts.



## Raspberry Riccotta Cheese Cake

Nonstick vegetable oil spray 1½ cups all-purpose flour 1 cup sugar 2 teaspoons baking powder ¾ teaspoon kosher salt 3 large eggs 1½ cups ricotta ½ teaspoon vanilla extract ½ teaspoon vanilla extract ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, melted 1 cup frozen raspberries or blackberries, divided


RECIPE PREPARATION Preheat oven to 350°. Line a 9"-diameter cake pan with parchment paper and lightly coat with nonstick spray. Whisk flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt in a large bowl.

Whisk eggs, ricotta, and vanilla in a medium bowl until smooth; fold into dry ingredients just until blended. Then fold in butter, followed by ¾ cup raspberries, taking care not to crush berries. Scrape batter into prepared pan and scatter remaining ¼ cup raspberries over top.

Bake cake until golden brown and a tester inserted into the center comes out clean, 50–60 minutes. Let cool at least 20 minutes before unmolding.

Do Ahead: Cake can be made 2 days ahead. Store tightly wrapped at room temperature.







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
