#### PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Hello again to all and welcome back.

Last month our presentation was by Ron
Vaughan on the Battle of Pea Ridge. Thanks
Ron for the nice job. It is always great to

a wonderful job as our program chair.

We have recently gotten word from Civil War Preservation Trust that the acquisitions at Bentonville are now complete; 6.2 acres have been closed on at Bristoe Station, and a deal is in process which will save 60 acres at the Mansfield battlefield site in Louisiana. Right now Civil War Preservation Trust is working with Central Virginia Battlefields Trust to rescue more ground from development at Chancellorsville at the site of Jackson's Flank Attack on May 2, 1863. Jackson was later to die at Chancellorsville, killed by confederate fire. Lee was to say later that he lost his right arm when he lost Jackson.

Much progress is being made to save hallowed ground but much more remains to be done. The SJVCWRT is contributing to many of the fund-raising drives to save this land, particularly when preservation organizations are coming up with matching funds. Our dollars can then go so much farther. I would encourage members to consider joining the preservation organizations and contributing individually when possible. We are running short on time to rescue these sacred grounds from the developers who would buy these lands for malls, shopping centers, and residential developments.

We are still in need of a volunteer for the publicity for SJVCWRT. Lydia has done an excellent job and will help the new person get started. Please see me or any of the officers or board members if you can be of help with this vital job.

This month we are happy to have Ray Avila come to Fresno to speak on General Kershaw. Ray has spoken to our group before and always does a fine job.



The Trans-Mississippi Theater was unique: The Federals were usually outnumbered and out gunned. In contast to the Eastern Theater, in the West, it was often the Confederates who were poorly led, poorly organized and poorly trained. Due to their experience in the Mexican War and Indian fighting, Westerners used more practical tactics, such as greater use of skirmishers, fighting from a prone position, and close artillery support. There was much greater depredation to civil life due to over zealous foraging and guerrilla activity. Western Federals were more motivated than Eaterners, because so many had been actively involved in working to make their State part of the Union. Western Confederates were more conservative, less avid about States Rights and Slavery, and more divided in their loyalties. Indian troops served

1807 in N.Y., was a West Point grad, a civil engineer, a lawyer, Congressman, Mexican War vet, promoted to Brig Gen 12/25/61 and assigned to command the SW District of Missouri. He has been described as a mediocre commander, deliberative and unimaginative, but he had some able subordinates, among them Q.M. Capt. Phil Sheridan, whose superb staff work made possible the advance of the army 200 miles beyond its base. In any event, he won a battle at a time when other Union armies were not, except Grant at Ft. Donelson. Curtis was promoted to Maj. Gen. after the victory and remained in command of the District. He later would repell Price's 1864 large scale raid into Mo.

Curtis's second in command was Brig Gen. Franz Sigel, ex Minister of War for the 1848 German Revolutionary Government. He was teaching at the St. Louis Military School when the war broke out and helped rally and organize the German-American volunteers for

the Union. Sigel made the list of the wars worst generals, but at Pea Ridge, he ably conducted a dangerous US withdrawal in the face of overwhelming forces, and later used his artillery in excellent close support of the Union attack.

Commander of Missouri Troops was Maj. Gen. Stirling Price. He was born in Va. in 1809, moved to Mo., where he was elected to the Legislature, Congress and Governor's office. He was commander of the Mo. State Guard at the outbreak of the war. He was a natural leader and his men affectionately called him "Old Pap". He could not get along with the commander of Confederate Arkansas/Texas Troops, Brig. Gen. Ben McCulloch.

McCulloch was born in 1811 in Tenn. He fought under Houston in the Texas Revolution, and raised a Ranger company for the Mexican War. He was a good scout, fighter, organizer, and disciplinarian (discipline was something the Mo. troops lacked). He derisively called the Mo. troops "Huckleberry Cavalry".

Because of the lack of co-operation between Price and McCulloch, President Davis appointed Maj. Gen. Earl Van Dorn to command the Army of the West. When he recieved the news, Van Dorn wrote to his wife, "I must have St. Louis, then Huzza!" HE was a West

Point grad, 52nd in a class of 56, served in the US 7th Infantry in the Mexican War and the Commanche War, where he was wounded 4 times.

The fourth Confederate character was Albert Pike, a Harvard grad and lawyer, with no military experience, who was appointed CSA Commissioner to the Indians.

He successfully concluded treaties with the Five Civilized Tribes to side with the CSA. Unfortanately, his efforts came to nought, when his Indians became totally disorganized in their excitment over their capture of a US battery. He had not been informed of the battle plan, but found himself in command of McCulloch's Div., after McCulloch and both his Brigde commanders were killed or captured.

The Confederate Army suffered 1,000 casualties, 300 captured and thousands missing in the disasterous retreat. General Sigel wrote "It was not a "great" battle. like Gettysburg..., but it virtually cleared S.W. Mo. of the enemy, gave peace to the people of Mo. at least for 2 years, and made it possible for our veterans to reinforce the armies under Rosecranz, Grant, and Sherman."




