CIWI Sponsors, Key Stakeholders, and Supporters.

With five years under of our belt, CIWI continues to hold closely to our mission...to provide access, exposure, and opportunities for lower-income college students (majority first generation) with an interest in Construction, Real Estate Development, A&E and Civic Engagement.

A quick snapshot includes the following key Accomplishments and Milestones (2012-2016):

- CIWI has delivered 48 internships;
 - 100 percent of the internships have gone to students of color, including:
 - African American: 23 interns (48%)
 - Latino: 18 interns (38%)
 - Asian/Pacific Islander: 7 interns (15%)
- Targeted outreach to core program market areas including San Francisco's District 10 (Bayview/Hunters Point) and Oakland's District 3 (Downtown Oakland/West Oakland), as well as Central and East Oakland.
- Expanded partnerships with four key community-based educational organizations including: College Track, East Bay College Fund, and Juma Ventures and the inclusion of Lighthouse Community Charter High School (East Oakland).
- Internships by participating sponsors includes:
 - General Construction: 28 Internships (59%)
 - Real Estate Development: 17 internships (35%)
 - Architecture & Engineering: 3 Internships (6%)
- In 2016, CIWI significantly expanded its funding sources and partners as follows:
 - First public sector grant (SF PUC/Project Learning Grant), a multi-year partnership and investment (\$20,000, including development of unique environmental/sustainability learning program, L+SIP);
 - First large-scale investment from a private sector partner by Lendlease totaling over \$55,000, allowing for the development of an innovative partnership with CIWI for the 2017 program; and
 - First investment from a A/E/C industry partner, Make the Connection (MTC) for \$14,000.











Internships: By Discipline/Scope, 2012-2016




CIWI INTERNS: BY THE NUMBERS


Number of Interns

CIWI has developed its program goals to achieve realistic and sustainable growth. CIWI has grown from two internship positions in 2012 to 15 interns in 2016. Over our first five years, CIWI has delivered a total of 48 internships.



Community Based Partners

CIWI has established strong partnerships with grass-roots partners including College Track, East Bay College Fund, Juma Ventures. In 2016, we included Lighthouse Community Charter HS, based in East Oakland.




Ethnicity

CIWI has achieved strong diversity over our first five years. We have created specific outreach strategies to maximize our efforts in San Francisco's D10 and Oakland's D3 communities. 100 percent of our 48 internship positions have been secured by students of color.



Technical Skill and Civic Engagement Impact/Total Hours.

Since 2012, CIWI interns have secured approximately 13,000 hours of technical training and civic engagement exposure through their internship positions.

Working closely with our key CBO partners, CIWI has achieved gender equity in our placements, with 24 internships secured by young women and 24 internships secured by young men.

NEW PARTNERS + FUNDERS + INITIATIVES



In 2016, CIWI secured its first public sector grant with the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SF PUC). This two-year grant (\$10,00 per year) allowed CIWI to design and implement its innovative LEED+Sustainable Infrastructure Program (L+SIP).

In partnership with several key stakeholders and guest speakers (including representatives from Thorton Tomassetti, John Stewart Co. and Mithun|Solomon, L+SIP provided our interns with a solid understanding with project specific LEED training, infrastructure system training, and an overview of Bayview (D10's) infrastructure system. CIWI incorporated sponsor projects (e.g., HOPE SF/Hunters View) to design its project learning program integrating the principles of smart growth, urbanism and green building. CIWI interns also participated in several PUC facility site tours including the PUC's LEED Gold Administrative Building, Southwest Treatment Plant, and the Contractor's Assistance Center (CAC).

In 2016, Lendlease hosted a charity golf tournament raising \$55,700 to support CIWI. This is CIWI's first private sector large-scale investment and represents a powerful way to close out our first five years and embark on our next five years.

These funds will be earmarked for CIWI's 2017 summer internship program and specifically to design and implement (in partnership with Lendlease) a targeted program for their six interns.


Lendlease's investment could not come at a better time. With five years of service under our belt, CIWI will be able to successfully plan and invest in our 2017 program in several significant and impactful ways. These include expanding our team of key industry stakeholders, but most importantly Lendlease's investment will allow CIWI to grow our 2017 program by approximately 40 percent. This is an absolute first for CIWI and one that we intend to leverage and maximize.


