#### New Practices in Lent

Later this month, the season of Lent will begin. This often leads to opportunities for us to think about spiritual disciplines, which often includes such things as the practice of fasting. I'd like to offer up two possible spiritual disciplines that you can consider trying out during Lent. I encountered the ideas for these two spiritual disciplines in a conference I attended some years ago during a session led by a woman named Lauren Winner. She described four spiritual disciplines, but I'd like to highlight two of them.

The first spiritual discipline is that of reading and/or encountering the Bible in unusual places. That is, taking the time to read scripture in places that we would not normally do so. Most of the time, we read scripture at home, or at church, but not many other places. This spiritual discipline asks of us to read the Bible in other places, perhaps at work, or in a restaurant, or out in nature. It can be either silent or spoken, and can come from any passage in the Bible. When we do so, it can often offer us up new perspectives on what we are reading than we might otherwise have found. To put this into practice for Lent would simply require a commitment to read a bit of scripture every day in a new and different place.

The second spiritual discipline is that of self-knowledge. That is, taking time to think about and reflect upon what really matters to us. This might sound a bit strange, an unusual spiritual discipline. After all, spiritual disciplines are supposed to be activities that offer us opportunities to connect with God. But if we stop and think about it, taking the time to know ourselves better offers us the opportunity to get in deeper contact with our nature as created beings who come from God. Winner put it this way in her description of this practice: "self-knowledge is both a fruit of and a prerequisite of knowledge of God." That is, when we get to know God, we know ourselves better. And, when we know ourselves better, we can better know God.

How, then, can we work at this? One possibility that was lifted up was drawn from some writings by Toni Morrison. First, take some time to write down a list of everything that you have to do on a regular basis. This can be an interesting experience in and of itself, and can help us to understand ourselves a little better. But the second step is just as, or more important than, the first one. It is to go through our list and

find the things that you can not refrain from doing and remain who you are. Then, after identifying these core things, look at your list again and see what is getting in the way of doing those practices that are essential to who you are. Finally, then, you can begin to work towards eliminating those things that are distracting you from your essentials.

These, of course, are not the only spiritual practices out there. But I found that these struck a particular chord with me, and wanted to share them with you all. Whether you try out one of these spiritual practices, or some other, I'd like to invite each of us to commit to doing at least one new spiritual discipline during Lent this year, and, hopefully, continuing with that after Lent is over.


# **Nurture Commission**

### **Upcoming Brethren Academy Courses**

#### Church of the Brethren Polity

March 10-May 4, 2021, Instructor: Torin Eikler

This is an online course and Academy students will receive one credit in Ministry Skills upon completion. In this course, we will engage the current and past polity of the Church of the Brethren in order to understand how it has, and continues to, shape "another way of living."

The registration deadline is February 3. You may register online at https://bethanyseminary.edu/brethren-academy.

Online classes "meet" for 8 weeks in Moodle, a virtual classroom platform. The Brethren Academy provides each student with their own Moodle access code before the course starts. They will also provide a Moodle tutorial if one is needed.

New lessons are posted once a week, once the course begins, and students are given a week to complete their assignments. Students can log on at any time, day or night, to read lectures, watch videos, work on group projects and/or engage in forums (email-style conversations) with their classmates. In this way, online courses are fairly flexible.

Persons interested in taking an Academy course for continuing education credit (CEU) or personal enrichment (PE) may enroll as a student and select their category (CEU or PE) upon registration.

#### Defining Set-Apart Ministry Within the Multivocational Reality

April 7 - June 1, 2021, Instructor: Sandra Jenkins

Participants will receive one credit in Ministry Skills upon completion.

Multivocational ministry is a reality in many denominations. It is not only a calling, but a necessity; part-time ministry placements often outnumber full-time placements. This class will explore the set-apart ministry within the multivocational context, including the rewards and challenges for both pastor and congregation.

Doing Church Differently: Ministry in Times of Crisis

May 5 - June 29, 2021, Instructor: Debbie Eisenbise

Participants will receive one credit in Ministry Skills upon completion.

This course examines how pastors are called to lead and assist congregations in adapting to maintain organizational integrity, pastoral viability, and foster spiritual growth in the midst of corporate/community crises (natural disasters, active shooter incidents, pandemics, climate crises, etc.).

# Camp Mack - Seeing More Than Expected in 2020

I recently saw a class picture from my year in kindergarten (1963-64). Except for my teacher and the principal, I was the only one wearing glasses. That's not even the worst of it. I had been wearing glasses for at least a year before the picture. Needless to say, I have never experienced twenty-twenty vision.



We use that phrase to describe "perfect" vision, but what it really means is that the person who has it is able to see what he or she is expected to see. That concept really hit me as I started to think about the year 2020.

As the world came crashing down around us in March, we saw much that we hoped would not happen, but they were expected. We saw cancellations of retreats and events, camps, programs, and long-held traditions. We postponed our annual dinner, and we, like everyone else, experienced isolation.

We asked ourselves how we would manage to provide a sanctuary where people connect with God, experience creation, and build Christian community. That mission was clear. What was not clear was how we could connect people when people were not supposed to be together. How could we continue to be in ministry when our main sources of revenue had vanished?

It was time to challenge ourselves to live out our faith. We began by reminding ourselves daily that we are in God's hands and so our response should be to pray faithfully and work diligently. That simple concept

became the foundation of our work through this year. The result is that we saw incredible things happen. A mission from Warsaw became a new ministry for us. A Peace Garden and high ropes course were built using truly dedicated volunteers and money that had been raised for those purposes. Roofs were replaced; cabins were painted; important repair and maintenance was completed. We developed new relationships. The capital campaign had raised the money for a long overdue health center, and construction of that center will be completed early in the new year. We met new people. We learned to do new things. We found smiling generous people who gave us time and money, so we could survive.

In 2020, we saw what we expected to see, but we truly saw so much more. We have seen the power of love and the strength of Christian community in ways we had never dreamed of. We have experienced the wonder of faith and trust in God.

Twenty-twenty vision is a good thing, but it has boundaries. As this new year begins, we are hopeful that we can return to the mission of Holy Hospitality, but we are also mindful that there is more. We have seen what happens when we stop looking only at what is before us and allow God to give us the vision of what is possible.

We still have many struggles ahead of us as we emerge from the pandemic, but I have faith in the community of Camp Mack, because that community is a community of God.






