vícar's Notes

Dearly Beloved,

Thus begins the rite of Holy Matrimony, which is on my mind of late because three couples have invited me into sharing this moment in their relationships lately: two having just occurred and another round the bend in No-

vember. Autumn is a wonderful time to for couples to make their vows, and begin a new season in their own cycle of love. Fall, when the days grow shorter and colder, trees drop their leaves, and animals hibernate the earth reminds us of the need for Sabbath. Weddings tend to focus on newness, possibilities – but not so much about dropping leaves, storing acorns, and setting up for the length of winter. Yet weddings, for all the sense of "beginning" they bring, offer us signs of love and hope, very much needed in the autumns and winters of the human condition. Every wedding is a chance to remember and give witness to the power of God's love, and the deep peace of God for which we were created.

Every time a couple makes their vows, and every time we who witness them vow to support them, we bear testimony the belief that even in a time when the condition of many is horrible (war, human slavery, poverty, terrible diseases....), love is possible, and that it is necessary. That is a lot to ask of a couple and their wedding, which is why it takes a room full of folks vowing to support them... yet every time a couple come together to celebrate the love that has grown, and to commit themselves to one another for life, they do so with faith in their love and confident in their hope. Every time we come together as church, we have an opportunity to do the same thing – give thanks to God with faith in God's love toward us, an confident in the peace of Christ.

As Holy Family begins the year of celebrating its silver jubilee at its house of worship at 1590 Cabrillo Highway South (and kicks off the Children's Center's 25th year!), and as Good Shepherd joins with us in shared ministry, we not only recall the achievements of our past, but claim love and hope for our present, confident in a future that God has in store for us. Kind of like weddings in autumn. As we work

together, we can be thankful for over 160 years of ministry between us, and more importantly, recommit ourselves to following the way of Jesus now, for whom we claim our past and in whom we name our future.

Musings from the Junior Warden

This is not the church of my childhood- I was born and raised Anglican (Canada) and attended Sunday Services with my family, first in a Cathedral, and later in a large community church.

I was familiar with the service from the Book of Common Prayer, and kneeling to pray. There were beloved hymns that I enthusiastically sang, even if not completely on key, and a huge pipe organ and choir. The regular congregation members sat in "their" unofficially designated pews; the church membership was very stable.

As an adult, I took decades-long sabbatical leave from regular church attendance. Upon my return to church and to becoming a parishioner at Holy Family, I noted several changes.

First, rather than the grand cathedral, the church was small and intimate and next to a barn. The Sunday service was printed on leaflets, and you stood to pray. The Vicar was a woman, and a lesbian (I belonged). Sometimes my beloved familiar hymns were sung. There was a small organ, no pipes, and a piano, and choir.

The regular congregation members did not have "their" favorite pew, they move around from Sunday to Sunday, and in life too (many comings and goings, due to job opportunities, life transitions etc.)

And so, all these remembrances lead me to conclude that our church is alive and vital and changes as times, places, and people change. What has not changed is the message "You are Loved Beyond Measure", and the fellowship I experience among the congregation members as we travel on our spiritual journeys.

GOOD SHEPHERD'S MUSIC WITH A MISSION ~~ TAKING SHAPE AND SOUND



Vicar Michael, the Bishops Committee and members of GS are planning to host a monthly concert series as a mission of the church. A complex and evolving endeavor, the motivation: share the love of Christ with music, by providing a special venue for musicians to perform their best with a church sponsored "support package". The "package" includes site location, advertisement, promotion, reception and refreshments for

performers and their audience. For a community, non-professional musician this is a dream come true! Just make the music, and Good Shepherd takes care of the details in collaboration with the performers. And revenue? No tickets no sales; free will offerings gratefully accepted at the concert. Not the way to capitalize a business, but the way of faith to support a mission.

The intention here is to place Good Shepherd Episcopal Church, Belmont on the mental map of as many people as possible with an enriching experience. 'However many people walk thru the doors of Good Shepherd is all for the good,' says Michael+. 'The more good reasons we create for people to walk thru our doors is how we support the community and grow.' A monthly concert series just might be one of those good reasons.

So, to practice hosting a monthly concert series, before committing to do so, means actually to do it, practice like a musician does and get feed- back. Host a concert, or two or three. Good Shepherd is hosting three monthly sample concerts including reception/refreshments and a brief focus-group discussion immediately following the performance to reap audience and performers feedback. September saw the first concert, Rust-Edelmann, a cello/ bassoon duo. Wonderfully successful, the concert had good attendance (55!) and received donations sufficient to cover the cost.

Concert #2 is Sunday 10/26 3pm, a classical music concert of four ensembles around the piano, for flute, violin, cello, clarinet, and soprano voice. A delightful, intimate and beautiful mix and remixing of these instruments over the course of four compositions, including

(fittingly for the occasion) Shepherd on the Rock by Franz Shubert.

Please help support the discernment process to make this a "shared ministry" if we move forward. Attend the concert, bring friends, invite others, give feedback by filling in a survey provided at the concert or by attending the focus-group discussion after the performance.

Anti-Human Trafficking Shared Ministry Event



On Sunday, August 24th, Good Shepherd hosted a special event to raise awareness about the growing problem of human trafficking in the Bay Area.

The event began with a worship service which included Sister Margaret Hoffman of Notre Dame de Namur University as guest preacher. Sister Margaret has become increasingly involved in helping to educate the community about the prevalence of human trafficking in the bay area, and its effect on both the victims involved and the community as a whole. Following the service, a luncheon was held which featured Judith Hamilton, an Advocate with Freedom House, as guest speaker. Freedom House is an organization dedicated to saving lives by helping victims of human trafficking to escape life on the streets. It is the only organization in the Bay Area providing shelter to victims of trafficking, and its programs include

- 1) Counseling and life skills training,
- 2) Connecting victims with the necessary resources to begin rebuilding their lives
- 3) Providing education and outreach to law enforcement agencies and community organizations.

Sister Margaret and Judith Hamilton presented a comprehensive overview of the prevalence of trafficking, both on an international scale and here in our local communities. They emphasized that this issue continues to grow at an
