On patrol in the Caribbean, United States Coast Guard Cutter NORTHLAND (WMEC-904) has a chance encounter with a disoriented fisherman in harm's way. Read below for the rest of the story. NORTHLAND is a 270' medium endurance cutter with a crew of 100 and homeported in Portsmouth, VA. Richmond Council formerly adopted NORTHLAND April 1999.

THEY SERVE – WE SUPPORT

NORTHLAND dealt with severe weather arriving in the Caribbean, namely Hurricane Laura. NORTHLAND prepared for the storm by positioning ourselves in a sheltered location to keep the crew and NORTHLAND safe and ready to answer any call of assistance. On

our way to our weather avoidance location, we encountered a fisherman on a small dugout canoe who was disoriented and had no idea he was as far out to sea as he was. He also didn't know that a tropical storm was heading his way. **NORTHLAND** provided him some water and

food, and then escorted him with the ship back to within sight of shore, where he was able to make a safe landfall before the storm arrived. (story extracted from **NORTHLAND's** ship report on page 5).

WORDS OF WISDOM – "SCRAPS FROM THE LUCKY BAG"

The term "Lucky Bag" comes from sea lore. In 1840-1841 Matthew Fontaine Maury's "Scraps from the "Lucky Bag" were published by the Southern Literary Messenger in Richmond, VA. He used the pseudonym Harry Bluff and others. The "scraps" were observations and well-deserved criticisms of the U.S. Navy that, at the time, was hidebound and inefficient. The U.S. Naval Academy was founded five years later and used the title Lucky Bag for its newsletter dedicated to graduating classes. Our Lucky Bag is in good company.

WOMEN SOLDIERS WHO HELP LEAD THE FORCE



August 26th marked the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment guaranteeing and protecting women's constitutional right to vote. Women now make up 20% of the Air Force, 19% of the Navy, 16% of the Army, and 9% of the Marine Corps.

CPT Emily Lilly was the National Guard's first female to graduate from the tough U.S. Army's Ranger School where 2/3 attendees failed in 2017. She completed the course at 38 years old. Emily is the daughter of proud parents, Boyd and Mary Winslow, who are part of our Richmond Council Navy League family.

The armor officer and mother of two stated that she recommends more women to try out for Ranger school. "Yes, it's physically demanding, but it is more about heart and drive", stated Lilly. She added: "The courses force you to face and address your short-comings, to learn to utilize all the skills you and your team members have, and to dig deeper than you ever thought you could".

USCGC NORTHLAND HOLDS CHANGE OF COMMAND CEREMONY ABOARD SHIP

The Change of Command Ceremony is a time-honored tradition of the seagoing services that formally restates the continuity of command to the officers and crew. It was a formal ritual conducted before the assembled company of the command, during which CDR Patricia M. Bennett, USCG, properly relieved CDR Charles Banks, USCG. Due to COVID-19 protocols, there were no attendees other than the families of CDR Bennett and CDR Banks.

CDR Bennett, a native of Harpswell, Maine graduated with honors from U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 2003 with a degree in Marine & Environmental Sciences.

Upon graduation, she served aboard USCGC MIDGETT (WHEC-726). Subsequently, she was Executive Officer on USCGC MUSTANG (WPB-1310) in Seward, Alaska. In 2005, she served as the Major Cutter Scheduler & Patrol Boat Manager for the 7th Coast Guard's District Enforcement Branch in Miami, FL. In 2020, she commanded USCGC ADAK (WPB-1333) for Patrol Forces Southwest Asia. Later she commanded USCGC SANIBEL (WPB-1312).

After earning her Master's Degree in Marine Affairs, she served as Deputy Chief of Enforcement and Fisheries 5th Coast Guard District in Portsmouth, VA.

ORDER YOUR NAVY LICENSE PLATES IMMEDIATELY!



Virginia has vehicle license plates honoring the U.S. Army, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps, but not for the U.S. Navy. The Virginia Dept. of Motor Vehicles requires 450 paid preorders by December 1 to authorize a Navy Plate. The proposed Navy plate is set up as a revenue share with the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society receiving 60% of the annual plate fee. Plates can be personalized and are available for automobiles, trucks, and motorcycles and can include a disability symbol if eligible. All active-duty and veteran Navy service members are eligible. SS WARRIMOO ENTERS THE TWILIGHT ZONE

On December 30, 1899, the passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly slicing through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia.

The navigator had worked out a star fix and brought the Master, Captain John Phillips, the result: The *Warrimoo's* position was 0° 31N, 179° 30' W. Ever alert, the first mate then pointed out that they were only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line.

The captain was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity to achieve the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called all his navigators to the bridge to double-check the ship's position and then changed course slightly to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed.

The calm weather and clear night worked in his favor. At midnight, the *Warrimoo* lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line!

The consequences of this bizarre position were many. The forward part of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere and the middle of summer. The stern was in the Northern Hemisphere and in the middle of winter. The date in the aft part of the ship was December 31, 1899. Forward, it was January 1, 1900.

Thus, the *Warrimoo* was not only in two different days, two different months, two different seasons and two different years, but also in two different centuries – all at the same time.

Greetings from USCGC NORTHLAND!

With the arrival of August, came the departure of USCGC NORTHLAND from homeport to embark on the long-awaited Migrant Interdiction and Counter Drug mission to the Caribbean. However, it was truly a sprint to the finish. Some last minute modifications, including a new generator and new cooler for the reduction gear of the main engine kept the crew working industriously and diligently. The installation was an all hands event and the work ethic of the crew showed as NORTHLAND was finally able to get underway.

Since being underway, the crew's ambition has continued to show. Much of the newly arrived crew is working tirelessly to get qualified so that they can help NORTHLAND complete the mission. The qualified crew has been a helping hand to the new crew by showing them the ropes, while also gaining new qualifications themselves. This has included Deck and Damage Control (DC) Olympics, where all members of the crew team up and compete in various challenges. For Deck Olympics, this included knot tying, making up lines, and heaving a throwing line threw a life line. For DC Olympics, events included using a fire hose effectively, using dewatering equipment, and learning basic first aid. The crew enjoyed some friendly competition and many members took some valuable lessons from these events.

Following our encounter with the fisherman, recapped on page one, and while standing by for any further Laura tasking, NORTHLAND refueled and resupplied in Guantanamo Bay where we were also able to enjoy some brief liberty on the pier with the **USCGC MOHAWK.** Crewmembers intermingled and enjoyed some much deserved rest and relaxation over corn hole and barbecue with fellow Coasties from the cutter community. Also during the port call, some crewmembers were trained in law enforcement tactics by being OC Sprayed. The event prepared members for the possibilities that may be faced when conducting law enforcement during in the

maritime realm. Overall, the event better prepared **NORTHLAND** to conduct Counter Drug and Migrant Interdiction missions in the Caribbean and around the world.

As **NORTHLAND** and her crew continue to get qualified, conduct drills, and be exceptionally prepared for all Coast Guard missions, we remember our loved ones back home and look forward to reuniting with them.






