

PREVENT SUMMER SLIDE

Summer Reading Facts

- The benefits of summer reading are clear. National research from Dominican University finds that students who participate in public library summer reading programs scored higher on reading achievement tests at the beginning of the next school year than those who did not participate.
- Parents of children enrolled in the public library summer reading program reported that their children spent more time reading over the summer, read more books, were well prepared for school in the fall, and read more confidently.
- Young people experience learning losses when they don't engage in educational activities during the summer. Research spanning 100 years shows that students typically score lower on standardized tests at the end of summer vacation than they do on the same tests at the beginning of the summer. Libraries are part of the solution.
- To succeed in school and life, children and young adults need ongoing opportunities to learn and practice essential skills. Summer Reading Club reminds kids that reading is for fun—as well as for learning.
- There's so much to see, so much to do at your library! There's no better place to take your kids. The library is a place to learn, read, and have fun...a place the whole family can enjoy. In fact, more than 82 million children attend library programs every year.
- Studies show that children who are read to in the home and who use the library perform better in school and are more likely to continue to use the library as a source of lifetime learning.
- The amount of time children spend reading outside of school is linked to gains in reading achievement. Numerous studies show that access to books and magazines is directly related to higher reading achievement.

BOOK REVIEW BY SUZANNE MURPHY - Valley Springs Book Club

Exit West by Mohsin Hamid Publish date 2017 by Riverhead Press

Wrapped within this tale of two young people who fall in love lies a challenging perspective on the human drive to leave the place that is home and strike out for uncertain shores. In times past, this appetite propelled explorers and merchants toward geographic and economic conquest.



Modern migration has a radically different meaning—it is flight from the ravages of war and oppression.

Author Mohsin Hamid's opening words in *Exit West* introduce Saeed, the young man who falls in love with Nadia when they meet in a class. The city in which they live is not specifically mentioned, but Nadia chooses to dress in hijab, a puzzling contradiction when Saeed learns Nadia is fiercely independent and lives by herself in a small apartment. They are instantly attracted to one another. What should be the beginning of a charming story is immediately complicated with the realization that their city is teetering on the brink of destruction although the population prefers to ignore the coming cataclysm, until it is too late. Then begins panicked escape, a familiar story that plays out today before the world's eyes. The author asks the reader to consider disaster in the simple terms of two people. What follows is the journey of Saeed and Nadia as they pass through doors into other countries and realities. Doors are metaphors for the passage into new places and the influence those places have on the lovers' relationship and decisions.

The story has an almost fairytale quality although it is easy to recognize the frustrations and disorienting conditions that are part of migration. In luminescent language, the story reveals itself to be an exploration of what it means to be human in relationship with those whom we love, the physical world, and other cultures. Questions surface about how our experiences affect our most personal beliefs, and is our care for one another an unbreakable commitment? Above all, the author offers a deeper meaning of "refugee" that transcends narrow definitions of geography, class, or economics. At one point in the narrative, a deceptively simple sentence reveals an essential truth, that "[we] are all migrants through time."

Exit West is a book well worth reading. Book clubs will find that its observations can provoke rich discussion; individual readers will think about the story's essence long after they read the last page.

BOOK REVIEWS BY SUZANNE MURPHY - Valley Springs Book Club

The Orchid Thief by Susan Orlean Publish Date: 1998, Ballantine Books

Opening this book is like stepping into a greenhouse bursting with color and fragrance, luring the reader with a riot of botanical history and tales of horticultural piracy. It is the account of a world that is fantastical and frightening by turn, seductive and a



little rough around the edges. At the center of this tale is the orchid, especially a particular species named the ghost orchid, a plant legendary in its evolution and attraction.

Author Susan Orlean has crafted a nonfiction that originates in the Fakahatchee Strand State Preserve in Florida where bounties of wild orchids flourish, then moves to a Florida courthouse where orchid smuggler John Laroche and a pair of Seminole associates are dodging criminal charges related to the theft of wild orchids. The author has read an article about Laroche and his shenanigans and cannot resist making the trip from New York City to learn his story. She informs the reader that she has no real desire to fall victim to the allure of the deceptively robust orchid plant, and then she does exactly that. Her descriptions of the thousands of different species are delicious and irresistible, even a little bawdy. She spends two years accompanying Laroche, this seedy, charismatic botanical genius as he traipses into the Big Cypress and other swamps, and to orchid shows - where experts trade clones and cuttings worth thousands of dollars and stories worth millions.


The author uses her considerable talent as a staff writer for The New Yorker to make this literary nonfiction a pleasure to read, keeping its myriad of time periods and locations organized for understanding the fascinating history of orchids. Aside from her skills at handling research to write a captivating tale, Orlean is unafraid to take risks in following some wily characters into places infested with alligators and hundreds of ways to disappear into a truly wild frontier.

Enjoy the journey, but remember to stop along the way to tend to the somewhat less exotic plants in the garden.

Educated by Tara Westover Publish date: 2008, Random House

Tara Westover opens her memoir with a beautiful description of her childhood home at the base of a mountain named Buck's Peak in rural Idaho. It is an idyllic depiction of a home that many people would long for, an undisturbed and peaceful forested landscape, the



kitchen a scene of warm tranquility, loving parents and older brothers who protect and care for Tara, the youngest of seven siblings. From her porch, Tara looks up at the mountain called the "Indian Princess" whose strength she will rely on through her story, and then she looks down to the highway at the school bus that passes her home without stopping because the Westover children do not go to school.

The story told in the following pages is one of transformation, yet it is unlike any Cinderella fairytale. Tara's family lives by the survivalist creed, and every day is crowded with the work of preparing for the End of Days. Father runs a scrapping yard and buries tanks of gasoline on the farm property, and her mother, an accomplished herbalist and midwife, relentlessly cans food. Tara herself works with her brothers and father in the scrapping junkyard and on construction jobs, where the threat of severe injury is always present. Tara's life is planned in accordance with her father's zealous religious distrust of the mainstream world. When Tara makes the decision to go to school, it is the beginning of her self-creation, full of obstacles and losses that still haunt her today.

Westover walks into a classroom for the first time when she is seventeen years old, after having taught herself enough from textbooks to pass the ACT and win a scholarship to BYU. She has little social contact outside her extensive family and tightly knit church community, so she struggles with social norms her family condemns. She is convinced she does not belong in the alien world of learning, a belief stemming from the nightmare of a brother's abuse. She is an impostor, afraid of letting anyone become a friend; she is also a stranger to her family, betraying those who love her.

Westover's memoir is compelling and superb in its language and clarity. Although accounts of abuse may startle the reader, they provide understanding into the author's frame of mind and decisions. While her memoir may be complete, Westover's journey is not —it takes a lifetime to create oneself.
