At our May meeting, IAS board member Dr. Laura Coffey Banks will discuss the origin of dogs and horses in Ireland, both mystical and scientific, and describe the native domestic canine and equine breeds.

Dr. Banks trained in wildlife science, veterinary medicine, and public health at NMSU,

UNM, and Colorado State University. She is currently an Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine and adjunct member of the Irish Studies program at UNM.

IAS General Meeting April 13, 2018

President Ellen Dowling opens the meeting at 7:15 PM. She inquires about new members and guests; none are with us this evening.

Board Members present and acknowledged by Ellen: V.P. Bob Bryers, Treasurer Kathy Wimmer, Secretary Peter McKenna (late), Membership Norita Callahan, Board Paul McDonough, Board Jay Vandersloot, Board Maureen Riley, Board Laura Brooks.

Ellen tells of tonight's raffle for 2 ticket to *Celtic Woman* at Popejoy Hall on Tuesday, May 22nd. Tickets are \$1 ea. or 6 for \$5. See Bob Bryers for them and winner will be drawn at the end of tonight's talk. Reports:

- Treasury Kathy reports we had expenses of \$1,080 and good returns from our St. Patrick's Day event, resulting in a balance of \$11,360. We had \$1,467 from the gate and about \$2,740 from online sales for St. Patrick's.
- ♣ Membership Norita reports that we have 68 families (x 2), 68 single and 4 student members for a total membership of 234 members to date. Norita also tells the group that Misty Pinson (with Coleman Academy step dancers), one of the dancers IAS sponsored for Worlds, placed in the top third of the competition, which is quite a feather in her cap.


New Business: none.

Book Review: My Father's Wake: How the Irish Teach Us How to Live, Love and Die, by Kevin Toolis

"Why have we lost our way to death?"

These are the words of author Kevin Toolis in his book, My Father's Wake, in which he examines the Anglo-Saxon way of death and the Irish tradition.

Toolis begins his quest at his family home in Dookinella, County Mayo, a remote island off the west coast of Ireland. His father is dying and so he begins his search for the prescription for facing death. Toolis writes of the "Death Machine" that hides death and dying. Through his work as a foreign correspondent, he brings us to Sudan, Malawi, Gaza and Northern Ireland, "where the dead are everywhere visible, in famine, plague and war." He relates his own experience as a young boy in a TB ward and the tragic death of his older brother from leukemia.

Toolis embraces the spiritual depth of the Irish way of death. The traditions of the islanders he grew up with paint a picture that is without fear. There is no fear of the dead or of death among adults or children. The dead and

dying are embraced by the family and the community. As Toolis states: "On the island no one writes about death, but they do go to funerals and talk about the dead and visit the dying all the time. Death is an everyday occurrence, nothing special, and it is this scale by which any dying is judged."

My Father's Wake is a tribute to a proud Irish tradition that honors life, death, and the dead. Toolis answers the question he poses in the book: "How can it be possible to never talk out loud about death in a world where everyone dies?"



The Irish Book Club

Right now we're reading April's book, *The Twelve*, by Stuart Neville. (The book is titled *The Twelve* abroad. Its American title is *The Ghosts of Belfast*.) The discussion will start on May 1.



Our book for March was *Haunted Ground* by Erin Hart. Here's Amazon's description:

"This dazzling, award-winning debut in a series delivers mystery, romance, suspense, and fascinating forensic detail. When farmers cutting turf in an Irish peat bog make a grisly discovery—the perfectly preserved head of a young woman with long red hair—Irish archaeologist Cormac Maguire and American pathologist Nora Gavin must use cutting-edge techniques to preserve ancient evidence. Because the bog's watery, acidic environment prevents decay, it's difficult to tell how long the red-haired girl has been buried—two years, two centuries, or even much longer.

Who is she? The extraordinary find leads to even more disturbing puzzles. The red-haired girl is not the only enigma in this remote corner of Galway. Two years earlier, Mina Osborne, the wife of a local landowner, went for a walk with her young son and vanished without a trace. Could they, too, be hidden in the bog's treacherous depths, only to be discovered centuries from now? Or did Hugh Osborne murder his family, as some villagers suspect? Bracklyn House,

Osborne's stately home, holds many secrets, and Nora and Cormac's inquiries threaten to expose them all."

Here's my (Ellen's) take: "This was a corker of a good read, making me want to do nothing else but find out what happens next. Even though my paperback edition has rather small print, and I was initially concerned that it would be a long slog of a read, the plot advanced quickly and I pretty much flew through the pages. All that being said, this book is definitely not a work of great literature (not even close to *Himself, A Novel*, by Jess Kidd—our January book choice, which I wrote up in our March newsletter—whose writing comes pretty close to great)." Edie Brooks "gave it an A for plot but a C minus for character development," noting 'there was a bit of romance, which I generally enjoy, but in this case I didn't even care. That is, the author didn't make me care.'

Flowers of the Forest


