Back to School Season Starts with Routine Vaccinations

Many vacations have been taken, picnics have been had, fireworks have been shot off and summer nights are beginning to take over more of summer days. And as calendars flip from July to August, parents of school-aged kids can't help but think about Back to School.

The bulk of North Dakota's youth attend public school, meaning many children will need to be up to date on school immunizations or claim exemption by October 1. Getting started on this now may help avoid the crunch of people who leave immunizations to the last minute.

It is also important to consider vaccinating your child at this time for COVID-19. The COVID-19 immunization can be received at the same time as other routine vaccinations. At least one dose of these vaccinations have been received by about 80% of North Dakota's population that is 65 and older (103,000+ residents), as has about 62% of the state's population older than 12 (409,000+ residents) receiving the vaccine, about 58% of the state's population older than 5 (427,000+ residents) and 54% of the state's population older than 6 months (427,000+ residents). When students congregate in school settings, they will be at risk for contracting COVID-19. The vaccine has shown to be highly effective at stopping the need for hospital assistance, as well as death, when an individual has COVID-19.

Formula Shortage Reinforces Breastfeeding Need

Breastfeeding continues to be a universal way for many new mothers to guarantee nutritional security for their young children.

With recent threats to infant formula supply chains, the importance placed on successful breastfeeding has never been higher. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, only 1 in 4 infants is exclusively breastfed as recommended by the time they are 6 months old. Low rates of breastfeeding add more than \$3 billion annually to medical costs for U.S. mothers and children.

Emmons County had 61 infants in the county in 2018-2019. 83.6 percent of these infants were breastfed. This was mostly in line, if not slightly below the estimated 84 percent of breastfed infants in the state overall.

Reasons for stopping breastfeeding can vary widely, however an estimated 60 percent of mothers do not breastfeed for as long as they would like to:

- Lactation/latching issues
- Concerns about infant nutrition and weight
- Concerns with medications taken while breastfeeding
- Unsupportive work policies and lack of family support
- Unsupportive hospital practices and policies

The Surgeon General's Call to Action to Support Breastfeeding is a resource that describes specific steps people can take to participate in a society-wide approach to support mothers and babies who are breastfeeding. More informa-

he COVID-19 pandemic has drastically affected health, nutrition and livelihoods, including new parents' circumstances and decisions on infant feeding. Breastfeeding plays an important role in managing the double burden of malnutrition in addition to providing food security and reducing inequalities.

The limited capacity to protect, promote and support breastfeeding led to the deterioration of the breastfeeding support system within and outside the health system during the pandemic, ultimately leading to increased inequalities between and within countries. #WBW2022 focuses on strengthening the capacity of actors that have to protect, promote and support breastfeeding across different levels of society. These actors make up the warm chain of support for breastfeeding (Warm Chain). Revamping the capacity of actors in the Warm Chain through education and transformation of the existing systems will help ensure breastfeeding-friendly healthcare facilities, supportive communities and workplaces, underpinned by evidencebased national policies.
