<u> The President's Message - August 2018</u>

CHALLENGED TO CHANGE

Remember the story of the rich young ruler? He came to Jesus and asked, "Teacher, what good deed must I do to have eternal life?" Jesus went through the commandments and the ruler said he kept them. So Jesus challenged him with the words: "If you would be perfect, go, sell what you possess and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me." What happened? "When the young man heard this he went away sorrow-ful, for he had great possessions." (Matt 19:16-22 ESV)

Jesus challenged him. What Jesus was asking the young ruler to do, was to make a significant change and that meant selling his possessions and following Jesus. The young man walked away because he loved his possessions too much.

Making changes is tough inside and outside the church. Just try changing the time for worship or changing the hymnal or order of service and you as a leader will certainly hear it from somebody. Move the furniture around before anyone gets home and watch the reaction. Suggest changing the way you go to grandmas and see what kind of reaction you get. Change can be difficult.

Recently I preached at a congregation celebrating their anniversary and read this from an old anniversary booklet about their history: "Since attendance at the German services was dwindling, it was decided to drop the German services altogether and hold only English services. Since this change, both the membership and church attendance has increased." This took place around 1962. Can you imagine the discussion about dropping the German service? But it was dropped. The change was made and two positive things happened.

Our staff is reading a book called NECESSARY ENDINGS. The author states there are things that must end if things are going to change positively in the future. We discussed the following statement: "Ask your team if they want to be where they are now a year from now or if they want a different reality. Then ask them what endings will be necessary to bring that about" (pg. 156 - written by Henry Cloud).

That is a great statement to discuss with a school or ministry staff or church council. If you do not change you will continue to keep getting what you have. We have many smaller congregations in our district who are looking at the future and talk about closing the doors. That is a big change to discuss. I have asked leaders, "Do you see yourself still worshipping in 5 years?" And if they answer, "No!" there is only one more question they need to answer – "When are we going to close." If they believe they should close (FYI - only a congregation can make that decision to close) I encourage them to make plans and go out celebrating the many years of ministry God has blessed them with. Treasure the memories.

Jesus challenged the rich young ruler. The young man had to make a difficult choice. We have choices to make and some require change. Not all change is bad. Stop and think about some of the best days in your life – the day you got married or the day your children were born. Those were BIG changes and good ones. In the end we can always hold onto the simple fact that our good Lord has been with us in the past and will continue to be with us in the future – change or no change.

Counselor Corner

GOD'S CHOICE

The Bible is many things. It is God's Story Book portraying the lives of select people. Those chosen give us timeless lessons about God and His plans.

We find such a story in 1 Samuel 16. God is ready to select the second king of His people. God's criteria was significant—He ""sought out a man of his own heart"" (13:14a). This was in contrast to King Saul whose rejection was tied to his arrogant heart—he had ""not kept the Lord's command"" (vs.14b).

Samuel the prophet was called upon to anoint this new king. He was sent to a small village, to an unknown family, to fulfill this task (16:1b). God's ways are not our ways...but they are always accurate. What is small should not be ignored.

Jesse was the father of eight sons. None were exceptionally qualified to be a king. God saw past their external, human qualities. There was only one who had a "heart" for leadership. God made this clear to Samuel—

""Do not consider his appearance or his height.... The Lord does not look at the things man looks at. Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart."" (vs.7)

God desires what is invisible to man. God seeks a heart of character...a heart of integrity. Such a person is humble and coachable—vital qualities for success.

Seven sons passed by Samuel. None were qualified. The one not chosen by Jesse—because he was too young...and only skilled as a shepherd—was the one whom God was seeking. David was anointed that day to be God's servant king (vss.12b-13a). The least likely became the most honored.

David would prove to be Israel's greatest king. He was also positioned by God to be the key descendant of the Messiah—Jesus Christ (Matthew 1:6a & 16). God sees the "big picture"— the fulfillment of His Story.

God still seeks and calls leaders today. His criteria and qualifications are unchanged. The heart condition is still His primary focus—for the sake of His kingdom.
