Shavuot Again?!

TISHREI-CHESHVAN 5778

n Numbers 29:35 we learn that "On the eighth day (of Sukkot) you should hold a solemn gathering; you shall not work." This day is what we know as Shemini Atzeres, the eighth Day of Sukkot. The association with Sukkot is obvious that the seven-day holiday has just ended. Yet we see in many ways that this is not any longer Sukkot. We no longer take the lulav during services, and while there is a range of customs it should be noted that many people do not sit in the *sukkah* on

this day and those that do are very lenient about the matter. We also recite the *shehecheyanu* blessing on this day as if something new is happening. Finally, unlike the last days of Passover to which our liturgy refers to simply as Passover, the last days of Sukkot are referred to as "the eight day, this *atzeres*"- hence the unique

name for these last days. If Shemini Atzeres (and Simchas Torah) are not Sukkot, what are they?

In his book The Jewish Holidays, Michael Strassfeld points out that Shemini Atzeret in many respects parallels Shavuot, which can be viewed as the long-distance conclusion to the seven-day holiday of Passover, coming as it does seven weeks after Passover. At that time of year, the weather would be clear enough to have people come back to Jerusalem for an additional pilgrimage some weeks later. Sukkot, however, marks the beginning of the rainy season, and since it would be difficult to ask people to make an additional trip to Jerusalem, Shemini Atzeret would best be placed immediately following Sukkot. [In the Talmud, Shavuot is called "Atzeret" making the parallel with Shemini Atzeret

even stronger.]

To further reinforce this connection let us remember that unlike Passover and Sukkot, Shemini Atzeres and Simchas Torah do not have any physical mitzvot associated with them, with the close connection that we celebrate the receiving of the Torah on Shavuot and a new annual cycle of the Torah on Shemini Atzeres and Simchas Torah. Finally, both of these holidays are an eighth: Shemini Atzeres as its name implies and Shavuot,

> which is the first day after seven weeks of seven days of counting the omer and hence an "eighth" in its own right.

What a joyous accounting of the ten days

of Sukkot, we have one last holiday on which to reap the benefits of our newfound closeness to Gd. This is reflected in a beautiful midrash in which Gd, in a pun on the word Atzeres, asks the Jewish people to stop (in Hebrew, atzor); before you return home from this beautiful season spend just a bit more time with Me.

As we celebrate this beautiful season let each of us commit to concretize in through action the gains we have made over the High Holiday season and Sukkot. Let us find new ways to keep Gd close, through our connections with tradition, our study of Torah and in performing good deeds. In this merit may we all be blessed for a full year of closeness to Gd, to each other and to the Jewish people.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

s many of you know, when I'm not at the shul, in my real life I happen to be a practicing attorney, specializing in medical malpractice defense. I spend my workdays (and nights and weekends) defending doctors and hospitals in lawsuits. I'm often tasked with making the argument in court or in negotiations, that "the hospital" can't be responsible, it's not a real entity but rather simply bricks and mortar.

18 Montebello Road, Congregation Shaarey Israel and our beautiful building is not simply a "building" consisting of physical materials. A hospital is a physical place for healing. A shul, particularly ours, is a place for healing and nurturing the mind and soul. Not just a place of healing, but a place of comfort, a place to come closer to one another and certainly closer to G-d.

When you receive this we will have just finished the High Holiday Services and may be in the middle of Sukkot (it all depends on the US Postal Service). It always amazes me to see our Congregation "together" and it is what makes it such a special place. We greet each other as a community on the holidays as if we are spending time with all of our best friends. We come together to celebrate and it is evident that we enjoy each other's company, greeting each other with a vigor and happiness as if we haven't seen each other for a year, even though many of us join together each Shabbat.

As I write this it has been a particularly difficult week for Congregation Shaarey Israel. We as a shul and the Rockland Jewish Community lost an iconic figure with the passing of Lila Stern. Watching how our shul reacted brought a sense of pride to me personally in our Congregation. The outpouring of love and support for Jules and the Stern family is who we are. One evening, attending mincha/maariv at the Stern home during Shiva I said to myself as I walked in that we could have held a board of trustees meeting as we probably had half the board there

at the moment. Yet we weren't there because it was "shul business." No, it was just our Congregation being our Congregation. We didn't go there out of a sense of obligation, we went there out of a sense of love and respect for each other.

Despite a negative event the week before the High Holidays we were also surrounded by the positive and clear evidence of what our Rabbi tells us about "the continuity of Jewish life." We started a new year of Hebrew School, which saw us double the size of the school with the new Advanced Hebrew School (particular thanks to Joan Black, Gary Forman and the Reuben Gittelman Hebrew Day School Fund for their help in allowing us to grow the school). We also saw a well-attended Selichot program with an enjoyable movie followed by open dialogue about what was screened (thank you Paulette Frankel for putting this together). Our building played host to the Great Challah Bake, there was a Sisterhood program, meetings and services were held, a baby naming took place on a Friday night. Life went on at 18 Montebello Road and it went on to its fullest.

As I stated at the beginning of this article, a hospital is bricks and mortar. Our bricks and mortar at 18 Montebello Road actually have life. They talk, they sing, they laugh they cry. Most importantly, though, this all happens together as a Congregation. It is my hope that as the New Year begins we continue to move forward together. Exciting things are happening, drop by for services, for a program, just to say hello to whoever is in the building at the time. Our doors are open 365 days a year and these walls can talk.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian Meaning

his article will come out as the High Holidays are entering into its final phase. The serious nature of *Rosh Hashana* and *Yom Kippur* are in the rear view mirror, now it is time to dance. The holiday of *Sukkot* is unique in the annals of *Torah* in that we are commanded to be "only joyous" (Deut. 16:15).

As we speed towards the end of the holiday season, my mind is occupied with a single concept: The entire three week period of the High Holidays, from the seriousness and s olemnity of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur to the unbridled joy of Sukkot and Simchat Torah, is based on a quest for meaning. We are meant to be introspective and conduct an honest selfassessment. At the core of that self-assessment has to be an understanding of who we are in the context of the world and that which we call Judaism. Without that context, how can we truly do that moral inventory? If we do not understand our place within the world, within Judaism and within Torah, how do we place value on that which we have or have not done?

Let me put it another way. We are the keepers of a legacy that is over three thousand years old. The *Torah*, revealed to our ancestors on Mount Sinai, offers us a blueprint for a good life. The question is, can we relate to it in these modern times? And, if we can, what can our relationship be with a creed that was handed down before the modern age of cellphones, computers, social media and more?

I cannot speak for anyone of you. We are all different people and our search for meaning and place is unique to each of us. But, permit me to share with you some recent experiences I have had and some insight I gained from them.

Chana and I recently took an 11-day trip to Israel. The purpose of the trip was to celebrate a family wedding but we turned it into a full

The Scroll...4 vacation. It started out, as do all

our Israel vacations, in the Holy City of Jerusalem, the eternal and undivided capital of Israel. My first morning in Jerusalem



turned into three solitary hours in which I first walked to and attended earliest morning services at the Western Wall and then walked to buy Chana breakfast. It was five miles of wandering through the Old City and, from there, to the marketplace in *Machane Yehuda* where I went from stall to stall finding yummy treats for Chana's first meal of the day. I can tell you that walking five miles through quiet streets of Jerusalem was an intense emotional and religious experience. Just walking those virtually empty streets made me feel like there were just two of us making the trek to and from the Western Wall: me and *Hashem* himself.

Two things from that morning are burned into my memory.

As I was walking to the wall, I had to descend 141 steps from a section of Jewish owned shops and eateries down to the security booth where I would go through a metal detector before entering the wall complex. I stopped at one of the landings and looked at the eastern sky. It was just beginning to lighten with the new day. Immediately, I was reminded of the first *Mishna* in the third chapter of *Tractate Yoma* (which teaches about the service in the Temple on *Yom Kippur*):

The supervisor said to them: "Go out and see if the time for slaughter has come." If it had come, the one who saw it would say, "Morning star!" Matitia ben Shmuel says [that the supervisor would ask]: "Is the whole east light as far as Hevron?" And he would say, "Yes!"' (Tr. Yoma, 3:1)

The phrase, "Is the whole east light?" kept playing in my head as I realized that what I beheld at that moment was the precise vision my *Kohen* ancestors saw when they declared the time ready for the start of the *Yom Kippur* service. As a Cantor, charged with leading the *Yom Kippur* service in the Shul, it was an intensely powerful moment. I went down the stairs to the morning services feeling a oneness with creation that I confess I have never felt before.

The second thing comes from my trip back. On my way to *Machane Yehuda*, I stopped for a moment outside of the Jaffa Gate and walked down into the Mamila Mall. I looked at the beautiful avenue with its modern decor and I beheld something that I have never quite seen in this way before: The juxtaposition of a 21st century mall right outside a city with over 3,000 years of our history is an incredible thing and it reminded me that although *Torah* and that which we call Judaism is well over 3,000 years old, it is as fresh and new as the brand new day.

I know that it is easy to see *Torah* as an anachronism but it is not. It is a living breathing entity that gives life to those who learn it and try to follow its precepts. Why? Because it gives us a clear mission and place in the world. It commands us to think not only of ourselves but also of those around us. It commands us to understand that we are not the be all and end all: there is a master of the universe who created this world, gave us life, and calls upon us to live life by a code of conduct that is the envy of all the world.

The *Torah* refers to Jews and brothers and sisters. We are all family and we are meant to look out for one another.

For me, this is the meaning that is core to the High Holidays. *Torah* makes me realize the great mission that *Hashem* has given us. As *Isaiah* tells

us, "We are a light unto the nations." Our *Torah* gives us a standard of conduct that is meant to shine upon the entire world. We should be setting the example for others, not the other way around.

Torah also makes it clear that *Hashem* is clearly aware that we are not, and can never be perfect. Therefore, he gave us the opportunities for self-introspection and improvement. As Rabbi Weinbach has said so often and so eloquently, "G-d wants it all to work out for us."

That's my takeaway from that awesome time in the Holy Land of Israel. It was not just a time of great enjoyment, it was a time of spiritual renewal. Kind of what the High Holidays are about, no?

Yom Kippur for me, is a scant week away. I hope your Yom Kippur was meaningful. After that, I hope your singing voices are in tune for our joyous Hallel services during Sukkot. And, don't forget your dancing shoes for Simchat Torah. As Rabbi Weinbach has said, "It's better than Yom Kippur!" Join us in our search for meaning through the joy of Torah. I look forward to dancing with all of you.

May *Hashem* grant that this year be a year of health, prosperity, and joy.

You may name the shul's endowment as a beneficiary to receive all or a portion of the proceeds from a life insurance policy that you may no longer need.

Amounts remaining in retirement plans can be subject to heavy taxation when left to nonspousal individuals. Qualified charities (such as Congregation Shaarey Israel) can, however, receive these funds tax-free. Consider directing all or a portion of remaining amounts to Congregation Shaarey Israel's endowment and providing for loved ones from other sources.

You may name the shul's endowment to receive all or a portion of what is left in a savings, brokerage, or other investment account.

You may also wish to consider charitable gift annuities, which present tax planning opportunities. You may contact our treasurer and/or your financial consultant.
