#### FROM THE Beloved Partners in Ministry,



Our journey as a Matthew 25 church is well underway. A few weeks ago in worship we committed ourselves to learning about the root causes of poverty and working to eradicate it. I believe we all understand that working toward this goal will not be easy and we know that spending one year with this as our focus will not end hunger in our area, but that doesn't mean that we shouldn't try and it

doesn't mean that we cannot make a difference. Our goal, this year and as lifelong disciples of Christ, is to work together in building God's kingdom. Our call as disciples is to make this world as much like God's promised kingdom as we are able.

Throughout this year, the Biblical texts that we will follow will come from the Gospel of Matthew. For us to truly understand the call of Matthew 25, we must understand the context into which it was written, and Matthew's intention for writing it. As we worship and study together, we will begin to notice some overarching themes that will help us to understand it better.

One of these themes is "the kingdom of God." Our focal text of Matthew 25:31-46 includes the idea of God's kingdom as our promised inheritance. "Come, you who will receive good things from my Father. Inherit the kingdom that was prepared for you before the world began (Matthew 25:34)." Before we get all the way to chapter 25, Matthew spends a good deal of the gospel talking about God's kingdom.

In Advent and during January, we heard from John's voice and Jesus echo him "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." In February leading up to Lent, we will begin to explore the well-known Sermon on the Mount where Jesus begins to tell us about how God's kingdom is different from the kingdoms of the world. His preaching, while the words we read have become familiar to us, was revolutionary and upsetting to the status quo.

Matthew's gospel is 28 chapters long. I want to encourage you, for the month of February, to commit to reading a chapter a day, and by the end of the month you will have read the whole story. Jot down your questions and any insights the Spirit may give you. Spending this year with Matthew will challenge us because working for God's kingdom should challenge us, but we will walk this road together, studying, praying, and singing the good news of the kingdom of God.

#### Get to Know Symptoms of Esophageal Cancer

The American Cancer Society estimates that about 16,080 people will die from esophageal cancer this year, and that 17,650 new cases will be diagnosed. Men over 55 are the population most likely to develop esophageal cancer. Other rise factors include tobacco and alcohol use, especially when combined; gastroesophageal reflux disease, Barrett's esophagus (a condition that occurs following years of acid reflux); injury of the esophagus; and frequently drinking hot liquids, which can damage the tissue lining the esophagus.

The following are the most commonly reported symptoms of esophageal cancer according to the Esophageal Cancer Awareness Association: difficult or painful swallowing, weight loss, blood in the stool, loss of appetite, feeling very tired, heartburn pain in the throat or back and hoarseness or coughing. Additional symptoms noted by the American Cancer Society are hiccups, bone pain and bleeding into the esophagus. If you're experiencing these symptoms, talk to your doctor. And if you believe you might be at a high risk for developing esophageal cancer, talk to your doctor about screening options.

## **INTERPRETATION & STEWARDSHIP**



Greetings church family and Happy New Year! The I & S committee would like to keep the church members up to date with the financial status of the church in 2020. The church ended 2019 with the receipts exceeding our expenditures by \$13.00. This is the first time in several years that the church as ended the year in the black. Thank you to all of those who continue to give financially to the church and to those who are active in the church fundraising. Last year in 2019, the church was able to raise \$5,400.00 towards the general fund through fundraisers.

### Per Capita for 2020 will remain the same as last year \$32.00

At the beginning of each year, we also ask that church members pay Per Capita. Per Capita is an amount of money per member (this year, \$ 32.00) that our congregation pays to our larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). This money is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. It is the money that enables us to work with other Presbyterian churches in our presbytery and across the country. It is also money that allows us to work with other churches to further the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

We have a total of 143 members of the church resulting in \$4,567 that will be paid from the General Fund to cover this cost. Historically our church receives approximately 1/3 of the total amount required. Last year in 2019, we set a goal to collect over half of what is owed from our church. I & S is proud to report that we exceeded that goal and received \$2596.00 in special offerings towards Per Capita. In 2020, we would like to at least meet or exceed the \$2596.00 that was collected the previous year. There is a envelope designated to Per Capita in box of envelopes that members receive each year. For those who do not receive envelopes, the I & S committee has created envelopes that have been placed in the pews at church.

Please prayerfully consider paying Per Capita and helping to reach our goal.



We have been participating in the Souper Bowl of Caring since the early 1990's when it first began. Our congregation has been very generous.

In 2015 we received \$1165 and 200 items of non-perishable food items. In 2016 we received \$1108, in 2017 we received \$1115 and 30 items of food. In 2018 we received \$5000 and in 2019 we received \$1080. These funds always had someone who matched the congregational giving in the soup pots at the doorways to the sanctuary.

# Sunday, February 2

So, on Sunday, February 2 we will ask our worshippers, as they leave worship, to put at **least one dollar \$\$** in the soup pots held by our youngsters at the doors. The offering is designated to benefit children in need at Seaborn Elementary School. We learned that 51% of the children there are under the poverty line and certainly must be in need of some help.

This year we have someone who will match the congregations giving plus another partial gift of \$100. Think about how much is spent on snacks consumed as folks watch the Super Bowl game and let's see how much we can raise for our Souper Bowl game.
