A retreat was held for the Town Council and Planning Board members and staff in April at the Charlotte Hawkins Brown Museum.

On Friday, April 19th, there were discussions on agricultural/residential zoning and code enforcement regulations for repeat offenders. Then, a Guilford County planner provided information on planning procedures. In the afternoon, there were presentations from the N.C. Capital Management Trust and Duke Energy.

Town Updates

IMPORTANT REMINDER:

NO SHOOTING ALLOWED WITHIN TOWN LIMITS

Due to a recent shooting incident involving a bullet from Whitsett crossing into a Sedalia home, we want to remind everyone that discharging firearms is strictly prohibited within Sedalia town limits.



Town of Sedalia Discharge of Firearms Ordinance:

"(A) No person shall discharge or shoot a gun, air rifle, air pistol, or other kind of firearm or similar implement within the town limits of the Town of Sedalia, particularly in a densely populated area, except as otherwise provided for in this Ordinance. Each person discharging a firearm is responsible for exhibiting reasonable regard for the safety and property of other persons and for discharging the firearm in such a manner as to assure that all projectiles come to rest safely within the boundary or boundaries of the property on which the person is authorized to be shooting."

The Importance of Wetlands

Wetlands sometimes referred to as swamps, marshes, or bogs protect water quality, reduce flooding, and provide important fish and wildlife habitat.

What are wetlands? The Environmental Protection Agency provides the following definition: "Wetlands are areas where water covers the soil or is present either at or near the surface of the soil all year or for varying periods of time during the year, including during the growing season."

Wetlands protect water quality by:

- Filtering out nutrients, chemicals, pesticides, and sediment (dirt).
- Maintaining stream flow during dry periods.
- Replenishing groundwater. Drinking wells rely on sufficient groundwater.

Wetlands reduce flooding by:

- Capturing stormwater runoff and slowly releasing the water to streams or allowing it to soak into the ground.
- Reducing the flow of stormwater runoff through the floodplain. Plants in the wetland slow the flow of water to reduce flooding.

Wetlands are important for fish and wildlife by:

- Providing places for ducks and geese to rest during migration or for breeding areas.
- Providing breeding areas for amphibians such as frogs and salamanders.
- Other wildlife such as deer and bear use wetlands for food and shelter.
- About one-third of the threatened and endangered species in the United States depend on wetlands for their survival.
