Dear Parents/Guardians.


HGA's French Connection



Mrs. Polyniak has graciously hosted this visit for the past six years! However, this year we had the pleasure of visiting the church's new home which is located at the former Saint Anthony of Padua campus at 501 Summit Avenue. Again, we would like to thank Father Andriy and Mrs. Polyniak and everyone at Nativity B.V.M. for making us feel welcome and teaching us more about our Catholic faith.

ACADEMY: CONNECT THE



Fundraising Wrap-up

All families registered at HGA are required to fulfill a family fundraising fee of \$350. These dollars raised through a variety of sales are used to offset budgeted school expenses such as electricity, heating, water, and snow removal. A fundraising budget of \$126,000 was set for 2015-2016 school year, and as April 1, 2016, a total of \$84,447.22 has been raised.

Annual Fund


In the fall of 2014, HGA kicked-off their very first Annual Fund Appeal in an effort to raise monies for unbudgeted project plans and curriculum enhancements. Mrs. Wallin's continuous approach to improving resources (Chromebooks, iPads, STEM materials and learning guides, Learning Commons, and professional development programs) needs to be funded and more often than not, excess dollars are not always available through the school budget. Reaching out to HGA alumni and local businesses, the first year's Annual Fund got off to a slow start. This school year, extra effort has been made to attain a goal set of \$35,000 by June 31, 2016. We're close! We have a couple of months remaining to make this goal a reality.

The entire Middle States Self Study Process is a group effort involving the entire HGA Regional School community of parents, students, staff, and stakeholders. We will be publishing our progress as we complete the various stages of the process, culminating in a multi-day visit by the Middle States Visiting Team in the Fall of 2016 who will decide whether or not to recommend our school for reaccreditation. What we have accomplished so far. . .

- Establishment of our Planning Team
- Evaluation, Revision, and Creation of our Founding Documents
- Profile of the School
- Self-Assessment of the Indicators of Quality for Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment in the areas of Religion, Reading, and Mathematics

What we are finalizing. . .

- Research and Reports Concerning the 12 Standards: Our 12 Standards Committees (composed of faculty and staff members) analyzed feedback from the surveys that were completed in the Fall of 2015 as well as data from a variety of other sources. These detailed reports have now been sent to the Planning Team for a final evaluation.
- Middle States Team Visit Dates: Our application for re-accreditation has been submitted to the Middle States
 Association and we anxiously await the confirmation package that will outline the dates of our Middle States
 Team Visit in the Fall of 2016.

What we are in the process of completing. . .

• Plan for Growth and Improvement: These plans are the culmination of the year-long self study that we have undertaken. With the information from the revision of the Foundation Documents, the Profile of the School, the Self-Assessment of the Curriculum, the 12 Standards Reports, and feedback from the school community, it has been decided to focus our Plan for Growth and Development in three areas: Reading, Mathematics, and Discipline. Now that these areas of focus have been established, three Action Plan Teams have been formed to develop a seven year improvement plan in these areas. The objectives for these plans will be developed very soon and submitted to the Middle States Association for approval before the plans themselves are created.
