Marty Gain, CW Tours Director, said it was her favorite place of all Gettysburg. Indeed, there is something special about it. Perhaps because it is so secluded from the mobs of visitors, and such a beautiful local.

The Civil War Preservation Trust has saved more than 1,000 acres on eight battlefields: Brice's Cross Roads (1,334 acres), Brandy Station (1,860 acres), Trevilian Station (1,712 acres), Bentonville (1662 acres), Kelly's Ford (1,192 acres), Shiloh (1,157 acres), Cool Spring (1,120 acres) and Resaca (1,044 acres).
