### Augustus Helps to Save the First Muhlenberg Parsonage

As you may have heard, the Speaker's House obtained possession of Father Henry Melchior Muhlenberg's First Parsonage on East Seventh Avenue. The building is in poor condition and needs immediate repairs before winter arrives. These repairs to the roof and windows cost \$10,000.

Pastor Kochenderfer planned to give \$5,000 toward the emergency repairs. He asked Augustus if we also would be interested in contributing toward the emergency repairs. As you know, Augustus is just barely funding our annual expense budget, so any contribution from us looked impossible.

However, a no interest loan was given to Pastor McConomy before his retirement so he could winterize a small house on the New Jersey shore to live in during his retirement. The source of that loan was a trust fund that could be used only to help people in need. Pastor McConomy fully repaid the loan and the principal was reinvested. That happened over 35 years ago. Since the earnings from that fund could not be used to either fund our regular operating budget or pay for property repairs and improvements, the Vestry decided to match Pastor Kochenderfer's gift from the earnings on the repaid principal. Pastor Kochenderfer then said he would give Augustus the \$5,000 with the understanding that the whole gift to pay for emergency repairs to the First Muhlenberg Parsonage would publicly be credited to the generosity of Augustus.

Thank you, Pastor Kochenderfer.

### **Devotional Meditation**

#### **Scripture Readings:**

"Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing" (1 Thessalonians 5:11).

"Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen" (Ephesians 4:29).

"There is one body and one Spirit -- just as you were called to one hope when you were called -- one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. But



to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it" (Ephesians 4:4-7).

### **Mutual Edification**

God has provided a support system for us as Christians through his body, the church. Within this body we participate together in Word and Sacrament along with speaking words of exhortation and encouragement to one another. It is necessary at times to speak Law in order to correct and discipline, and it is essential to speak Gospel to bring forgiveness and peace to the repentant. Fulfilling these duties complies with the command we receive through Paul who tells us to "build each other up."

Traditionally, we have depended on our pastors and elders to do this task of edifying, or building up. Possibly, we are hesitant to carry out this obligation. We may feel inadequate, or we may shy away from confrontation. However, as believers who are stewards of the Gospel. "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation . . . And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us" (2 Corinthians 5:18-20). As his ambassadors, he will equip us for every task that he requires us to complete.

If we truly are inadequate due to lack of knowledge of God's Word, there is a simple remedy for our problem. Start attending your adult Bible class! If there is no class that meets your needs, ask your pastor and take steps necessary to be part of the support system that God intends for us to be for one another within the body of Christ.

## **Recycling at Augustus**

We have a significant problem with our recycling efforts at Augustus as a result of recent changes to the recycling collection process implemented by the Borough of Trappe.

Officially, the Borough of Trappe offers refuse and recycling collection to residential dwellings, such as the Parsonage at Augustus. Recently, the collection method was changed to a single large container that can be mechanically emptied into the collection vehicle. Augustus was issued one (1) container for Parsonage refuse.

Subsequently I noticed that St. Luke's UCC, which does not include a residential building, regularly had three (3) of the large refuse containers placed curbside for collection. I contacted the former Borough Manager to inquire about the matter. He contacted the collection firm, and they generously agreed to provide Augustus with three (3) refuse containers as they had already done at St. Luke's. Augustus uses these refuse containers to get rid of food which, if thrown into the dumpster, might attract animals. Most of the other church refuse is placed in the dumpster that Augustus leases, which is emptied only every other week.

Trappe Borough's Refuse and Recycling contractor now collects recycling every other week (instead of weekly, as has been done in the past) by a large container that can be emptied mechanically into the garbage truck. A few weeks ago, I called the Trappe Borough Manager to see if Augustus could receive additional recycling containers to handle our recycling on this less-frequent collection schedule. The current Borough Manager indicated that Augustus could not receive additional containers as it already had received the single container for the Parsonage. I understood. However, shortly after that conversation, I noticed that St. Luke's, which still has no residential dwelling on its property, had received three (3) recycling containers, which I had just been told Augustus could not receive because it was not eligible. I am at a loss to explain the inconsistent application of the "rules" and apparent favoritism demonstrated by the Borough of Trappe.

Until a permanent solution is approved by the Vestry, all recycling from the church will be placed in the dumpster with the other refuse.



Annual Congregational Meeting In November

The Annual Congregational Meeting to approve the budget for 2020 and elect Vestry members will take place on Sunday, November 10, 2020, beginning at 12 noon. Copies of the 2020 budget proposed to the voting members of Augustus by the Vestry will be available after each service on Sunday, November 3, 2020.

What is the purpose of the Annual Congregational Meetings?

The Annual Congregational Meeting is necessary to authorize the expense budget for the coming year and to elect Vestry members, who serve three (3) year terms. The Annual Congregation Meeting is an opportunity for the Augustus Lutheran Church family to gather and seek to discern God's will for Augustus in the coming year. Augustus has another Congregational Meeting in the early part of 2020 to deal with other issues.

### Who can vote at the Congregational Meeting?

*Voting members* are confirmed members. Such confirmed members, during the current or preceding calendar year, shall have communed in this congregation and shall have made a contribution of record to this congregation. Members of this congregation who have satisfied these basic standards shall have the privilege of voice and vote at every regular and special meeting of the congregation.

## Money Matters Personal Financial Stewardship

### **Reducing Credit Card Debt**

Because desires often exceed the ability to pay, many of us have a lot of debt. Our dependence on debt is possibly the most widely abused principle in God's Word regarding money. Scripture does not forbid us from borrowing money, but it does point out its disadvantages. "The rich rule over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender" (Proverbs 22:7). Despite God's warnings, our dependence on debt continues to grow.



Some debt is unavoidable. In the case of a

job loss or health problems, it may not be possible to avoid debt. In addition, some debt is acceptable, such as debt for educational purposes or home mortgages. Debt that is acquired for the purpose of spending money to make money makes economic sense.

The most troublesome debt in our society is credit card debt. Credit is a means of renting money when we need it, for as long as we need it. Credit allows us to enjoy something now and pay for it later. Unfortunately, for many of us, credit cards are easily accessible, and, in today's society, we are encouraged to take advantage of them. With so much available credit, it is no surprise that the number of bankruptcies and divorces related to financial tension is high. We may enjoy the spending that gets us into debt, but it is not much fun getting out of it. In spite of all the warnings about debt, we are still willing to buy now and pay later. Credit cards should contain the clause, "This credit card can be hazardous to your financial well-being."

It has been said that there are three types of people. Those who "have," those who "have not," and those who "have not paid for what they have." Many people are paying five to 20 percent or more of their budgets toward credit card debt, which places a great burden on family expenses. The financial burden is caused by having to pay for things you bought in the past at the same time you are paying for current expenses, as well as the high interest rates that credit card companies charge. For example, if you have a credit card balance of \$2,000 at a 15 percent annual interest rate and you remit only the minimum payment, it will take 17.5 years to repay the \$2,000 balance. The total cost, including interest charges, increases to \$4,517.62. In the time it may take to pay off your credit cards, most things that were purchased will have been lost, stolen, or worn out. We live in a society in which enough is never enough. One of the biggest reasons we get into debt is greed. "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). Jesus was criticizing the notion that the value of life is determined by the number of possessions we have. In order to avoid going deeper and deeper into unnecessary debt, a change in attitude is required. Curbing wants and desires leads to greater success in staying out of debt.

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### Christian Parenting Questions and Faith

Have you ever wished that your child would stop asking so many questions? Every parent has impatient times. But try to remember that questions are essential if a child is to grow, both intellectually and spiritually. According to Effective Christian Education: A National Study of Protestant Congregations (1990), Search Institute identified that a church that encourages questioning and challenges thinking promotes the growth of its members' faith.

A parent or caregiver who encourages faith questions provides an environment in which his or her child's faith can mature. How can we encourage our

children to ask questions about faith? Never ridicule or criticize their questions. Listen attentively. Give honest answers. When you don't know an answer, help them search for answers. The surprising thing about all those questions is that they'll not only foster the growth of your child's faith, but they'll help you become more articulate in expressing your beliefs.
