NORTH DAKOTA

The Dakota Territory was carved from the Nebraska Territory when the latter achieved statehood. North Dakota entered the Union in 1889, and the following year it was organized as a single-district state, and placed in the Eighth Circuit.¹

ND.ST.02 was authorized as a temporary position, with the proviso that the first vacancy to occur would not be filled.² When Judge Amidon retired in 1928, ND.ST.01 ended, and ND.ST.02 effectively became a regular line. North Dakota has two district judgeships.
